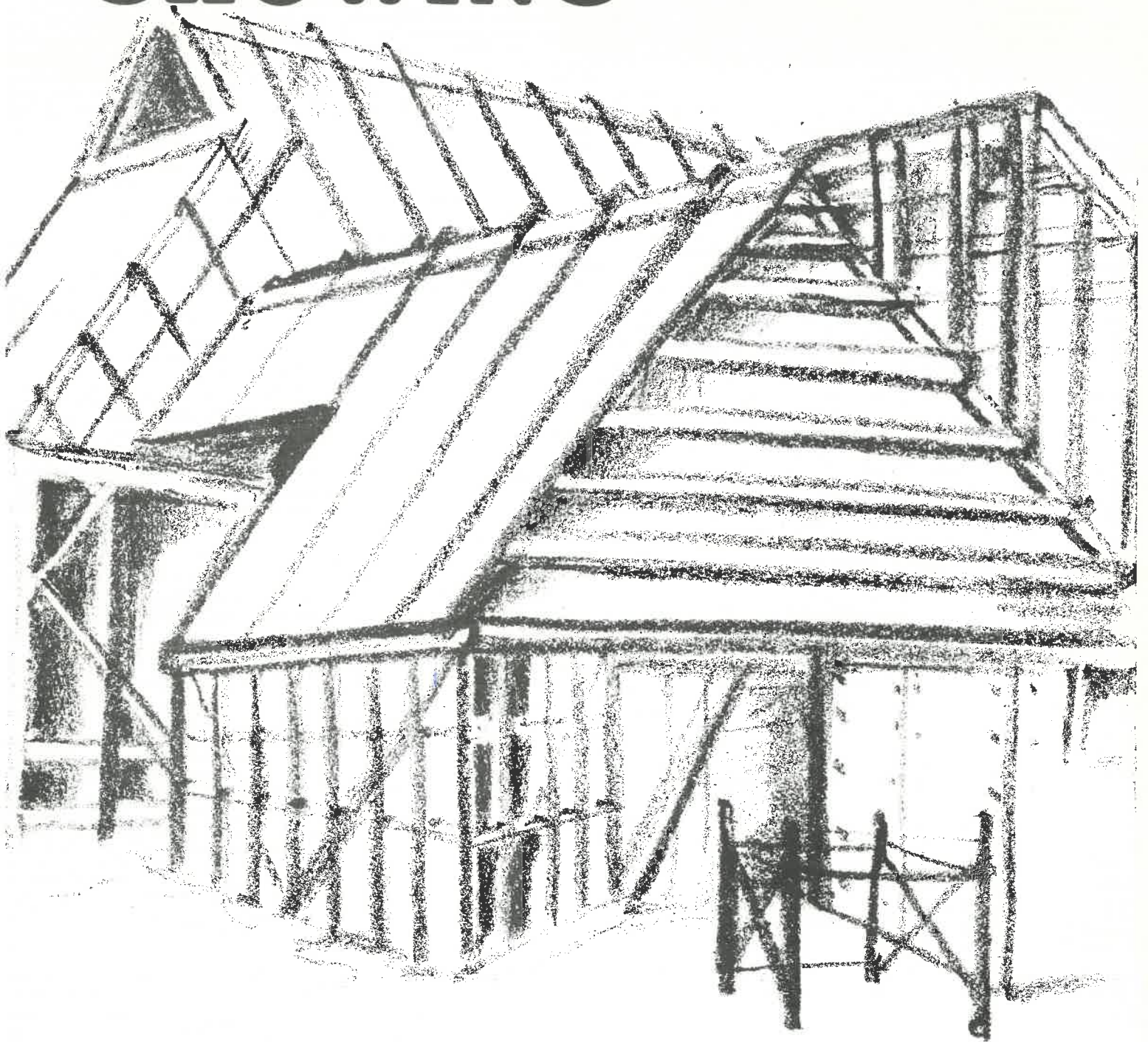

THE BOARD OF GOVERNORS

In general terms the role of the Board of Governors is:-

- a) To determine the needs of the community.
- b) To approve objectives and service development plans.
- c) To approve major policy recommendations.
- d) To approve appointment of staff.
- e) To review (monitor) results.

To these ends Board meetings are held every month, and its committees also meet at regular intervals. The Forest View Board also administers applications for out of zone pupils wishing to attend the school. The feeling among its members is that as parents representatives they should accept responsibility for this difficult and sensitive area, although it is uncommon to find Board involvement with zoning in other parts of New Zealand.

During the year we have kept in close contact with the Secondary School Boards Association and also the Post Primary Teachers Association in attempting to find ways of minimising the effect of termination of teaching appointments after the population drop begins to show through at secondary school level in 1986. The Board considers it vital that the pupils continue to receive a high standard of education. At present the Forest View roll continues to rise.

The Minister of Education visited the school recently, providing an opportunity for the Board and the staff to discuss matters of concern of a general nature and more specifically of Forest View. The problems of damp and cold in the Gymnasium were specified, and an improvement in this area can be expected in the near future.

The completion of the Auditorium Block is a milestone for the school, making it possible for all the school to gather in one place, and encouraging school spirit.

I hope that parents will continue to keep in contact with their right to vote in the 1984 Board elections.

OBITUARY

JOHN HERMAN OVERES
(20-11-64 — 18-12-82)

John was kind, thoughtful, easy-going, cared for his friends and loved life. He had a keen sense of humour and adventure that others admired him for. He always showed his true ability and was a member of the school basketball team when it had its most successful season.

In August of 1982 he left school to seek employment. He had not yet been informed in his success in obtaining an electrical apprenticeship at New Zealand Forest Products when he was killed while testing his go-kart with friends. He collided with a motorbike and received injuries, from which he died three days later.

NEW ZEALAND HERALD SCHOLAR OF THE YEAR AWARDS

In 1980 *The New Zealand Herald* began making these annual awards in order to encourage senior pupils who show outstanding academic merit and effort at secondary schools in the Auckland Province and Napier and Hastings and to provide some recognition of achievement in an important area of personal excellence.

The awards are: a one-year scholarship of \$1000 for the Scholar of the Year; six further scholarships of \$200 for which the judges take into account such factors as size of school, numbers in senior forms and geographical location; special awards of \$150 for pupils who have triumphed over physical or academic difficulties; and certificates of merit which take into account the factors mentioned above.

Candidates for these awards are nominated by their headmasters and in selecting winners the judges give particular consideration to results in the University Bursaries and Scholarship Examinations but other factors such as pupils' school records and their academic aims and aspirations are also taken into account.

This School can be proud that the two pupils I have nominated for consideration for awards - Raewyn Pudsey, Dux and Entrance Scholarship winner in 1981, and Diane Stephenson, Dux and A University Bursary winner in 1982 were each awarded a Certificate of Merit.

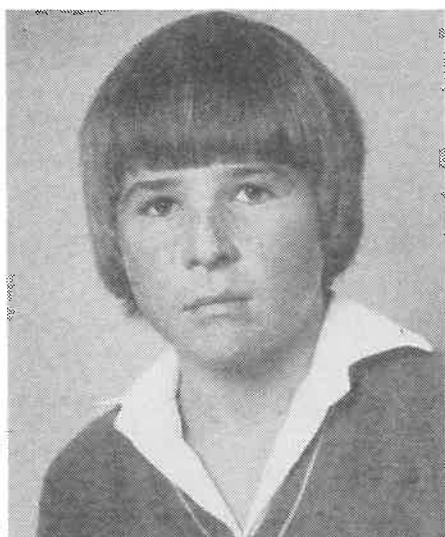

After a month or so I was just another student at Forest View instead of being "one of those American girls". With the winter sport season I decided to take up hockey and joined the 2nd XI. Despite the fact that we didn't win one game we had a great season and a lot of fun! In June we headed up the Mountains for a week at the Outdoor Pursuits Centre. The Mountains were beautiful, but after a night out in the snow, and plenty of cuts and bruises we were glad to get home.

Going home will mean missing mince pies, cream doughnuts, caramel chews, and maybe losing a few of the pounds I put on due to the good kiwi food.

My year with the Parker family is almost complete. It's hard to believe that I'll actually be leaving them soon. I don't have any brothers or sisters in the States, so that was new for both Suzanne and myself. Sure we've had our share of scraps, but what are sisters for? I've got to admit that Mum and Dad have put up with me ... believe me it's hard at times.

The months fly past so quickly. Before I know it I'll be back at the airport having a cry and taking off. Yet what I've gained in New Zealand - the friendships I've made, and that which I've learned about myself and the world will always be a part of me. OUR A.F.S. GIRLS

Diane, Leah and Raewyn left New Zealand after a rigorous selection process for their different destinations in July. Some of their early impressions are below.

Diane Cornelius left New Zealand on July 15th for her new home for a year in Eemnes, Netherlands. Her journey was not without its troubles and she was delayed in Bangkok, Thailand on the stopover for three days.

"I used to think I'd hate to go to Thailand or any Asian country but now my mind's been completely changed. The people are really friendly and the FOOD is gorgeous. Sure you have rice with every meal but there are so many sauces and meats and veges to go with each meal."

Diane spent two weeks in a language camp on arrival in Holland and then met her family of two older brothers and a younger sister.

"I get so frustrated because I can't say what I want, but fortunately we usually end up in hysterics because it's so funny — I always end up saying the wrong word." "Did you know the drinking age is 16 years here!?" "I had toast this morning! which may not seem that great to you but it was my first since I left New Zealand - BIG TREAT."

"Watching TV is hard here. I like to watch as it helps my Dutch. (English with Dutch sub-titles)."

"It's amazing how many bike paths there are."

"We call the teachers by their first names and they even have organised wagging. You are allowed 6-7 hours where you can just tell the teacher you're not coming to his or her lesson."

"Last Friday I went to Amsterdam and it was all I dreamed it would be — WOW! It's so beautiful - it's got modern department stores, old stone buildings, canals with stone bridges and old squares with pigeons, outside cafes lining the streets."

Leah Clarkin and Raewyn Mackie left New Zealand together on July 25th and flew to Los Angeles where they spend three days before boarding separate planes to take them to their new homes. Leah headed for Edina, a city of 45,000 close to Minneapolis (150,000) in Minnesota. Raewyn's home was in Frostburg, a town of 13,000 in Maryland. Raewyn has four new brothers while Leah has two younger brothers and a younger sister. Leah's first impressions included these.

"On the flight there were 150 Aussie AFS'ers."

"Got into Los Angeles airport about 5 p.m. and got out of the airport about 7 p.m. TRULY AMAZING! Heaps of yanks talking American - fast cars - big cars - fast cars."

"The house has got three garages (kinda normal cars), games room, five bedrooms, study, family room, dining room, kitchen, flash dining room, flash entertaining room, bathrooms, bathrooms, toilets, laundry, spare rooms - still not finished - T.V.'s in nearly every room - telephones etc etc."

Raewyn lives hundreds of kilometres away in Maryland which is on the East Coast of the United States. These are among her descriptions of home.

"Most of the sections are 1 acre but there are lots of sections that haven't been built on so they are still forest," "Lots and lots of trees," "Temperatures have been between 35°C and 40°C," "Frostburg is a pretty, old town. The shops are old and there are not many new buildings. The houses are old. Lots are very narrow and two storeyed," "Already at school there are cheerleaders practising, guys practising football," "The school is old and needs a paint. It is four storeys high," "School starts at 7.45 a.m. and finishes at 2.30 p.m.," "AFS'ers go straight onto the Student Council - we don't have to be voted on," "All the kids love my accent and sometimes they can't understand what I'm saying so I repeat it over and over again."

Diane, Leah and Raewyn will return to New Zealand in early July 1984 after a year of new families, friendships and a wealth of new experiences.
