By the end of 1981 we had bade farewell to some teachers who had become very familiar figures around the school. Those who left were Mrs B. Elder, Mrs D. Ayers, Mrs M. Mathis, Mr N. Smith, Mrs S. Yan, Mr G. Heaton, Mr R. Bell, Mrs P. Gray and Mrs S. Hodges.

Mrs B. Elder joined the staff of Forest View High School in 1977 as a teacher librarian. Over the years she proved to be an invaluable member of the English Department, and under her management the library increased its book total from three and a half thousand to seven thousand. A widely known, and well liked personality, Mrs Elder's activities were many, and included a study skills course for sixth formers and the coaching of a netball team. She left on the 17th November to take up the position of Tutor Co-ordinator at Waiariki Community College.

Mrs D. Ayers also left in November, to travel overseas with her husband, and Mrs M. Mathis began family life. The Social Studies department were loathe to lose her! Mr N. Smith and Mrs S. Yan left for destinations unknown while Mr G. Heaton accepted a position at New Zealand Forest Products Kineleith. He has since returned to Christchurch. Mr R. Bell took his lofty height and technical know-how to Cambridge High School, Mrs P. Gray is living in Tokoroa, and Mrs S. Hodges, after a brief time as an English teacher, began family life.

February 1982 arrived, and school commenced with teaching "gaps" being occupied by new staff. Mrs T. Benhar was appointed teacher librarian, Mr B. Blucher and Mr B. Dowdle joined the Science department, Miss A. O'Mahony the English, Miss H. Pederson, Mathematics, and Mrs C. Stokes the Physical Education department. Mr G. OBITUARIES

WIREMU PATARA RANGI



In March of this year the school was sad to learn of the death of Wiremu Rangi, an ex-pupil, who had been in our sixth form in 1981. Wiremu was a cadet survey draughtsman for New Zealand Forest Products, and it was while he was collecting rain check gauges in the forest that he was killed.

Wiremu began his high school career at Forest View, then he went to another school, before returning for a sixth form year. His parents lived at Putaruru so he often commuted, or stayed at his Nana's home in Tokoroa.

As a person he was modest, shy, academically able, with a small circle of friends who enjoyed his humour and "down to earth" reports on his escapades in the bush. He frequently brought pork to share with his teachers and friends. He will be remembered for his relaxed approach to life, and his love for the outdoor pursuits of tramping and hunting.

JAMES IAIN MARK ELDER

James Elder, Deputy Head Boy, died on the fourth of July 1982, from injuries received, while playing for the first fifteen against Matamata College, the day before.

James loved rugby! He was a dedicated team member and he played at number eight. A hard, uncompromising tackler, he had the ability to cover large areas in defence. He also assisted in boosting the team's morale on and off the field.

As a seventh former, James was progressing well with his studies and looking forward to a career at University. A tall, quiet young man with a keen sense of humour, James was well liked and had many friends at school, not all from his form class, for he was known as someone who would listen and help, if he could.

James was a member of the Executive Council for two years, and was voted this year to the position of Deputy Head Boy, a role he handled competently. As it was widely known that James spent much time tramping and enjoying the beauty of nature, the Council thought it appropriate to plant a native tree in his memory. He is sadly missed.

THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

Probably the only occasion when Forest View pupils see the full Board of Governors is once a year at prizegiving, so it is not surprising that many pupils and parents have only a hazy idea of the Board's functions. The purpose of this article is to remedy this situation.

The Forest View High School Board comprises ten people, nine of whom are chosen as a result of the elections held once every three years. Eight of these members are elected by the parents of pupils attending the school, a teachers' representative is elected by the staff, and one member is appointed by the South Auckland Education Board. It is always hoped that the parents' representatives will have varied skills and ethnic backgrounds, because their job is to act on behalf of parents, answering their questions, taking notice of their feelings, and helping to guide the school in the direction parents wish.

Once elected, it is the Board's duty to govern the school and supervise its running. It is responsible for the school's finances, which is making the best possible use of funds provided by the government, and it often makes representation for improved facilities within the school. Every effort is also made to see that the grounds and buildings of the school are kept in good order, and that teachers' houses are maintained. The Board also has a duty to see that discipline is retained within the school, so that pupils have every opportunity to study and become balanced people in society. As Tokoroa is subject to zoning, a number of meetings are held each year to determine the number of "out of zone" pupils, wishing to attend Forest View High School, who fit the Minister of Education's criteria.

Board meetings take place every month and these are open to members of the public. Committees of the Board also meet at the school regularly between full Board meetings and Forest View is fortunate to have members who give their time unstintingly. I hope this has been a help towards you understanding the role of the Board of Governors.

This was fun as not only did we meet people, but we also felt the support, knowing they were with us, backing us up. Months passed and still we were putting hours into getting our fares for Fiji. More fund-raising projects like bottle drives, holding school socials and organising a "woppa swoppa", a new experience for us as we had to sell advertisement space to retailers, were great successes.

During this time the "team spirit" was rising as each person was determined to achieve our goal.

Finally the day came, 20th August 1982, when we flew out of Auckland International Airport. Our tour party consisted of 21 members. There were 11 girls, 3 teachers, the Sommerville family and Mr and Mrs Lochhead. As it was a new experience for most of us we made the most of it going to Fiji by singing and laughing in the plane. Even other passengers joined in.

We had expected bright sunshine but after landing in Suva, found this was not the case. The rain was pouring, so it was a quick sprint to shelter. From here we hired a bus to take us to the Capricorn Apartments, where we stayed for four nights and five days. As it was Saturday we went to watch a rugby game and one of the highlights was catching a thirty six seater bus with no windows which had about seventy or so passengers on board and the driver driving at 40 kilometres an hour on winding roads.

We discovered that Fijians do not like playing netball in the rain, and when we saw many of the grass courts that schools had knee deep in mud, we understood why their Headmistresses felt it was dangerous. However, we were fortunate that Anna's Uncle John could find an indoor location. We played two games against the Fiji LDS High School defeating them 23-15 and 42-22 and these games were enjoyed by both sides. I am sure each girl from LDS benefitted as not only did we show them new

techniques, but also explained to them how to do better in different situations, for example, shooting for goal, to hold the ball high so it's harder for the defence to defend. After we had finished playing we were entertained by the girls with their beautiful voices and we got to know them better. They liked our presentation of badges.

For five days it rained in Suva, so we moved on to Sigatoka, stopping en route at the Cultural Centre. In Sigatoka, which is four hours ride from Suva we stayed at the Crow's Nest, and although the rain was still falling we could see the sun fighting the grey sky. The next day we went shopping and were greeted in the shops by Indians whose favourite saying was "make special bargain," which was fine if you knew how much you wanted to spend on your purchase. Everything was cheap so it was very tempting.

At Nadi we stayed in the "Skylodge" for a night then took a boat to "Beachcomber Island." Here there were no worries, just relaxation and tan time. Beating drums signalled breakfast, lunch, tea, or the boat coming in from, or going back to, the mainland. We met people from other places and played netball or grid iron with a coconut as our ball. The three days and two nights we spent on the island were extremely pleasant and we browned beautifully.

Finally the day came that everyone dreaded. It was time to return to foggy New Zealand. We flew back in an Air NZ Jumbo which was very comfortable but I'm sure we could have caught the plane three months later. We were welcomed by our parents and relations, and we were able to tell them that we'd thoroughly enjoyed ourselves and that all the hard work that had been put into the trip was more than worthwhile. We had no regrets!

The girls would like to thank their parents, the school and the community for their support, and especially Mr and Mrs Dawson and Mrs Williamson for the time and dedication they freely gave to make the trip such a success.

When we go to tangis, Nanny is known to everyone. I love her, and I always will! If you have a nanny, love her too.

PUPILS VISIT NEW CALEDONIA

On the 20th of January 1982, a group of fifty high school students and four adults left Auckland International Airport bound for New Caledonia. Among that group were ten 4th form French students from F.V.H.S., our teacher Mrs M. Anderson, and a mother of one of the girls in the group. The trip had been organised by the South Auckland Folklore Society, and was designed to help those who studied French, and to show them a French way of life.

We arrived at Tontouta International Airport at 5 a.m. The first thing to really hit us about the island was the incessant heat. Even at that early hour it was very hot and very muggy!

It took us about two hours by bus to reach the first of our two destinations. Bourail, by New Zealand standards, was quite small, probably about the size of Tirau, although it was the second largest city in New Caledonia. We stayed there for four days.

Our first taste of French cuisine came in the form of a piece of French bread with something (bacon I think) jammed into it. While in Bourail, French bread and very strong coffee seemed a very large part of our diet, but there was always a large supply of tropical fruits at hand. Every morning at about 6 a.m. the markets opened. The vendors sold fruit and vegetables mostly, so instead of just bread and coffee to start the day we could have fresh pineapples, mangoes, or paw-paws.

In Bourail, we stayed at a Hostel. The only unusual thing here was the toilet, a sort of shower tray and a hole in it, with two side panels for your feet.

We had a small dance our last night there, but it all ended too soon. At ten o'clock on the dot, Mr Goldsmith, our "Chaperone", insisted we turn the tape recorder off, asked our visitors to leave, and sent everyone to bed.

On the Saturday we left Bourail for Noumea, the capital. On the way we stopped at the N.Z. War Memorial Cemetery, where we presented some flowers. Noumea was the complete opposite of Bourail. It was big, busy and exciting. There were so many

shops and we knew our money wouldn't last long. When you got hot and thirsty, you could go to the local supermarket and not buy a long, cool coke, but an iced vodka and orange instead. Needless to say, we went to the supermarkets a couple of times.

On Sunday we took a two hour boat trip out the Amedee Island. We spent the whole day there, swimming in the beautiful warm water and sunbathing.

On one of the five days we spent in Noumea, the Cruise ship "Séa Princess" pulled into port. It was amazing the way all the stores raised the prices of their goods in the hope of making a few extra Pacific francs.

In Noumea we stayed in yet another Hostel (Institut Jeanne d'Albret). This was a vast improvement on Bourail. There were two major beaches in Noumea - "Anise Vata" and "Le Baie de Citrons". Along these strands of beach there were always people swimming, sunbathing and windsurfing. It was 600 francs (\$6) to hire a windsurfer for an hour, and some of our group took advantage of this opportunity and learnt how to windsurf.

On our second to last day there it rained. This however didn't stop us from going out and enjoying ourselves. We left for New Zealand on the 29th January. It was quite sad really, but everyone promised themselves that they would return and enjoy the delights of New Caledonia yet again. One day we hope to do just that, for New Caledonia is truly a beautiful tropical island.
