

DRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Tena Koutou Katoa, Kia Orana, Talofa Lava, Greetings.

1999 has been a landmark year for Forest View High School. It not only represents the last school year of the 1900's, but we have also celebrated the school's 25th Anniversary.

The first day of Forest View High School took place on Wednesday I3th February 1974, about one year after building contractors moved onto the site. The A Block building was not yet finished, but the students had already had a long holiday! The official opening was held on 18th September 1974 and was performed by the Governor General Sir Denis Blundell. The foundation headmaster was Mr J.D. Thain. I have taken the time to look back at the 1974 School magazine, and found it very interesting to read about Forest Views first year. Here are some interesting facts about 'then' and 'now'

The school will have grown a lot in the early years as each new level of students came through and new blocks were built. Over time other aspects such as the number and variety of courses and qualifications offered and the number of sports teams and performing groups have also continued to increase.

As I am writing this article, closing date for registrations for the 25th Anniversary celebrations is imminent, and the registrations are pouring in. By the time you read this article, Labour weekend will have been and gone. I am sure many past students, teachers and friends of the school will have had a great time looking back on earlier days, and looking forward to the next Reunion!

Another highlight for the year was a visit to Forest View by our Prime Minister Jenny Shipley in June. It is an honour for a school to host the most senior official in the country, and our students proved themselves up to the task. A special Powhiri that included Bagpipes was held and then the PM spoke to the school Assembly and answered the important questions set by the students.

This year we also hosted students from Dargaville High School on their first visit to FVHS as part of our Performing Arts Exchange, and a very successful joint Concert was held. We also hosted our fourth group of visitors from Misato Kita High School, as well as several exchange students. This year's production 'Rock -n-Roll' Romeo was a huge success, and the 'Cultural Dimension' in the school continues to improve.

Forest View has always been known for its high level of participation in sport and this year has been no exception. Unfortunately our annual exchange with Taradale High School fell through, but we replaced this with an exchange to Tauhara College. We are fortunate that several of our present attained National have students Representative status in their respective codes. This requires both the necessary and dedication special congratulations to these students. sporting dimension in the school is as important as it ever was.

The 'academic dimension' continues to be of prime importance. Our last set of external examination results was pleasing, with our senior students obtaining a record II Scholarship passes. The wide range of

courses and qualifications offered ensures that all students have the opportunity to leave school with at least one qualification. This year's year 9 students are the first group who will enter for the new national certificates when they are year 11 students in 2 years time. This has been outlined as an initiative called Achievement 2001. This group of students will lead the way in attempting their national certificate in Educational Achievement Level I. The following year they do level 2, and the next year level 3. They need to achieve a minimum number of credits to gain each These credits are National Certificate. Achievement passing gained from Standards. About half of the achievement standards will be assessed internally, and about half by external examination. This means that students will have external examinations at year 11, year 12 and year 13 which cover about half of their work. Although the details are not finalised yet, it looks as though next year will be the last year of the traditional school certificate examinations. At Forest View High School we already offer a large number of National Certificates and assess many unit standards. This means that we are well prepared for the new qualifications when they are introduced.

In 1974, the Regional superintendent of Education, Mr D.H Thurston, sent a telegram message to the first assembly. He asked those present to build "a fine school where friendship, courtesy and honest endeavour prevail". The Forest View community has taken this to heart, and these same characteristics continue to be a driving force 25 years later.







Hola a todos my name is Pablo Fernando Gutierrez Menendez. I'm from Bolivia (SOUTH AMERICA). I came here in January '99 to January 2000.

I like the people from NZ because they are friendly, especially the Maori people, because I had a good time with them. The school system is different, like here you can choose the subjects, but in Bolivia you have to take like 14 subjects every term. Here it was hard for me in the first few months because the language is different and at the beginning of the year I didn't understand everything because I have never spoken English before in my life. In school I enjoy playing in the basketball team and it was a good way to make friends. I tried to go to the Maori club (once) too. I really like to go to parties with my friends but they are different. Students here drink alcohol a lot more and they don't dance a lot like we do but I like to go to the parties anyway.

Life here is totally different to the life style that I've got in Bolivia. I like staying in Tokoroa. It is a little town but I like it because there's not the traffic and the noise of my city at home. I like the food. It is something different. In Bolivia we have a spicy food but the food here I like very much (boil ups, hangi, chop suey). Now I am a little bit more responsible than when I first came to the school - this probably will help me in my future life. I started a new life here and, I want to be honest, I don't want to go back to Bolivia because I've made new friends. I have got a new family and when I go back I will really miss every one and my life here.

Now I want to say thanks to all the teachers for having the patience to work with me. Before, I didn't listen to them but I still like them. Thanks also to the basketball team (SENIOR BOYS) for teaching me how to play basketball and giving me their friendship and a special thanks to my family here in NZ for all those things I have learned with them and from them. I'm Tomí, from Fínland-the land of ígloos, Santa Claus, rally drívers and opportuníties of físhing under the ice.

In the nine months I have been in Tokoroa I have noticed many differences between Finland and New Zealand. For example, you put your Coca Cola in something that you call a "Refrigerator". In Finland we stick our coca-cola in an oven to warm it up to drinkable temperature – that is to make it liquid (not frozen).

I reckon you are lucky as you have the opportunity to use the school bus, or you can walk or bike to school. In my country we have to swim to school every day, and in the winter, because of the frozen sea, we have to swim under the ice. We have to make sure our sandwiches are well wrapped so the polar bears can't smell the cheese and come after us.

In New Zealand, for the first time in my life, I have had a pet (apart from polar bears). In Finland I once had a pet dog, but it kept freezing up, even though I kept feeding it anti-freeze.

Many people have asked me about what parties are like in Finland. Well the main difference is that we party in someone's igloo and to keep the beer cold we throw the cans on the roof. We get our food by drilling a hole in the floor of our igloo and trying to dive for the tuna fish that swim by.

I have also often been asked about the weather in Finland. It is so cold we can't use a thermometer, as the temperature does not register on the lower end of the scale. Instead we judge the temperature by counting how many games of chess we played before we went to bed. This explains the traditional saying "Mina haluan syoda sinua" which when translated says "Tuna fish can't fly because they have an ice cube stuck on their head."

In Tokoroa I enjoyed training in the sunshine all year round, (which would be in Finland theoretically impossible). In Finland we do part of our winter running in this 2 km all-year-round summer underground pipe. I found your game of hockey (without ice) was a game for left handed people.

In school what I enjoyed most of the time was the lunch-times, playing with my friends making sand castles and mud pies which in the end didn't seem much different to our cooking lessons. This year at FVHS was a new experience for me because I have never had so many cows around me.

I want to say thank you to everybody for making my stay so enjoyable. Just to meet you guys made it worth me coming.


rehearsals were really worthwhile as they gave the band, sound/lighting a chance to work with the cast and for us to fix up bits we weren't that good at.




