From the Principal

We live in a world of accelerating change and the challenge for us at Forest View High School is to offer a relevant education that will meet the needs of students as they move from school to the outside world.

The school is providing a good learning environment and programme for most of our students. The Education Review Office visited the school in Term 1 and the report was very complimentary of the school's management structures and teaching programmes.

There have been significant improvements in the school's buildings and resources. This year the gymnasium was refurbished and a fitness centre was attached to the gymnasium. The auditorium was also painted. Students' facilities have been improved with the upgrading of the common room, the building of seating and garden boxes outside C Block, basketball hoops replaced, trellising of the A Block courtyard. Mr Lewin and Mr Potoru have worked hard to make the school environment as attractive as possible. Students can play their role by looking after the amenities that have been provided for them. Considerable money has been spent in upgrading classrooms and improving teaching aids and resources. Workshops have been retooled and new machines installed while laboratories are being re-equipped and classrooms provided with white boards. Next year another computer suite will be built and new computers and word processors purchased for classroom use and a number of classrooms will be refurbished and new teaching resources provided.

I believe that there are many opportuni-

ties available for students at Forest View High School.

A great number of students in 1994 played sport for a very large number of school teams. A number of cultural and recreational activities such as drama, speech and chess were available. Students extended themselves by taking part in Mathematics, Science and English competitions.

The school supported students to go to holiday extension programmes and outdoor pursuits courses of various kinds. Students have the opportunity to strive for rewards and to develop leadership opportunities.

There is a line from the film *'The Dead Poets Society'* in which the teacher urges his students to 'seize the day!' In a sense this is what life is all about. New opportunities present themselves every day. Be positive, take responsibility for your learning and take advantage of the many activities that the school has to offer.

The challenge ahead for the staff at Forest View High School is to continue to develop the skills needed to make the necessary changes to curriculum and teaching approaches.

The next few years promise to be interesting to say the least. New curriculum and qualification changes are going to mean new approaches will be required to teaching and learning and we are developing strategies and programmes to try and meet that need.

The key factors that make for success in education is student attitude and parental support. Parents who recognise that education is vital to success in today's world, who ensure that their son or



daughter has the necessary equipment, who keep in touch with the teachers, who are positive, encouraging and involved, are giving their youngsters a good chance of success.

For the student there is a need to set clear goals and be focused on the future.

To those students who are leaving school this year, I wish you all the best for your future. Rest assured however, your education is not over! Learning is lifelong and you will find that wherever you go the expectation will be for you to continue acquiring new skills and attitudes.


For those returning in 1995, I look forward to seeing you next year.




Sports competitions at night were interesting, some people even game enough to lie down in front of the goal in order to win a game of hockey, while


7th Form Geography Trip

After stopping at various points up the lava flows, to do our transects, we finally


DAY 3: THE FINAL DAY (thank gawd)



Mrs McAlonan's Speech

When Mrs McAlonan left at the end of 1993 she delivered this speech to the staff:

A BIOLOGICAL RAMBLE INTO PHILOSOPHICAL TERRITORY

A school reminds me of a rope on which mussels grow.
