

hosted its very first Multi-Cultural Evening, and


what an evening it was!! The school auditorium

and standing.









The Maori Culture Group was the first item of the evening and proved very popular with the audience with their eye catching costumes and first class performance.







There were many outstanding individual achievements, including Jamie Cameron and Jasin Goldsmith going to Japan with the N.Z. Secondary Schools' team, and Nooroa Manu being selected for the North Island Under 18's, but special mention must undoubtedly go to Jasin. His selection for the Waikato team was *the* highlight of the season, and it shouldn't be long before we hear his name being announced in the All Blacks.

The team's thanks must go to the men responsible for our success — Jim Cameron and Tony Edgar. These two have worked together with the team for a number of years, and without their knowledge of the game and ability to drive the team on and get the best out of individuals, we would never have reached the standards we did.

Also our thanks to the man who kept the team running — Brian Williamson. The hard work he put in behind the scenes kept everything running smoothly and made sure we were never short of anything. Thanks Brian.

The team would also like to give its special thanks to Dean Mullins, for the help he gave us after Jim left, Mrs Schwed, for all the work she put in at school and at the aftermatch functions, all the mothers who helped prepare the beautiful meals; and our supporters, who followed us everywhere, and (thanks to Mrs Manu) were always able to shout down the opposition, no matter what the odds.

On the whole it was a great season, and with a bit of luck, we hope next year's team will carry on where this year's left off.


PLAYER PROFILES






The second event Forest View riders competed in was the Inter High School One Day Event held at Cambridge. Unfortunately our sixth formers could not attend as they were on the

The team played with good spirit and sportsmanship (as always) and though disappointed with losing were "chuffed" at their first time performance.






