

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
Editor's Note

We wish her well and are sure that Mrs Keysers will find plenty to keep her busy in her retirement. All in all this has been a very eventful year with major repaints within our buildings, a visit from the Education Review Office and an unsettled Award Round coming on top of the normal pressures associated with school life. As a staff we are working hard, feeling positive but a holiday would be good!

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From the Principal

fter just one year as Principal of Forest View High School, it is appropriate and timely to reflect upon what has been achieved by Staff, Students and Parents in that time.

The list, I believe, is a very impressive one. As a Staff we have carried out a review of our strengths and weaknesses. Staff are taking part in many professional development activities, developing School Policies and planning for future needs. We are encouraging Students to stay on at School to further their skills and qualifications. Students progress automatically through the Senior School - we even have an 8th Form!

For 1993 we are extending the range of Senior Subjects available to cater for a wider range of Student needs.

A peer support programme has been introduced using Senior Students to work with incoming Third Formers to ensure their entry into the School is a smooth one.

Our major thrust has been Student Achievement. We believe strongly in a good working environment and our new assertive discipline programme not only encourages sound discipline but emphasises encouraging Student achievement through reward. Student achievement and effort is recognised through assemblies. This year we have introduced Form Level assemblies with Deans and Students being more actively involved in assembly organisation.

Able Students in the Junior School are able to take part in an extension programme which challenges them to extend their abilities, while a very strong special needs emphasis assists Students with learning difficulties.

The Sports Award Assembly and Luncheon was introduced last year and will continue to recognise the excellence that many of our Students achieve in Sport.

The Student Council has been a very active one this year and has made a major contribution to School life. Fundraising ventures have been carried out, murals painted and a radio station established.

Our School environment is undergoing improvements with increased planting of shrubs, the refurbishment of A Block and work commencing next on the painting of B and C blocks. We have increased significantly, the number of Computers in the School and in 1993 intend to increase Staff and Student awareness and use of Computer Technology.

Parents I think have been kept more informed about School events. Parents were involved in the review of School uniform, a Parent Support Group has been active this year, a Parent Handbook sent home, newsletters are regular, parents have been



made welcome in the School. An Open Day on Saturday morning with full Staff involvement has given parents an opportunity to come and see the School.

The Education Review Office visit earlier this year substantially supported the view that this is a good school. However, it is dangerous to be complacent. We must all seek to do better.

Next year our focus is to be developing programmes which challenge Students to set goals and achieve. The Staff must challenge themselves by setting professional goals which will benefit their Students.

I would like to place on record my thanks to all our Staff, teaching and non teaching, for their hard work and support and to the Students of 1992, my best wishes for the new year in 1993!



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wear the clothes of the opposite sex, and the tu-tu'! There were some untamed pads of skin and pure fat. (And hairy legs!) Second child-hood!



And who will be the helpless victim volunteering for the vacancy?




The Forest View A Netball Team


Our last adventure was to be the longest. We navigated our way (some of us not too successfully) to a great rock climbing spot.



On reaching the lodge located on a turn off further up from the Chateau we stowed our gear, setting ourselves later on for our little trek to Taranaki Falls.


It was fine until this point then the only rain hit us.
