MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Tihei mauri ora! Tena Koutou Katoa. Naku to rourou. Nau to rourou. Ka ora te manuhiri. Kia Orana. Talofa Lava. Greetings to you all.

Forest View High School has always had a reputation for academic results and for student participation, and this year has been no exception.

We were very proud to receive our results from the 1996 School Certificate and Bursary examinations (FVHS students gained five A Bursaries and 12 B Bursaries). When our school is compared to other Decile 3 schools in New Zealand, and to other schools in our district, we compared very favourably. Students have also achieved well in the Australian competitions in Mathematics, English, Science and Future Problem Solving. It is important to remember that academic pursuit is our primary aim, and it is important that we therefore provide a wide range of courses in our school so that all of our students can reach their academic potential.

I believe that Forest View High School is one of the leading schools in New Zealand in providing a range of courses to meet student needs. Our teachers are to be congratulated for their hard work and foresight which make it possible for students to study for and complete a choice of 12 National Certificates while they are at school, and to partially complete a choice of nine others. All of our students should leave school with at least one National Certificate. We have made it a priority to continue



to offer a wide range of academic courses as well, and so our top students will be able to leave school with a Bursary and possibly two or three National Certificates. Our flexible senior school module programme of short-term courses and our range of year-long courses makes this possible.

This year has seen before-school and after-school classes in operation. Congratulations to all of those students who have managed to get here for 7.30am starts, especially over the winter. Your commitment has been admirable. This innovation has also enabled us to offer more subjects and has introduced shared classes with Tokoroa High School students.

Forest View also places a priority on providing students with plenty of opportunities in a positive learning environment, and the level of student participation has again been very pleasing.

We have had a large number of teams engaged in regular competition in many different sporting codes. 1997 saw Forest View have a record 11 netball teams. I have enjoyed watching nearly all of our teams play a game this winter season, and it was great to see the representative status and placings in national competitions.

Students involved in our major production had a lot of fun and produced a very entertaining show of high calibre. Polinetia Fa'atasi have gone from strength to strength and are off to Australia at the end of this year. It has been great to see a School Band in operation this year. I enjoyed their entertainment on Open Day. Te Piringatahi have done themselves proud in farewelling Mr Whatarau and

It is now a place I'm afraid of, a place I'm unhappy to be a part of, a place I'm not proud to call home. A child going through the scraps to eat, a teenager killing for one puff of dope, an adult stealing to feed the family, and an elderly person shivering lying in a gutter they call home. This is what will happen to Tokoroa if we carry on letting ourselves be influenced by people who have no respect or pride for themselves and for the people around them.

This has caused major problems in Tokoroa, such as two kids losing a loving father, grandchildren losing a loving grandfather and many people being killed just because they were kind or because they walked a friend home to make sure they got there safely. If this is what it takes to get killed in Tokoroa, then why should we be kind to the next person who comes by, or why should we walk a friend home at night? Why? Because this shows that we have mana and will not be hated for unnecessary things that cause another person pain. Some people like to do this in Tokoroa, but that just shows that they're the biggest cowards of all and that they not only give themselves a bad name but give us a bad name as well.

So before you hang around a person like that, think, is this a person to be friends with? Or will this person turn my town against me because Tokoroa would be a great place if people like that took their anger out

by talking to a councillor or bettering themselves first, instead of judging others. As soon as you get out of this cycle Tokoroa would no longer be your enemy, it will become a place you can live in, so let's all help each other out of this cycle so no one will be able to criticise this town.

But that is your decision and your decision will determine Tokoroa's future, so make it a decision that you and your children and children's children will be able to live with forever.



AFS Celebrates 50 Successful Years of Student Exchange Programmes

Fifty years have passed since the first AFS students experienced life as part of another family, another culture and gained for themselves another place in the world to call home.

Many people do not realise that AFS had its beginnings as the American Field Service, a group of volunteer ambulance drivers who had served in France during World War I and then again further afield in World War II. This group of young volunteers would not go to fight a war, but, they felt they could provide a field ambulance service to the war wounded. At the end of WW2 the returning drivers held a reunion and at this decided that future conflict might be avoided if greater understanding existed between nations and the cultures within them. In 1947 AFS as we know it today was born, established so that young people with open minds could experience the opportunity the AFS Drivers had - to learn to understand people from another country and culture on a personal basis.

The mission, "Hapei ai a AFS Aotearoa i te rangimarie me to orotau i waenga iwi o te whakawhitiwhiti o nga akonga o koei me etahi atu whenua." (AFS New Zealand promotes peace and understanding among people of the world through programmes of intercultural learning.

Thanks and see you soon! Gracias y hasta pronto!



So far all is going really well and I'm sure that the experience is going to change my life.



Kurayoshi Exchange 1997

Towards the and of 1996, David Milne, Matthew Barraclough and I, along with two students from Tokoroa High School were lucky enough to be accepted to participate in a three week intercultural exchange at our sister school, Kurayoshi High School in Japan.

Months of extra Japanese study, numerous letters from our Host Families, orientation meetings and suitcase lists still could not prepare us totally for the experience we were about to encounter. In June this year, one week before the end of Term 2, departure time had arrived. The trip up to Auckland was filled with tension, but excitement at the same time too.

On our arrival at Kansai Airport, Osaka, the two things we noticed most were the heat and the large numbers of people with black hair and who spoke Japanese! We were met by two teachers, the Assistant Principal and a driver from our host school, Kurayoshi Agricultural School, who had travelled to meet us. We piled our

We hadn't heard about these so we decided to give it a go. This was a 'puri-kura', a photo sticker machine and soon 16 stickers of us came out the bottom. We were quite thrilled and from then on, every 'puri-kura' we saw, we were putting our money in and saying 'cheese' or 'chizu' as the Japanese say.



During our stay we visited the Mayor, the Head of Education in the area and also went on a day trip to Tottori where we looked at the famous sand dunes and did some shopping.

The school we attended was an agricultural based school set on 40 hectares with pear trees, grape vines and numerous other agricultural and horticultural products, (even pigs and cows). We were set up with a 'buddy' who showed us around and who we usually sat by in classes. One interesting encounter was when we had an agricultural exercise time tabled. We had never heard of this before, but soon adapted and found ourselves in gumboots, jackets and hats in the school's factory sifting for pears in a drum of fermenting something!

We found it really challenging to begin with when we first went to our new homes. There were so many things we were not used to. We had 'futons', mattress-like beds, which we packed away during the day and got out each night. It also took a while to get used to the food.

We all really enjoyed the time spent with our Host Families and friends at Kurayoshi and all the places we got to see in Japan. Japanese people are really hospitable, honest and caring. It was a great experience and I would say that students should take the opportunity to travel to Japan if they get the chance. It is really worth it!

CLONING

I'm sure most of you have been told you have your mother's eyes or your father's nose, but what if this was really true. What if you were an exact replica of your mother or father or older sister or brother. What if you were basically their younger twin. What if you were a clone?

A lot of the world was really buzzing when Dolly the first cloned mammal was born, but they were also talking about the moral implications. If they can clone a sheep, why not a human? It's basically the same thing isn't it? A mammal.

Think of this situation - two parents decide to clone their daughter who has leukemia. If by biological chance she had been born with a twin, the twin could have provided all the bone marrow she needed. But she wasn't and now her parents are going to see if they can't do something about it. This new child though will have been created for the sole purpose of keeping the original alive. This second child may be well cared for, but possibly not well loved. She could be treated as a second class sibling for the rest of her life.

Besides this though who would actually consider cloning themselves? People who think the world could use more of themselves. People so chipper that they have no qualms about bestowing their inner life on a dozen or so members of the next generation, people with high self-esteem, people you could say are big headed. Do we even want more of these people?

If something like this happened who's to say we wouldn't have another race relation problem on our hands, or in this case a clone relation problem. The clones bred to almost perfection could become the higher authority while us "normal birth" people could become the lower class. Even if the world could agree on who would serve as humanity's plates of perfection, nobody knows if the copies will turn out the same as the originals. If a person with the potential for excellence does not find the right environment they may not blossom. A scientific genius beaten as a child may become a mad genius. A great artist introduced to alcohol at a young age may merely become a drunk. A thousand steps have to take place in a child's upbringing before they end up in the right place. One step could stop the road towards a Nobel prize and dead end in a

make shift shack in the Montana Woods like the one that held the troubled soul believed to be the unabomber.

Who is to say though which people are the samples of the perfect human being. If cloning existed a century or two ago we would have cloned men with strong backs and women with broad pelvises. During the industrial age though we switched from muscle power to brain power. If we let all the strapping men and women die out and replace them with a race of intellectuals who's to say the world's ideas won't change and fitness will become important again. As a Boston University Ethicist, George Annas said "What is the better human being" A lot of it is just a fad."

But if the perfection clone is okay why not have the transplant clone? A baby specifically bred to provide transplant material for the original, like a kidney or heart. A child only bred to give organs then die. This would mean a society that does not value human life. A society that would create a child just to kill it. Hopefully society will never get the chance to do this.

But even if cloning is banned outright, it will be hard to stop what goes on in private labs that don't receive public funding or secluded off shore laboratories. Years ago scientists studying Invitro Fertilisation were criticised so much that they went underground only emerging when they succeeded. Now IVF technology is used around the world. Who's to say that human cloning researchers couldn't do the same?

Also cutting, coring and electrically jolting a sheep cell is a huge moral step from a human cell. It took 277 attempts before Dolly was created. This would look like a sheer cellular carnage if the cells were human. It would almost be as bad as the Nazis in WW2 when they did experiments on POW inmates. No human was ever meant to be an experimental subject.

Will cloning affect our lives? Will clones be treated as higher or lower authorities? Will they think and act the same as the originals? We will not know these things until the human cloning process has been perfected. Hopefully this will never happen.
