


from one end of the court to the other. Our methods were often comical,



# The Second Fifteen




#### **Design Brief**


Following a careful investigation, our group decided that our three units would each follow the same basic plan and would give no indication as to the nature of its occupant's infirmity or otherwise from its exterior view. Our units retain a traditional rectangular approach and are designed for ease of manufacture and cost-effectiveness. The area of each unit is 89.6


square metres and conforms with the standards laid down in N7 3604


Our floorplan (for all units) has been designed specifically for the use of disabled persons with modifications made where necessary (e.g. kitchen, bathroom) to suit the non-disabled. The concept idea being that the extra space required for the disabled such as door and passage widths would not be a



disadvantage to the able person and could with level entry points as provided suit the elderly as well as the infirm. Thus this brief calls for no structural alterations between units. Modifications of a cosmetic nature are, however, required to suit the particular occupant.

The kitchen, dining and living areas have been designed to be open plan to afford easy access, and the roof raised to provide more air and light over these points. Entry to each unit is made through the main door at the front of the house. This connects to a modest and well-lit hall which connects the living, laundry and garaging areas.

# Siting

The three units are situated so as to make the best use of the sun. They face towards the north so that the living areas remain well-lit during most of the day. The disabled unit has been reversed to suit site requirements.

#### **Foundations**

The foundation of each unit consists of a solid nib wall with a reinforced concrete floor. This will be raised to a minimum height above ground level to ensure the most gradual entry can be made consistent with adequate weather-proofing.

# Exterior

The roof is split-level and is raised by one metre above the living area. It is to be clad with black stone-chip roofing tiles. Guttering is to be provided using "Marley" type white plastic guttering. Cladding of walls will be accomplished by the use of brown clinker-brick panels.

## Windows and Doors

All exterior windows and sliding doors are to be of brown aluminium section with the end windows arched to provide a Spanish effect consistant with the stepped facade provided on the building end. Doors will be of wood, panelled and coloured to match the overall decor. Further windows may be inserted in the stepped roof end and lighting panels placed in the living area ceiling.

# Interior Finish

The ceilings in the living areas are designed to provide air and light and will consist of exposed beams and matched "Michaelangelo" type ceiling panels. The laundry and hallway will maintain the more traditional flat ceiling with additional lighting provided by panels inserted in the stepped roof. Floors will be carpeted over a rubber underlay, with the exception of the kitchen, bathroom and laundry. These will employ a vinyl floor covering set to 80mm height on each contacting wall. The bathroom will be lined with waterproof panels and, in the case of the disabled unit, the floor will be tiled and heated in accordance with normal specifications laid down in the "Barrier Free" series of publications.

# Heating

Main heating of the living areas will be provided by a fuel efficient burner of the "Kent" type. Panel heaters may be provided in each bedroom. Heating rails will be provided in the disabled unit shower room.

# Insulation

All walls and ceilings will be insulated to conform with

national standards.

#### Electrical

(See drawings for details.) Lighting and wall-mounted switches will be required to be placed at a height convenient to those in wheelchairs, not exceeding 1400mm in height. Infrared signal detectors will be used in the disabled unit to operate main door and necessary lighting.

#### **Variations**

Certain cosmetic changes will need to be made to the disabled unit in addition to those mentioned above. Apart from the repositioning of door handles and light switches and a total modification of the bathroom, benches and the kitchen stove heights will also need attention. Wheel-under areas will also be required in both the kitchen and bathroom. Sturdy wall rails will be required in toilet/bathroom. A split-level stove is to be installed and the kitchen bench will be adapted to suit wheelchair use. The pantry has been designed in a "U" shape to allow ease of access. The modifications conform to the standards set out in the "Barrier Free" publications.

# Horticultural aspects

(See drawings for further details.) A concrete surround encloses the vegetable patch and all shrubberies. These have been raised 300mm above ground level to provide ease of access. Feature trees have been planted to provide shelter, colour and aesthetic appeal. Ground-covering plants such as Hebes, Juniper, Flaxes are interspersed beneath. Bulbs such as daffodils, crocus, hyacinth, spraxia


tulip, jonquil, freesia and gladioli provide further colour. Fences will be fronted by displays of NZ Clematis and miniature ivy. Miniature fruit trees are also recommended. All lawns are separated by concrete nibs. Trees such as the Ash Claret are used to provide shelter. Privacy is afforded by the use of evergreens. Native species are provided to attract songbirds.

#### Garaging

A garage connects to the end of each unit and is separated from it by a concrete reinforced block wall as a fire barrier. The specifications for the garage fall well within the parameters outlined in the "Barrier Free" specifications for the disabled. Each garage is provided with a Roller Shutter door in the front and sliding doors to both rear and hallway entry. It is expected that the main garage door (together with relevant lighting) will be automated (as mentioned above). The garage is connected to a 3.2-metre driveway constructed of close-fitting non-slip brown cobblestone to suit the overall decor.

#### Fencino

Two types of fence are to be employed. One enclosing the rear and sides of each unit will be constructed of 4x4 tanalised and creosoted timber set into a concrete nib wall. Suitable "Hardie" type sheets will be used nailed to rails fixed between posts. This fence will have a scalloped top and will be 1.8 metres high. An attractive crossed post and rail fence will front each unit. Tubular gates of the "Eclipse" type could be added to provide additional security.

During the last school inspection in 1984 the inspectors commented on the lack of a room designed for the teaching of Computer Studies and also the lack of an area in which members of the teaching staff in Mathematics could work and keep their resources.


We entered with the cultural awareness of screaming frogs and left with the souls of poets.

# A Change of School Life

It was quite difficult to come to a new school and meet new people. Aruara College was the last school I attended before I came to New Zealand. It was built in the middle of my little island, Aitutaki. About 300 pupils attended my school, and 23 staff. I thought we had the most secondary pupils in the Cook Islands, but then I discovered that we had the least. School starts at 10 minutes to eight in the morning and finishes at 2.30. The school uniform is very different from the one here. We did not wear shoes or socks, we had to walk in bare feet. Every girl had to plait their hair in two plaits which had to be tied with only red ribbon. Boys had to cut their hair short so that it did not touch the top of their collar. Boys wore grey shorts and a white shirt and girls wore a red pleated skirt with a white

## **Rickshaw Boy**

The cobblestones in front of me danced and shimmered, came suddenly up to meet me and fell away just inches from my face. My breath was coming in short gasps, blinding and stinging my eyes before I flicked it away with a toss of my head.

I strained every muscle to get to the top of this hill as fast as I possibly could. Near the top I had to avoid another rickshaw coming down and two chickens that strutted across the road without a care in the world. And with a final stagger and a grunt, we were on top of the world!

There was a gasp of amazement from behind me and I paused to consider the breathtaking scenery. Yes, it was worth the effort and strain to get here.

Below me, houses clustered all down the steep hill, as if scattered there like a child's blocks. Behind me they stretched back in a higgledy-piggledy mess. Down on the plains there was an intricate patchwork of greens and browns with a system of blue waterways and canals sneaking through it. And after that as far as the eye could see stretched the twinkling blue sea, until it met the blue sky on the horizon.

I had to take all this in in less than a second because I knew I had to keep going — I just hoped I had the right way! One thing was for sure, though — I was never going to volunteer to man my sick brother's rickshaw again.

I took a deep breath and pulled, and we were away. We started off alright, but then we went

short-sleeve blouse.

The subjects I did at Aruara were English, maths, clothing, typing, social studies, culture and commercial study. Apart from English, all the other subjects were taught in Cook Island. I played netball, volleyball, cricket, softball and also swimming.

We had six periods during the day. Each period was 50 minutes. We had three periods in the morning, half an hour for lunch and after that three periods to finish off the day. Each morning we had assembly, except on Friday, when we had a Bible lecture for half an hour.

Many teachers come to Aruara College from all over the world, but mainly from New Zealand

over the world, but mainly from New Zealand and the United States, to teach the pupils English. It was very hard for these teachers because most of the Cook Island children can't speak English properly.

We had detentions every day after school which went on for an hour, cleaning the whole school. Sometimes we had mufti but we only had to pay 30 cents.

Aruara College does not have sixth- and

over a pothole and with a sudden lurch we were away, careering down the steep hill as houses and stalls and staring people flashed past. We were going faster and faster — my legs had never gone so fast! Until there was a sudden crash! And an awful sound of splintering wood and screams rent the air.

For two moments the whole street was startingly silent, and then the commotion began. We had crashed into two cartloads full of eggs. The mess was incredible! My rather portly passenger simply sat with a very stupid expression on his face as the remains of an egg slowly oozed down his face and under his collar. The other driver was dancing about in a fit of rage, screaming insults and curses and shaking his fist at me. His face was changing from a brilliant shade of red to a vivid purple as he frothed at the mouth and finally ran out of curses - only to start at the beginning again. By now a large crowd had gathered in a circle, and there was a huge traffic jam behind as everyone had amazing and usually impossible ideas as to how to get out of his mess. And all that I could do was to laugh!

It's terrible, I know, but all the effort of pulling that rickshaw about with the fat lump inside it, and me so frail and skinny, and then his face, and the other driver — it was all just too funny for words! And after a while the other driver forgot to be angry, and he laughed too, a hearty guffaw, and he came and hugged me and my passenger and anybody else who got in the way, until soon everybody was falling about on the ground (in the eggs!), laughing.


