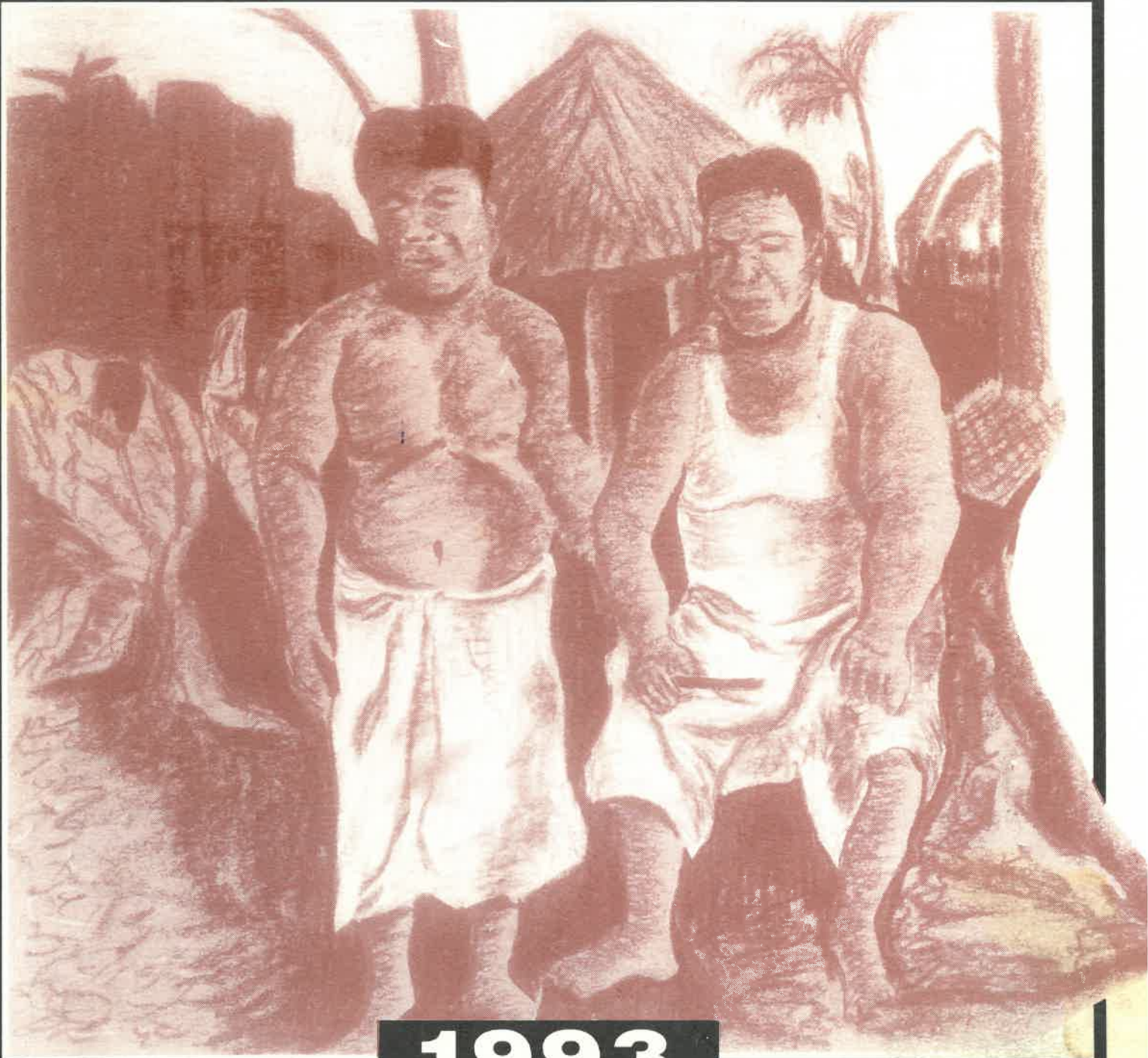

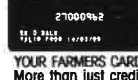

From the Principal

Another year has nearly passed and we can reflect on the achievements and the challenges that are ahead. Students are facing uncertain times. One thing that has become obvious however, is that Students are faced with the prospect of remaining at school for at least 4 or 5 years as the Government's policy is to raise the school leaving age to 17 from the present age of 16.

We have continued Policies begun earlier. Our focus has been on encouraging students to set goals, to offer a wide range of opportunities in academic, sporting and cultural goals.

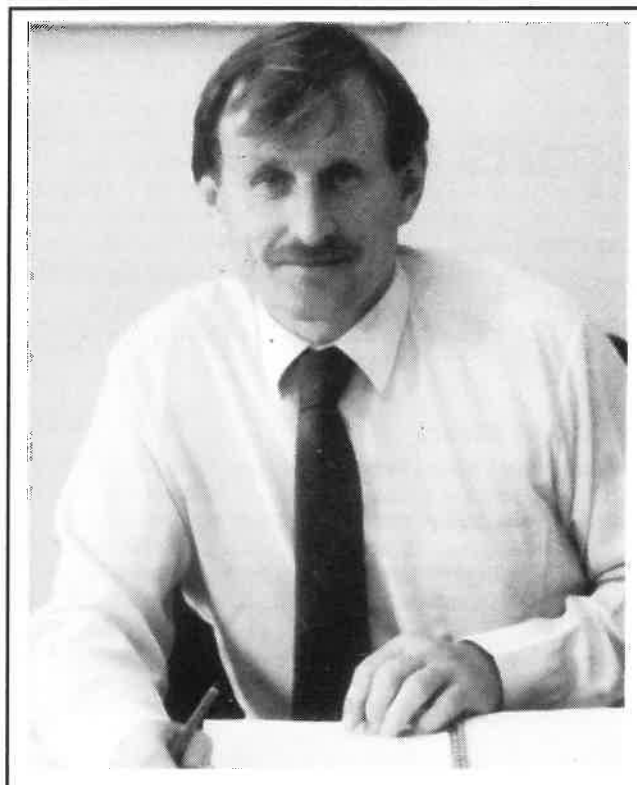
We encourage parents to come to school and work with us to do the best for their sons and daughters.

Young Enterprise Scheme

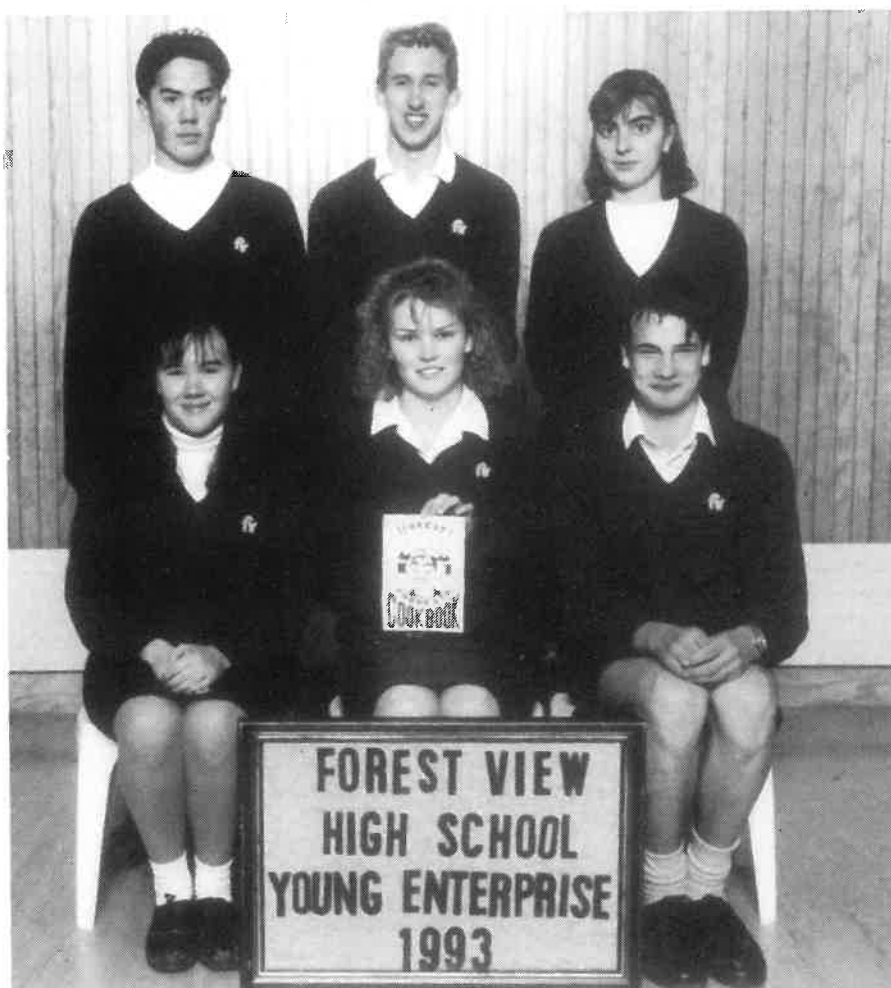

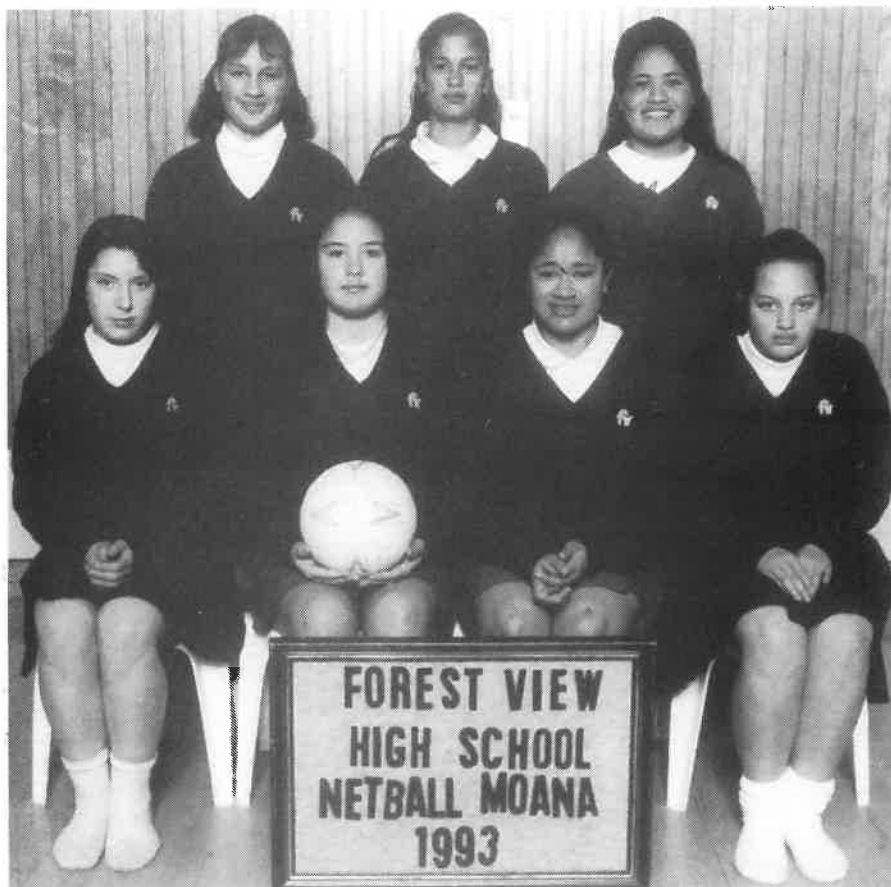

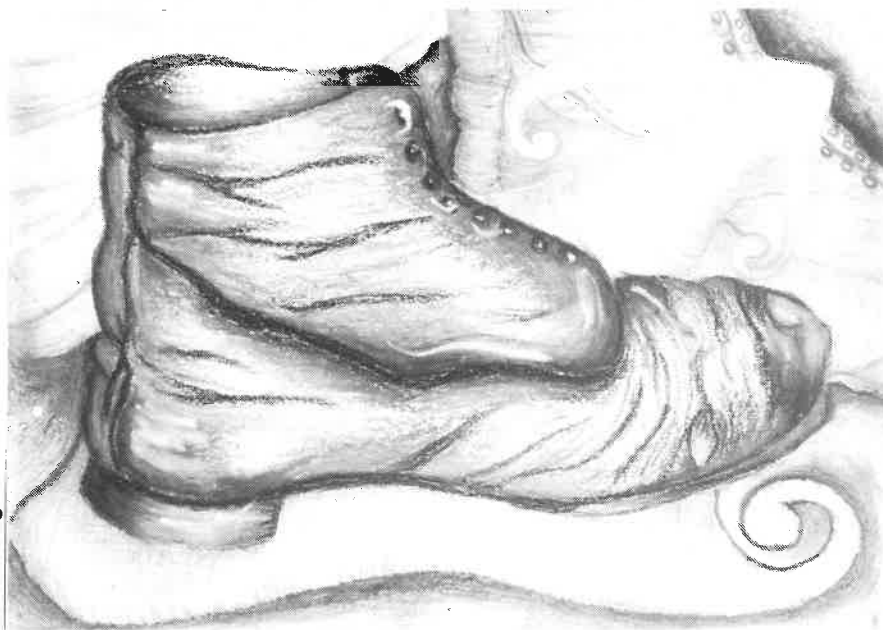

Alice Fearn: One of the quieter members of the team. Had a couple of lucky breaks up the wing. Did some good backup.

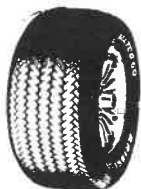

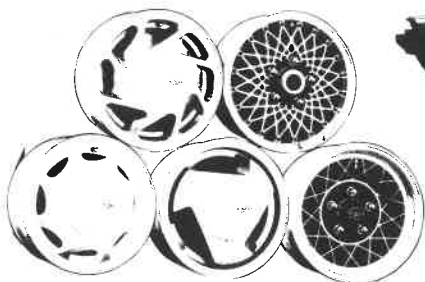

Leon Patrick – had a taste for something called a "Barracuda". Otherwise, left school due to the fact

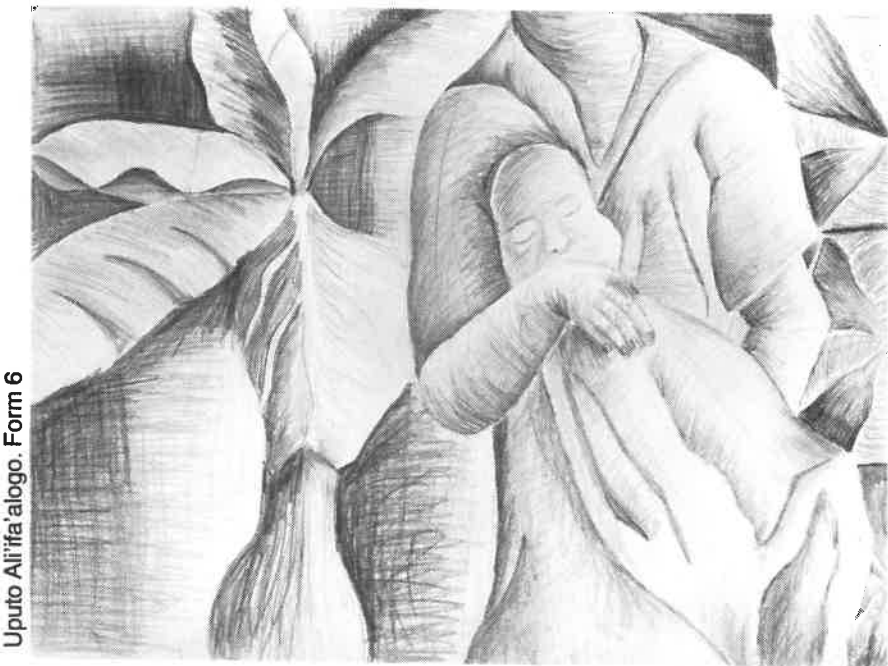
he hated it. An excellent goalie.

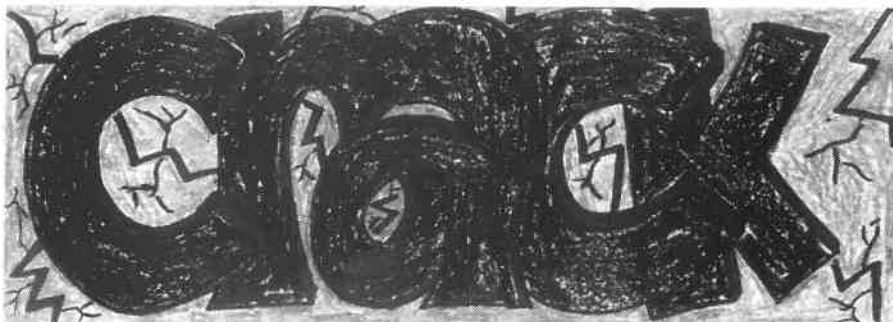
If our bowling line-up looked good, our batting line-up was even better and it was through our batting that we won. Next season we hope to have more games against teams throughout the Waikato.

With that sole desire fulfilled a few minutes later, we settled into the pattern that our host family followed, ate our tea and were tucked into bed for an early morning of playing sport,

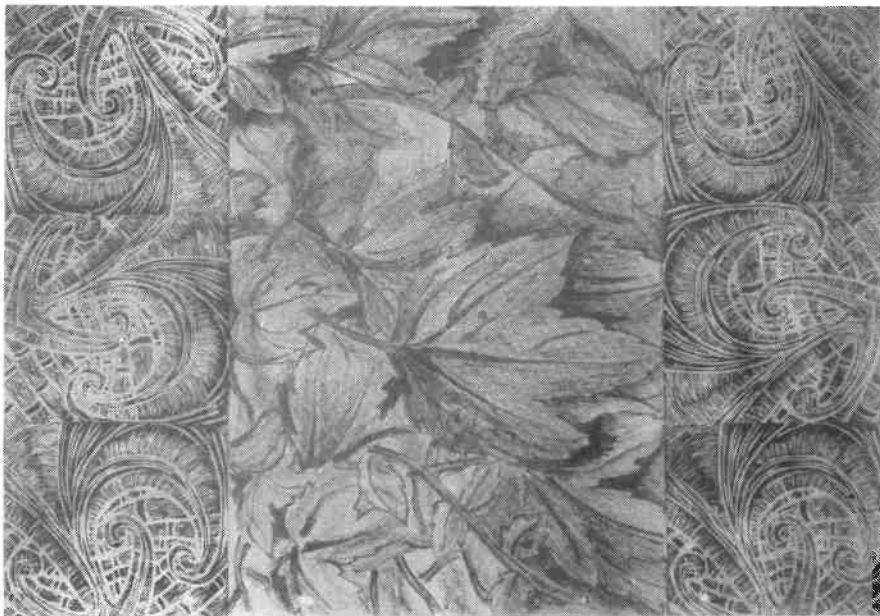
watching sport and talking sport.
