A few gentlemen decided they liked the 'high' life and arrived at the party in a limouosine and still dressed as penguins!


An excellent time was had by all at both functions and Sunday held more splendour with champagne breakfasts to face.






Morning Tea was very ably provided by three cheerful members of the Fifth Form Transition Class who kept workers and parents well lubricated with cups of tea and biscuits.

The school did well in the two day competitions losing outright only two matches out of the eight played. Our school being the only team entered which was exclusively a High School team


Highlights of the year were centuries by Paul Derham and Peter Albutt in this competition.




Most of us spent the trip home reasonably quietly, while others found enjoyment in taking pictures of others asleep.

Youth For Everest 1990

April 20th 1990, Judith Vanner, Lisa Robson and Jennifer Timmo left Auckland airport to spend a month in Nepal trekking to the top of the world.

Youth for Everest is an organisation set up to involve young New Zealanders with the Nepalese culture to give them a chance to help increase the standard of living of these people, to spread awareness of their environment, and, at the same time, to experience this different way of life.

Kathmandu was in the midst of riots at the time of the expedition and the girls experienced some of the terrifying upheaval of curfews and killings just to add to the excitement of their iourney.

The mountains were a great jump from Kathmandu – peaceful and serene, and the trek to Base Camp, lasting 13 days brought many different experiences for all three. Jennifer became sick with Jardia quite early on the trek and was forced down the mountain to regain her strength for a slower ascent. Through food sickness Judith became enclosed in the Gamma bag – quite an experience – and Lisa was

certain that she had seen a fire works display while on high altitude medication at Everest Base Camp.

The New Zealand climbers – Gary Ball, Rob Hall and Peter Hillary (who had walked with the group two days before) summitted on the morning of the 10th May. Judith and Lisa listened over the direct connection radio at Base Camp as Peter planted the Kiwi flag at the Top of the World, and talked to New Zealand live.

The main clean-up project was complete as they reached Base Camp, and all they could do was take photos of where the rubbish had once been. So after the successful summit it was back to the 13 up, with an average six-eight hours of walking. Each day down, as on the ascent, showed a totally different terrain. Base Camp to Grek Shep were amazing iceforms on the Khumbe Glacier that made the path quite dangerous especially if affected by altitude sickness. The next day Morrain Glacier – barren, then into the luscious forest areas of the river valleys filled with rhododenrons and musk deer. But the real attraction of the Himalayas and

Nepal was the beautiful people, so poor but so content with what they have. They met many strange and wonderful friends and people and saying goodbye forever at Lukia was a sad one. Then it was homeward bound with stops in old Kathmandu for the first shower in two weeks and an overload of pizza and chocolate, then Singapore and pioneer shopping and a soft bed to dream of home, and mountains that we left behind.







I battled through the storm of dust to land in the fover of the Bastille. I caught sight of the man - the one who had started the pounding with poles - and he immediately seized my attention. His brightly coloured clothes were new, not only in the sense of age, and yet he seemed familiar. I followed after him as he led an incensed wave of revolutionaries.

The sea seeped into the deepest realms of the Bastille, roaring in the joy of a brief moment of freedom. Cries of 'equality.' 'liberty' and 'freedom' resounded against the forbidding walls of the fortress of oppression.

The man pounded the corridors, ignoring the pleas for help from desperate prisoners. He was riding the crest of a wave of hatred, and his eyes sparkled in the delight of it.

I sped up in an effort to keep up with the frenzied wave. Again his familiarity nagged at me, but the uneasiness was soon left behind as I rounded into the room where the wave was about to crash.

I was so wrapped up in my sorrow, I didn't notice the shadow of the man casting over me. I looked up and saw a look of

annoyance on his face - I felt my body convulse as I realised that this man was not satisfied with a single death.

I came closer to the man, locked in morbid fascination. Suddenly a first came plummeting towards me -






