

# MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Tena Koutou Katoa, Kia Orana, Talofa Lava, Greetings.

I am writing this in the September holidays, after just returning from Dargaville where we travelled for our inaugural Performing Arts Exchange with Dargaville High School. This was a huge success, and it was a pleasure to see all of the talent on show from Forest View High School students who were members of Forté, Tempo Blues Band, Channel Groove, Te Piringatahi, Polinetia Fa'atasi and the Nowhere Boy Production Cast. The students were excellent ambassadors for our school, worked co-operatively Dargaville High School Students to put on a wonderful joint concert. Next year we will be hosting Dargaville High School on the return visit. Hopefully this will establish a tradition in the same way as our Annual Sports Exchange with Taradale High School.

We are in a time of enormous change in the New Zealand educational system in the areas of curriculum and assessment. All schools have had to face the challenge of meeting the particular needs of their students within this changing environment. Forest View High School has met this challenge well, and is known throughout our region as a leader in providing and Certificate time-tabling National courses. At the same time we have maintained an emphasis on traditional academic courses. This has meant that our students have access to both types of qualifications, and are making the most of these opportunities. thanks must go to the Forest View Teaching Staff who have made this possible. Our students are very lucky to be served by such a hardworking Our flexible Senior School staff. module programme has been a very successful innovation and has been refined to facilitate this. Our new programme for Year 9 students this year has also ensured that our students cover the seven essential learning areas in the New Zealand curriculum.

Nine members of staff and two BOT members spent 3 days in the July holidays on retreat to formulate a strategic plan for the next 3 to 5 years. This followed extensive community consultation. This plan is now being



finalised and will ensure that Forest View High School continues to be a pro-active leader in the provision of educational opportunities.

This year has seen the introduction of our Eliminating Violence Programme, which has incorporated our standing non-violence policy. Students and staff have been involved in workshops and in developing a code of behaviour, which we expect all members of the school community to maintain so that the principles of equality, consistency and respect can be met. It is based on the beliefs that no student should stop a teacher from teaching or prevent

another student from learning, and that student achievement should be recognised and rewarded. This programme helps to ensure that Forest View High School is a safe, supportive place to be.

Visitors to school have been very impressed with our new car park and entrance area. We are in the process of getting a new school sign which will include the Maori name for our school - 'Te Kura o te Wao nui a Tane' which was adopted by our BOT this year. There will also be signs to show that FVHS is a 'Smoke Free' school. We are pleased that our school heating system has been upgraded and that the relocatable classrooms and student toilets have been refurbished. We are now working on a partial office upgrade. All of this work is ensuring that our students have the best physical environment possible to facilitate their learning.

Congratulations to all of those students who have excelled in academic, sporting and cultural areas and to those many others who have performed to the best of their ability to achieve all that they are capable of and who have made the most of the opportunities that have come their way.







I was fortunate enough to see not only Quebec the province, but Vancouver in British Columbia, Victoria, Toronto, Niagara Falls and Niagara Falls town in Ontario. When the Toyota Motor Company moved a large production plant there the city became very prosperous and changed its name to Toyota which means "prosperous rice field".

My school only had 300 students and was a public school. They were very strict with regular uniform checks including length of skirt, hair colour and nail length. It was 5 km to school and I went by bike which was enjoyable until winter came and my gloves didn't




The after-ball was very interesting with lots of people having an extremely good time. The whole night was a success and everyone is looking forward to next years.




Also thanks to all parents who helped with the team this year especially the loads of support at all our home games.




#### Where to from here?... Careers


