Message from the Principal



Tihei mauri ora! Tena Kotou Katoa. Náku te rourou. Nau te rourou. Ka ora te manuhiri. Kia Orana. Talofa Lava. Greetings to you all.

When I arrived at Forest View in January this year I was immediately impressed with the very positive feeling amongst the staff, who made me feel very welcome. This was soon confirmed when the students returned to school. I knew straight away that this was a good school.

This feeling has been confirmed to me in many ways throughout the year. I have been very impressed with the many opportunities that are offered to Forest View students, and the way they take them up. A highlight of the year was the visit from the Education Review Office at the end of Term Three. Their report stated that "the school provides a quality learning environment for students with a notably positive tone at both school and classroom levels. Achievement is acknowledged and celebrated and board and staff are unrelenting in their promotion of high standards of work and behaviour." ERO concluded that "students at the school are provided with extensive opportunities to develop their academic, social, cultural and sporting abilities. Levels of achievement in those areas where achievement information is available are generally above expectations. The strong governance and leadership of the school and the dedication of staff to the needs of students should ensure that their progress and achievement continue to be enhanced during their time at Forest View High School." This was a very good report indeed. The challenge is now there for us to keep improving this already high standard.

This has been a great year for our cultural and sporting groups. On the cultural side, our Maori Culture Groupu Te Piringatahi are going from strength to strength and are looking forward to a trip to Asia in January.

The Polynesian Club have reached an impressive standard of performance in a very short time, and look great in their new costumes. The School Choir haqs also grown in strength, and our entry in the Auckland Stage Challenge came home with four awards. We are having a Junior Production for the first time at the end of the year. On the sporting side, the school has entered teams in several codes in regular competition. Highlights have included the First XV Rugby trip to Surfers Paradise, the Under 15 Rugby team being Waikato Champions and the First XIII Rugby League team qualifying for the National Knock-out tournament. Many pupils have gained representative status, and placings in national competitions.

Academically, school students received a fine set of results in Maths, Science and Technology competitions, and we look forward to School Certificate and Bursary results.

This year we introduced modules to the Senior School. These have been a great success and students have been able to gain credits on the National Qualifications Framework. Next year the availability of modules and the great array of courses will be greatly extended, and we look forward to Core Music and Art classes at the third form level. All students will be able to study courses which meet their needs and in which they will have success. We will also be running some classes before and after school so that students have more choices.

The school buildings are being continually upgraded and next year we should have a new heating system and major work done on the prefabs.

I have been very impressed with the calibre of the Board of Trustees and the Staff, and with the level of parent and Whanau support. My thanks to all for a great year. To the students, keep up the good work, and aim for the best at all times. For those leaving school, I wish you every success in your future lives.

The Council was chaired by Glenn MacPherson and Lisa Edgar, with Eboni Frear as Secretary and Andrea MacDonald as Treasurer. Within the Council various sub-committees were set up, with varying degrees of success.

Our Social and Mufti committees helped with the running and organising of these events, whereas our S.A.D.D. (Students Against Drunk Driving) committee planned the recent mock-crash and guest speakers for assemblies.

The Uniform committee came up with the changes to the current uniform being introduced, with the Environment committee overseeing litter duty and working on the infamous "Bus Shelter". Senior Workday was our biggest money raiser, with over \$3,400 coming in. Over the year a percentage of money has been allocated to various sporting and cultural activities, such as the 1st XV's dress uniform for their Australian trip, the Junior Bovs Volleyball transportation to tournaments, and the Drama Club. There is still a substantial amount left, with plans to spend it on upgrading the present Library couches, the Cultural Clubs' travel expenses, and a percentage to two junior members of our school competing in the Pan Pacific Athletic Championships in Australia at the end of the year. Thanks must go to Mrs Sommerville (Teacher in Charge) and all Councillors who regularly attended meetings.





AFS Intercultural Programmes

THE WIDE HOUSE OF THE WORLD Mission Statement

AFS New Zealand promotes peace and understanding among the people of the world through programmes of intercultural learning. Hápei ai a AFS Aoteroa i te rangimarie me te orotau i waenga iwi o te ao má te whakawhitiwhiti o ngá akonga o koei me étahi atu whenua. Dr Wayne Edwards, Professor of Education at Massey University states: "Making the decision to apply to become an AFS student is one of the most exciting and far-reaching choices a teenager might make and can certainly open the door of opportunity. New experiences abound: new family, school, culture, foods, friends, languages, beliefs. Global Education is a crucial part of education for the future in our complex but ever-shrinking world." AFS began by exchanging just 51 students from 10 countries. Today this has grown to 10,000 global exchanges each year in 55 countries. 5000 New Zealand students have had the opportunity to become global citizens and 3000 students have been hosted. None of these students could have had this unique chance without two vital ingredients. The first is the Host families willing to open their homes and their hearts. The second is schools like Forest View. It is in schools that friends are made, language skills improved, academic lessons learned, sporting and cultural opportunities offered. Forest View has provided the opportunity to many students since the early

 $1980\ensuremath{^{\prime\prime}}$ s. 60 students have gone away from the school and 53 students have been hosted.

When did AFS begin exchanging students? Why? The first exchange of students was nearly 50 years ago soon after World War II. The men who began the organisation were ambulance drivers who had volunteered in both World War I and II to provide a needed service in helping the wounded on both sides of the battlefield survive the conflict that tore apart their nations. Those ambulance drivers showed a real commitment to the AFS core values, including the worth and dignity of all people regardless of their nationality. After the war these men felt there had to be a better way. They saw the futility of war. Their vision was to build a more peaceful world. They believed the way to achieve this was by giving young people the opportunity to learn to know the people of another country and culture by living in a family, attending school and becoming part of the community they lived in. The AFS motto began then and still stands today:

"Walk together, Talk together, All you peoples of the earth. Then and only then, Shall you have Peace."

Do you know what AFS means? It means Another Fat Student. Yes! I put a lot of weight just eating pies, fish and chips, burgers, etc. I love the NZ food! It is so yummy!

Now I can't believe it. My year has almost gone! I don't want to go home, but I do want to go. Do you understand? No! I don't understand either, I'm really confused. I just know I miss my mum! To be an AFS student is a really good experience. You learn heaps. Not just about another culture or language. Hi! My name is Olov, and I am going to tell you about the differences in my home country (Sweden) and New Zealand, plus one or two other things.

There are a lot of differences between my country and New Zealand, so I'll just tell you about the main ones and a couple of totally irrelevant ones. To start off the temperature is slightly unevenly proportioned. For instance last winter my hometown had an average of -27°C. It so happens that Sweden's winter is the same time as New Zealand's summer. So when I landed in Auckland, 15 January 1996, I came from -27° to +27°C. Take my word for that, it was a bit of a shock. I really miss the cold, but, a very good part about not getting the cold is that you don't have to shovel the snow away in order to get to school.

Another rather large difference is school. Not only the rather insignificant difference that the school is ONE building and holds about 2000 students. But also the way you are expected to behave. In a Swedish school you would call your teacher by their first name. The teacher would level with you in a discussion. In short they would treat you as the young adult you are. You are also entitled to be away 25% of the school year. There are no uniforms and no detention. If you decide to misbehave you will be sent out of the classroom and it is all your own loss.

But here in New Zealand the schools are smaller and spread out which I find rather soothing for my taste. The major thing I don't exactly agree with is the way students have to behave towards teachers. Compared to Sweden it seems like teachers are like gods or the royal family. It seems like students must just serve and obey, which is a very different concept to that in Sweden. Teachers have more control over making students do whatever the teacher wants instead of making choices for themselves.





FIRST XV

Overall, the 1996 season was a great success with the team members, coaches and management making many friends – it will be a year to remember for all of us.


AUSTRALIAN TRIP





I guess that's what you get when your mother is a coach.



BP Technology Challenge



Mathematics

Mathematics classes this year were taught by Mr Prasad (HOD), Mr Judkins, Ms Hollis, Mr McGregor, Mr Griffiths, Mrs Yukich, Mrs Mace, Mrs Wilton and Mr Ford. Mr Judkins was appointed assistant Head of Department in Term 4 and our Department Head Mr Prasad has been granted a one year leave of absence for 1997. We incorporated the New Curriculum at all levels from year 9 to Year 13. Bursary (New Prescription) will be examined this year for the first time

Skills analysis tests at Years 9, 10 and 11 have been developed to identify talents and learning gaps. For example, a Year 9 Extension programme was highly successful with 13 students chosen to participate. They will be taking the Year 11 School Certificate class next year. Barriers to learning were identified and actions were taken as much as time and resources allowed. More resources have been acquired and some developed with the aid of task force workers

The ERO report stated that "assessing and evaluating student achievement is well advanced in the mathematics department and is proving valuable in determining the extent of student progress in various elements and the effectiveness of particular teachers." Our department leads the school in offering senior students extra help during lunchtimes, after school, and during holidays. For example, during the second week of Term 3 holiday, three 2 hour sessions per day were offered and 60% of our students sitting School Certificate took advantage of these Tutorials taught by Mr Judkins and Ms Hollis. Family maths programme was offered again this year and it gives Year 9 parents the opportunity to work with their children and with other parents to experience the New Curriculum approach to learning. Unfortunately, this five week programme did not run because not enough parents showed interest. It will be offered again next vear.

Professional Development included a Learning Through Language course and workshops with our Regional Mathematics Adviser. Four staff attended Maths Applied courses ran by the national co-ordinator, subsequent to introducing these programmes next year. Also, the department attended the Bay of Plenty Maths Association Annual Conference in Whakatane that focused on the needs of secondary school Mathematics teachers.

We have had a very active year with a record number of students entering the two annual mathematics competitions. Seven out of fifty-five students who participated gained a Certificate of Merit or better. A total of 11,800 New Zealand students from 252 schools entered. Students gaining a Certificate of Merit are in the top 15%, Top One Hundred Certificate in the top 2% and Outstanding Award in the top 1% of their age group competitors.




Social Sciences

Geography

Forest View High School welcomed three new Geography teachers this year. Miss Crosby, Ms Hollis and Mr Steyn. Once again, the Geography students of Forest View High School have completed an enlightening year.

The fifth form classes were fortunate to participate in three field trips. Half a day was spent by each class at the Mathis dairy farm, as a part of their resources study. These students also spent an afternoon observing forestry operations courtesy of Mr Portegys and CHH Forests. Finally, in term four there was a trip to the Huntly Coalmines which was most informative. The students also learned about population studies and natural hazards as a part of their course. The sixth form Geographers went on two field trips. They carried out their fieldwork for their urban studies unit by studying suburbs of Auckland. Then later in the year they visited various locations around the Central Volcanic Plateau as a part of their study of the area. During the year, the students also completed units of work about tropical rain forests, Brazil and Great Britain

The seventh form studied volcanism in the Central North Island. As a part of this unit, the students spent several days at Tongariro National park carrying out fieldwork for their bursary studies. The form seven course also included studies of tourism and planning.





Special Needs

Forest View High School has aimed to ensure through this year that all students had an equitable opportunity to achieve to their maximum potential and remove as many barriers to learning as possible. This has included providing learning programmes and financial support to a wide range of students. Through the Targeted Funding for Educational Achievement we have provided Teachers Aide time to support teachers and students within the classroom and ensure the Library remains open for longer hours. A group of students were supported to attend a holiday seminar for able students at Auckland University. Keyboards bought for music students and a piano teacher brought to the school to support our students studying Performance Music.

Buses have been subsidised for senior students to go to drama productions in Hamilton, Year 11 Geography to go on a field trip to Huntly and individual students have received support for sporting, cultural and academic activities. We have aimed to make sure no students are excluded from participating in the life of the school for financial reasons and this has included the purchasing of uniforms and necessary books and equipment.

Special Needs within this school includes all students who are disadvantaged and this includes students unable to get the subject choices they may want often through timetable clashes or a need to study at higher or lower levels than their normal programme.

This year we have had fifty students studying a variety of Correspondence subjects to cater for these needs. These students are expected to meet deadlines and must be self-motivated to succeed. Year 11 French students were able to have lengthy conference calls talking to their teacher in Wellington this year. Some lasted up to an hour! Also studying by correspondence are those Junior sgtudents on individual English programmes.

Three teams were entered in the Future Problem Solving competition. The noisiest team turned out to be best. The teams were beginning to make major improvements just when the final assessment took place. These students should be encouraged to do well in 1997. A Study Centre has been run prior to mid-year and external exams. It is great to see those who turn up but really disappointing that so few students take the opportunity of this. It is the chance to have study support from teachers in a range of subject areas.

An exciting new development this area of the school has been represented is the Tokoroa Pacific Islands Community Liaison Project which will begin 1997 and continue through 1998. This project is to provide the Tokoroa Pacific Islands school age children, their families and their schools with the support and resources to strengthen the links between home and schools. these strengthened links are to lead to enhanced learning and achievement by Pacific Islands children.

This school works hard to break down any barriers, seek out new opportunities for students. We really want to make sure ach student has the chance to reach their individual potential.

From 12' x 9' to Flash Facilities

Ever tried to fit four parents, two students and a guidance counsellor into a 12' x 9' room? (not to mention a desk, a filing cabinet and two cupboards). Group work and counselling as well as mini meetings can now occur in comfortable surrounds, and for those students who are upset of 'stressed out' there is a hot drink as well as a listening ear available. The Career Information room opposite is specially equipped and offers the most up-to-date information and an efficient service to students who are exploring their future career plans. So now, whatever your need, you can be assured of comfortable facilities and modern surroundings. See you there!
