From the Principal

As I look back on 1995 it will be with mixed feelings; my last year as Principal of Forest View High School.

My overwhelming impression of Forest View High School will be a school which has been strongly served by a committed and dedicated staff. I am sometimes tempted to think that many students and parents tend to take for granted the great range of curricular and extra curricular activities provided by the school. I am writing this during the holidays in October, a time which saw a number of staff coming to school to take study classes while others helped me work on the school's strategic plan for 1996 and beyond. The great majority of teachers and other staff at Forest View High School are committed, competent and give much to the students at Forest View. Forest View I believe has much to offer its students. A diary of school events for 1995 shows Peer Support Training for seniors, Peer Mediation Training, 7th Form Leadership Camp, 6th Form Trip to Auckland, Outdoor Pursuits, drama – the Shakespeare Festival, debating, Maths, English and Science Competitions, the sports exchange to Taradale 4th Form Camp – I could go on.

New developments this year include – the formation of a Polynesian Cultural Group culminating in the Blessing of the Drums Ceremony at the end of term two, the appointment of a sports co-ordinator to increase the level of activities available to students at lunch time and after school.

In terms of the school's facilities, these were improved by the arrival of a 7th form common room and the continued upgrading of classrooms and classroom equipment.

Forest View High School has also moved forward in its curriculum and will in 1996 offer a module programme for 6th formers which includes a range of career, life skills as well as vocational. Many of these offer unit standards on the NZQA qualifications framework.

There are many challenges which lie ahead, but Forest View High School is well placed to provide students with a flexible programme suited to their needs and the demands of a modern economy.

Next year sees our roll grow to close to its maximum. We should have a school roll of approximately 740 students. Extra staff have been employed to start the school year.

A new Principal and Assistant Principal will be at the helm and I have every confidence that Forest View High School can go from strength to strength. In 1999 Forest View High School will be 25 years old. I look forward to coming back to meet staff, parents and students and to seeing the changes that undoubtedly will have been made.



Sixty-five students took part in the Australian Schools' English Competition. Almost all of them acquitted themselves very well and demonstrated that our students compare well to students from other schools in New Zealand.

Credit results were gained by Nidene Berridge, David Milne, Daniel Moore, Ben Rentoul, Sarah Luxford, Hayden Middlebrook, Paul Shattock, Ben Albert, John Fitzpatrick, Ellen Hausman, Phillip Noho, Nicola Page and Margaret Young. Graeme Edgeler and Chris Bretton gained Distinction passes which placed them in the top five percent of students in New Zealand.

Seventy of our students entered the Ngarimu Essay Competition and while we have yet to receive the results we have traditionally performed well in this competition.

We entered a team in the Jaycees Debating Competition and lost narrowly to Otorohanga High School in our first debate, and again lost narrowly to Te Awamutu College in our second debate. The team has learnt from the experience and will certainly continue to develop in skills in 1996.



Information Technology

This year a new curriculum department at Forest View was established. The Typing Department and the Computer Studies Department amalgamated to allow a more co-ordinated approach for management and planning for the future for students to use computers.

The Information Technology Department will continue to enhance the opportunities for all students in the School to learn how to make full use of computer technology for both personal use and the presentation of information within all curriculum areas.

Students are making full use of the computers to present their assignments using the computers. By making Introductory Computing a compulsory half year course for Form 3 students in 1996, students will gain confidence and knowledge of basic techniques to process information.

Forest View High School has a wide range of technology for processing information – electronic typewriters, word processors, IBM and MacIntosh computers. A large financial commitment has been made by the management of the school to enable well resourced computer areas to be available for all teachers and students in the school.

Her responsibility is for management of Unit Standards towards the National Certificates, information processing and use of IBM Computers. Mr B Dowdle has responsibility for technical matters of IBM computers within the school (including the administration computers), Mr N Griffiths is responsible for the MacIntosh computers. Others working in this area are Mrs Gibbons, Mrs Yukich and Mrs Stokes.



Pitmans Examination

Mathematics

New Initiatives taken In Maths Department

New Curriculum has been incorporated in the Schemes at Form 3-5 level since 1994. This year we have used a new curriculum approach at Sixth Form Certificate level. In 1995 we introduced a two year School Certificate programme and Practical Maths Course as an alternative programme to SFC academic course. In 1996 we are introducing a National Certificate Level 1 programme which caters for students who would have otherwise enrolled for a two year SC programme. Unit Standards at Level 2 will be incorporated into the Sixth Form Certificate course to enable students to gain credits for National Certificate.

Family Maths Programme

Since 1994 FVHS Maths Department has been offering a Family Maths Programme to Form 3 pupils' parents, at the beginning of the year for five weeks. The objective is to introduce parents to the New Mathematics Curriculum being taught in schools at present. Parents are given the opportunity to work with their children and with other parents giving them experience to the new approach to learning.

Professional Development

Staff have been taking In-Service training courses to upgrade themselves with the changes in curriculum and teaching styles. Mr Gary Judkins attended a Biennial Conference on Teaching of Mathematics during August. He came back very much enriched and enthused with ideas, strategies and materials which he has since shared with other staff in organised sessions. Mr Prasad, HOD, attended a Workshop on the New Initiatives and Unit Standards. Mrs Haugh attended the Gifted Children's Conference.

Science

Early in the year the Form 3 BP Technology Challenge Team competed in Rotorua and gained a first placing in one of four events "Dropping the Goods". The team consisted of Yukio Flinte, Timaru Davis, Angela Stowers, Amy Thomas, Zoe Reed, David Milne, Gareth Drake, Rebecca Miller, Katie Willoughby and Livia Hollins.

The Form 4 team recently competed in Hamilton and was placed fifth in the overall team placings and the school won the drawn prize of a "Lego Technic Set". Team members were: Jacqui Veth, Welmoet Deutz Ebeling, Jackie Scott, Jamie O'Donoghue, Sarah Luxford, Kurt Williams, Grant Patterson, Nikki Mapp, Kit Fearn and Mark Chappell.

A large number of students from Form 3 and 4 exhibited entries in the Waikato Science Fair held at the Showgrounds Building, Hamilton, in August and although all were of high quality Jarod Collins and Paul de Rijk were placed second in their exhibit class with their display of "Hydro Electric Power".

1995 saw some new developments in the Science Department. A major first being the Form 7 biology field trip to the New Zealand Prawn Farm at Wairakei Park. This is the only example of its kind in New Zealand and is a perfect example of applied biology in its field of aquaculture. As the Bursary prescription special topic extended to aquaculture this year, it was too good an opportunity to miss. Mr Clark organised a joint field trip with Bursary classes from Putaruru and Tokoroa High School (another first) in order to make the bus trip worthwhile. We had the resident biologist to ourselves all morning and

certainly should gain good marks in that section of the Bursary paper. 58 senior students attempted the Australian School Science competition with 13 getting certification. Special mention must go to Ben Albert and Chris Bretton who gained distinction certificates for being in the top 10% of the country. Well done. Let's see more seniors involved next year.

Geography

Geography from Form Five to Seven has gained in strength this year. In Form 5, an afternoon was spent visiting the forest to view forestry operations. This was guided by Mr Portegys and proved to be very interesting. A morning was spent by all classes on the Mathis's farm. The whole of the Form Five Geography classes went to Huntly to see coal mines first hand.

Form Six field work is carried out in Auckland, visiting some of the expensive areas like the house we observed with a swimming pool and a tennis court. The class also went around visiting some of the hot spots of the Taupo area.

Form 7 has been studying the local area and volcanism in the Central North island. The eruption of Ruapehu has added to the significance of their studies and earlier in the year they spent several days at Tongariro National Park carrying out field work for their bursary studies.

Next year brings some changes to the Geography programme as Mr Dowdle will not be teaching this subject and Ms Graham returns to teaching. Next year the organisation of the Social Sciences in the Fifth Form changes as students

no longer will have to study a social science - this has the added benefit though that students will be able to take two social sciences if they wish.

Social Studies

Social Studies is taught from Form 3 to Form 5. This year has seen quite a few changes in the staff in the Social Studies Department. Ms Graham has been on leave for this year and her place has been taken by two new staff, Miss Chemis and Mr McIvor. They have taught quite a number of Social Studies classes between them. This year has seen the continued development of the Social Studies units that have been taught for the last two years. Next year will see many changes as staff are now undergoing courses and starting to write new units for the "new" Social Studies which will be introduced from next year. One of the major changes will be the teaching of units leading to the School Certificate examination in Social Studies which will start in 1997.

One of the highlights of the Fourth Form was the Careers' trip to the Careers' Expo in Hamilton. This was timed to fit in with the Careers' unit that all students complete. This helped students to find information about Careers they might be interested in and to find out what subjects they might need in future years at school.

Technical Department

1995 saw Mr Macdonald joined by Mr Burr in the bowels of B Block. Industrious they toiled to teach students the skills required in the workshop.

Meanwhile, poor Mr Griffiths worked to instill the rudiments of Graphics into hordes of Third Formers.

The pressure became too great for Mr Macdonald as the year progressed. Elated at the prospect of holidays, he failed to observe a large tanker and spent Term IV in hospital and recuperating.

For Mr Burr, it was instant promotion - first year teacher to HOD.

We hear he's applying for Mr Lee's job now!

Form Five History

The highlight of the Form Five History year (other than the two fabulous new teachers) was the Waiouru Army Museum trip. While the 8am start from school proved too early for Maria Brighthouse the trip was well worth the effort.

Although the bus trip was quite long, the driver kind of grumpy and the cafe a total rip off, there were more exciting things at the Army Museum. From guns to movies, tanks, stories about war and even a greenstone wall, the trip let us learn more about New Zealand's military past and even find a few ancestors. All in all the trip was excellent and more than just a 'day off school'.

Throughout the year both classes have worked extremely hard to cover all topics while still managing to enjoy themselves along the way. Although a healthy level of inter class competition existed with each class battling for supremacy, I'm sure that both classes wish Mr McIvor well with his new position at Auckland Grammar next year.



Special Needs

We are proud of our efforts to provide an appropriate educational environment at Forest View for each individual who has special learning needs. Our key role is to ensure that all our students are able to take advantage of all opportunities available and to encourage a positive learning environment in which any disadvantages can be redressed. Achievement to the highest possible level is what we desire.

During this year we have been catering for an increasing number of students encompassing a broad spectrum of special needs. These include students with special abilities, specific learning difficulties, special learning needs within related areas as diverse as cultural socio-economic, health, English as a second language. We have endeavoured to provide an environment in which academic, social, cultural and physical needs are met.

To ensure that achieving the highest levels is possible we have provided extra assistance to remediate learning difficulties, either individually or in small groups, some of these have been short term needs, some for the entire year.

Greater emphasis has been placed on the development of individualised programmes with the appropriate resources to meet the learning styles and abilities within all classes. We aim to ensure all our students can realise their full potential.

Through the Targeted Funding for Educational Achievement we have endeavoured to ensure equity for all

students. We believe all students are of equal worth and ensure that the school practices seek to achieve equitable outcomes both within this school and comparative to students across the rest of New Zealand. Equity means fairness and justice. This school wishes to broaden the outlook of all individuals to opportunities and provide the necessary resources, both tangible and intangible so that this is possible.

This year, we have been committed to equity within the school and have been very fortunate to gain an excellent Teacher Aide whose involvement has been to assist students and teachers within classroom settings so that time can be given to all students.

Before students arrive in Form 3 this department works closely with contributing schools to identify those with special needs and abilities. Upon arrival a variety of tests are given to screen students in Reading, Listening, Mathematics and Study Skills. As a result further individualised testing takes place so that as much as possible is known about a student's learning and remediation required, eg, this year 45 Third Form students were individually tested. Class profiles were given to classroom teachers to enable them to cater for individuals within their subject area. Throughout the year, at all levels of the school, students are referred for varying reasons including assistance with study skills and examination preparation.

To ensure Equity within the school.

support has been available for families facing financial difficulties and for students to fulfil opportunities in many areas, eg, attendance at extension holiday courses, drama school, Outdoor Pursuits, the theatre. We endeavoured also to make sure no students were excluded from camps, subject or career related visits for financial reasons.

A further support to FVHS in catering for the special needs of our students is that which we have received from the Correspondence School. Seventy-eight students have been able to take subjects which for varying reasons they would have been unable to pursue, eg, because of clashes in our timetable, the desire to study subjects we are unable to offer because of very small numbers, or, the desire to take a subject at a higher or lower level than they are currently studying. We are provided with excellent service and have a very close relationship with our liaison teacher. We are now able to track students through a computerised system. Because we are lucky to have this support, all students work on contract and high demands are placed on them. There is an expectation that goals and deadlines will be met. Students must be individually motivated. Alongside normal academic subjects a further 15 students have been on individualised programmes streamlined to meet their needs. It has been very pleasing to see the successes this year among students with special needs and abilities. To have students striving to reach their individual potential, is our goal.



Careers

The changing patterns within the workforce and the resultant changes that polytechnics and universities have made to cope with them has meant that the Careers Department within Forest View High School has also had to undergo changes to keep up with the times.

As more and more degrees are offered at Polytechnics, as more training providers come onto the market, as fee increases are happening across the board and as changes are occurring in the format of apprenticeships, the choices students have to make on leaving school have become increasingly difficult.

With the leaving age going to 17 in 1996 and student grants not being available until the age of 18, it is becoming more important for students to make wise and informed choices while still at school.

In answer to these demands, the Careers Department has made career education more available and have extended career education to the younger students at school. All 4th and 6th form students went to the Careers Expo held at Hamilton in June. This was followed up in 4th Form Social Studies classes and 6th Form career lessons.

In mid-August a very successful Careers Evening was held at the school that saw over 350 people in attendance. As students would shortly be required to make subject choices for 1996 the Heads of Departments were present to answer questions parents and students had about their subjects. We also had a wide variety of local business people who kindly gave up their time to make themselves available to answer questions and queries on their careers and businesses.

We were fortunate to have representatives from the three local polytechnics – Bay of Plenty, Waikato and Waiariki which were able to give people up to date information for 1996. The information that the students gained on that night definitely made re-enrolling an easier job this year.

Within the school the Careers Room is always available and it is full of continually updated career information. There are also two software packages. Quest has all of the courses available within New Zealand on it. Careerquest helps individuals make appropriate career choices based on their interests and abilities. These programmes are on eight different computers throughout the school.

In an attempt to keep up with the continual changes, Mrs Slade has attended University update courses this year. Mrs Hein spent three days in the Air Force as well as attending six different Polytechnic update dates.

It has been a busy year and with the government proposing placing a greater emphasis on career education next year looks like a busier one still.

Guidance 1995

The approach to Guidance at Forest View has been re-vamped and will be different in 1996. In order to help both students and parents/caregivers cope with the many changes in education, especially those related to qualifications, forms will be re-organised into Vertical Tutor Groups. There will be about 6 year 9 (3rds), 6 year 10 (4ths), 5 year 11 (5ths), 5 year 12 (6ths), and 4 year 13 (7ths) in each Tutor Group. There will be four 'Lake' Groups (Arapuni, Whakamaru, Ohakuri and Maraetai) and each Tutor Group will belong to a Lake.

Students will stay in the same Tutor Group from Year 9 (3rds) through to year 13 (7ths) and will have the same teacher-leader throughout.

This means that parents will not have to get to know a new Form Teacher each year and the Tutor-Leaders will be able to get to know the students in their care very well. Students will also stay in the same Lake Group, so parents and students will be able to get to know their Lake Leader, or Dean, and there will be continuity of care from the Lake Leaders.

Students will still have time allocated each week for pastoral matters and will be able to develop their leadership skills as they get to know their Tutor Group members. Members of families will be put into the same Lake Group but not the same Tutor Group.

Lake Leaders are:

Arapuni – Mrs Clark

Ohakuri – Mrs Sommerville

Whakamaru – Mrs Crum

Maraetai – Mrs Priscott

There will also be a Junior Administration Dean (Mrs Stokes) and a Senior Administration Dean (Mrs Gibbons).

These changes will lead to great stability and continuity of care for students and will mean their progress will be monitored more closely and guidance will be more accurately targeted.

Secret Admirers Week





Our instructions were, "Make sure the Roadies know what you're using for sound. No pointing mikes at the wedges. Any smoking or drinking on premises and stage diving means


immediate disqualification." Back in the room we were hyped up and were quickly irritated by anything anyone said.




ON THE FIELD
