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
Staff Notes



Metua Rio (WA): Metua had the ability to cope with many different positions. She handled these positions well. A definite asset to the team.



And in the face of vicious rumours to the contrary, we members of the Second Eleven would like to make official our claim to a perfect, absolutely spotless record.



This year, the sports I played were soccer and volleyball and I really enjoyed them. I had the chance to meet new friends.





The Choir



Ms Trigg's Transition Group

1989 has been an interesting and informative year for the students in the transition class. At the beginning of each term we discussed the things we wanted to do and the people we wanted to meet. Looking back over the year we have accomplished a lot.

At the beginning of the year most of us were very shy and not certain about how to meet people or introduce ourselves. We practised doing this in role plays first. We invited people to the school to talk to us and we visited many places around the town. At the end of the year all of us feel much more confident when meeting new people and different situations.

During the year we have learnt about the legal requirements and the pitfalls and advantages of flatting or renting from a land agent. We were surprised to find out how much it cost to set up a flat and how hard it is to cope on a small wage. We have had regular cooking sessions so that we can survive when we leave home.

We have discovered how many people and agencies there are in Tokoroa to help people if and when different problems arise once people leave school. We have visited or received visitors from National Society for the Alcohol and Drugs, Marriage Guidance, St John's Ambulance, Women's Refuge, a legal firm, The Labour Department, Police — Youth Aid officer, Social Welfare and the Family Counselling Centre. A doctor and a district nurse provided information and answered questions on sex education.

We visited David Henry Primary School for a week during transition time and assembled maths equipment for the primary students.



Remember the first week in May? - It rained, and when it wasn't raining it was hosing down! But did this daunt the spirits of our intrepid group - well only slightly. 40 pupils from Third to Seventh Form gathered on a nearly dry Sunday afternoon. Most were going for the first time, but gluttony for punishment saw Rouru Aiturau, Natalie Boss and Claire Weston-Arnold returning for their second visit - and committed masochism made Todd Edwards return a third time.

It rained from the time they left until they came back the next day.






