Miss Costain, a teacher of Physical Education, returned to Waimea College, while Miss Taylor, who worked for a year in the Social Studies department, left for overseas travel. Miss Walker, our exchange English teacher from Scotland, returned home, but she later donated a rhododendron which her home form took great pleasure in planting at the school.

Mr Meads came to Forest View in November 1978 from the Computer Centre at Kinleith. He had previously taught at Thames High School. He was appointed P.R.I., assistant to the Head of Mathematics, and he did much to set up the computer, and computer studies in the school. He was the coach of the second fifteen and he acted as a liaison teacher with the School Pupil Council. He will be remembered for the high standard he set in everything he did.

Gray joined the staff as a full time relieving teacher, and last but certainly not least, we gained Mr and Mrs Hodges as full time relievers for term three. They have proved to be a valuable asset, and it is regrettable that they are not likely to be with us in 1982.

THE PUPIL COUNCIL

The council is made up of sixteen executive councillors and representatives from the third, fourth and fifth form classes. The executive councillors are elected by the Staff and pupils as a whole, while the class representatives are elected by their form classes.

From the successful executive nominees, the Head Boy and Head Girl and their respective deputies were selected by the Staff. Brendon Morgan and Patricia Geraets were chosen to be student leaders, and Mark Dawson and Raewyn Pudsey were their deputies. However Brendon later left school, and Mark replaced him as Head Boy. Ian Foster then became Deputy Head Boy. The secretary was Diane Stephenson and the treasurer Andrew Taylor.

During the course of the year a social was organised to raise money for Telethon. This social was held in a hired hall but in future it is hoped we will be able to use the promised auditorium, which will thus mean an increase in profits.

Our annual workday was held in October. The Council elected a committee to organise this fund raising effort, and with the help of the staff of the school, especially Mrs M. Crum who was the chief organiser, a record \$5,300 nett was raised. The school has voted that the workday proceeds be put towards the purchase of a mini-bus so there would be ready transport for school trips. In addition, the Pupil Council decided that in view of the lack of progress made with the Fives Courts (to be built with 1979 Workday funds) the money raised to build the courts should be redirected into the mini-bus fund. A roster was also set up to make sports equipment available to pupils at lunchtime.

All in all, 1981 has been a year of several changes, and it is hoped that next year's Pupil Council will continue to improve school life.
