## FROM THE HEADMASTER

1974 — 1984

It is very likely that our School is unique in having opened on the thirteenth of February.

It was not until this late date in 1974 that there were enough class-rooms available for use by the 200 Foundation pupils. (The superstitious of course, can make much of the Opening Day having been the thirteenth of the month). And, apart from these class-rooms there was very little other space either inside or outside available for most of 1974.

There were very many hardships and difficulties in the Foundation Year—no heating at all until temporary electric heaters were provided; having to use a very uneven paddock down Baird Road for Physical Education; no Bunsen burners in the labs; construction work going on everywhere. But the Foundation Staff and pupils survived.

The School's roll has not grown as the planners of the days of Tokoroa's rapid expansion expected. The roll peaked in 1978 at 761 and then dropped to 740 in 1979 and to 705 in 1981. It then rose again until this year there were 735 pupils.

Numerical growth, though, is not the only kind of growth—nor is it the most important. Over the years since Forest View opened young people have grown in many much more important ways as they have

We should feel that no matter when we joined or join the School we belong to the same continuing fellowship which extends now to many parts of the world.

In this, Forest View's eleventh year, and in the years to come all members of the School should continue to do the very best as Mr D. H. Thurston, who was the Regional Superintendent of Education, told the School in a telegram message he sent to the First Assembly on 13 February 1974, to build 'a fine school where friendship, courtesy and honest endeavour prevail.'

I am just a beginner in playing hockey and I found it difficult to control and trap a ball with a stick. Anyway, I had a marvellous hockey season and I can't believe I scored two goals.

In the school activities, I went for several school trips. I had a great time on the Sixth Form Trip. A week away from school in Auckland, that made me feel I was back on the streets in H.K. The ISCF skiing trip was an unforgettable experience for me. That was the first time I'd seen snow and had skied. It was a lot of fun. The great memories from the trips make my AFS year all the more enjoyable.

During my stay, I made sure I tried everything I don't have in H.K., like milking, shearing, skiing, snowball fights, playing rugby and cricket, mowing lawns and tasing different foods, mainly Kiwi and Samoan foods (Mum is a good cook!). 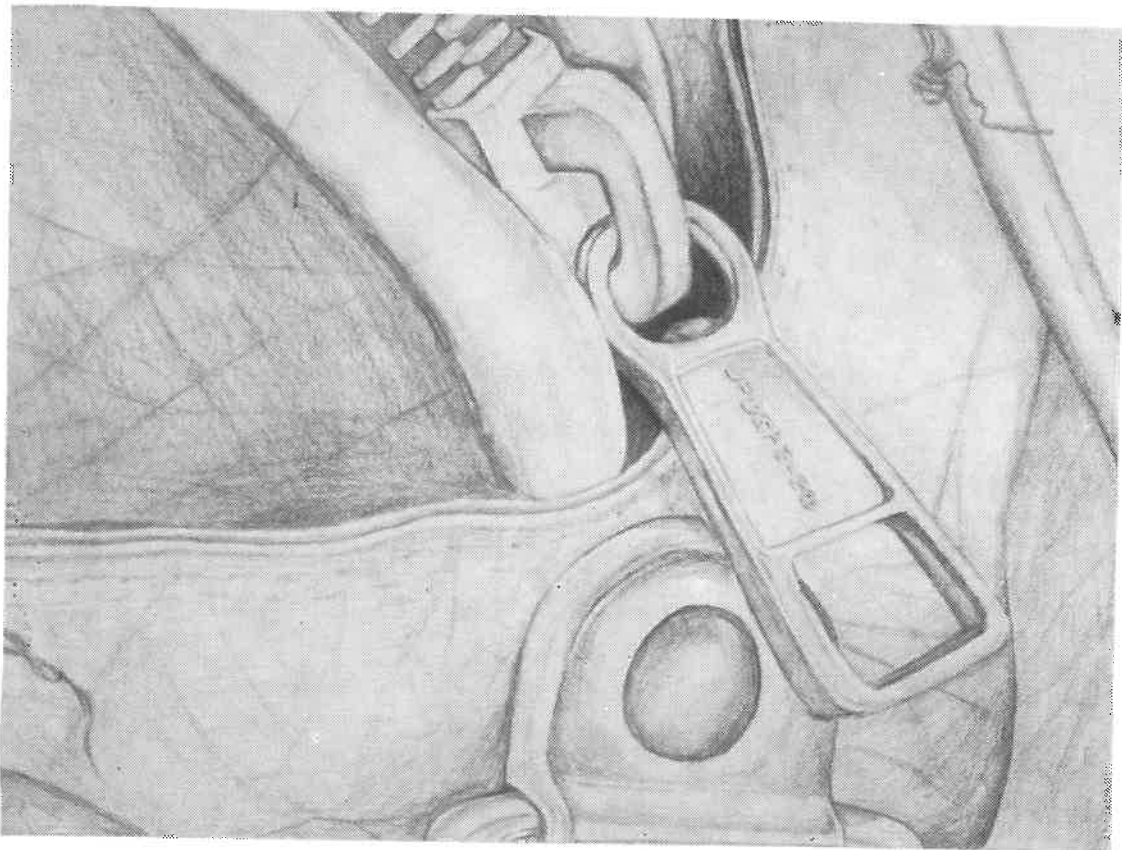
