I wish my successor all the best for future productions.



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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Cultural learning and understanding has long been an important part of education at Forest View High School. Over the years many FVHS students have spent a year overseas with AFS, and just as many families have taken the advantage of hosting AFS students in their homes. Next year we have 10 students heading off to different parts of the world for their "experience of a lifetime".

In recent years we have also developed a close relationship with two schools in Japan. Forest View and Tokoroa High School have had a formal "sister-school exchange" with Kurayoshi Agricultural High School since 1996. FVHS actually had its first exchange with Kurayoshi in 1994. Misato Kita High School has also visited FVHS five times; twice in 1997 and once each year since then.

During the Term 3 holidays I was fortunate to visit both Kurayoshi and Misato Kita. Both schools were extremely hospitable and made sure I had a wonderful time. Misato Kita High School is in Saitama Prefecture, one hour north of Tokyo. The school is in a city area, still really an extension of Tokyo city. There were four adults and three students in our group, and our hosts went out of their way to show us around and give us a real taste of Japanese life. I visited Kurayoshi on my own. This school is in Saitama Prefecture, on the western end of Honshu Island. It's in a wealthier, rural area. The school grounds were beautiful, with flowers, vegetables, fruit and dairy farming sections. The surrounding district was also beautiful and I saw rice fields being harvested, mountains and springs. The hospitality I received was unforgettable. FVHS students who have visited Japan have really enjoyed the experience and remember the kindness and hospitality of the people. I'm sure that our Forest View families who host students also provide an enjoyable experience for their guests, and I'd like to take this opportunity to thank you all for this.

Continuing on the cultural front, congratulations to our Performing Arts groups who had a successful trip to Dargaville this year, and to the Production cast and crew for "Murder at the Music Hall" which had a very successful season.

This has been an excellent year for Forest View Rugby. A major highlight for the year was when our 1st XV won the Tricolour Trophy off St John's College on 5th August. This is a very prestigious trophy and is generally held by the top rugby schools in the Waikato. The French Rugby Team first presented it in 1961. FVHS first held the trophy in 1982. It was a big day when our team won it off Church College, with Mark Cawood as captain and Ian Foster as 1st five-eight. The school held the trophy several times in 1985, 1986 and 1987. The team included wellknown rugby players Jason Goldsmith and Jamie Cameron, plus Nooroa Manu and Simon Williamson who still have connections with the school. It was last held by FVHS in 1989, with Steven Franklin as captain. Congratulations to the 2000 team with Braden MacPherson as captain.

Our other rugby teams have also had an excellent season, particularly the under 15 team who won their Waikato Secondary Schools Championship, the Under 14 team who

were runners-up in the Waikato, and our FVHS-THS combined Girls team who were joint champions. Congratulations to all of these teams, and to all of the other codes again. Forest View has had excellent participation, results and fairplay. Fairplay has been a major emphasis at FVHS this year, with our banner proudly displayed at sports fixtures and our students "living the principles" – we surely deserve to be a finalist in 'Fairplay School of the Year'. We have also been designated as a 'Sportsmark' school because of our organization and development in this area.

Each year the Multi-Serve Education Trust honours 30 teachers in New Zealand who have given excellent service 'beyond the call of duty' and this year we are proud to say that Mrs Heather Williamson has received one of these awards. Mrs Williamson has given 25 years of service to the students of FVHS as well as being involved in Netball up to National level, and leading the Information Technology Department in a time of huge change to make it one of the leading departments in New Zealand in this subject area. Mrs Williamson is one of the many teachers at FVHS who work hard to meet the needs of our students.

Congratulations to our many students who continue to achieve academically. We are looking forward to an excellent set of external examination results this year, and our present students moving on to success in our new century!



On a more serious note, this year we have missed the presence and vigour of Ms Eivers, who after a very serious car accident has been on leave. We all wish her well in her road to recovery.



KURAYOSHI

When I first arrived in Japan my emotions were mixed. I was confused by the language but most of the time all excited and filled with anticipation of what the next three weeks would bring. As the time passed I learnt a lot about Japanese culture and language and I would like to share some of that with you.

The most obvious difference in Japan was the language. In Japan I was almost completely immersed. Before long my host sister, Santomi and I developed a new language consisting of broken Japanese, broken English, lots of dictionary use and sign language. Some people could not speak any English and my host grandmother was one of them. She would come and talk to me in Japanese without stopping for a break. These conversations were always a challenge. However the majority of people I met could speak some English. Many teachers would say "I can not speak English" and then they would proceed to explain the whole lesson to me in English.

The food in Japan is probably just what you would imagine. During my time there I enjoyed (or at least managed to swallow) octopus, raw fish, seaweed and a lot more. One particularly unusual food was a traditional Japanese cake I was served. It was mashed beans wrapped up in a leaf. Another was what looked like play-dough wrapped up in bamboo leaves. Noise means appreciation In Japan. On the first night I sat on my knees listening to the whole family slurp up a large bowl of cold noodles.

One place I particularly enjoyed visiting was the Tottori sand dunes. These are a lot larger than the beaches in New Zealand. The sand is almost too hot to stand on. While there I also had the chance to on a camel. I also visited Osaka Castle the day after I arrived. It was huge and glinted with gold in the very hot sun. That same day we walked around Osaka. I could not believe the sheer size of the city. Every building was at least twenty stories high. There were also vending machines in rows everywhere you looked. These sold just about everything you could imagine.

In Japan I attended Kurayoshi Agricultural High School. Needless to say there is a strong emphasis on agriculture. Students take classes where they work in the fields, with the animals or in the glass houses. Also they each take turns after school doing 'toban'. This is when they work in the fields for an extra two hours after school. For those not doing this there are many after school clubs, which most students attend. Some clubs are Kendo, Sumo, Judo, Drums, Flower Arranging and Calligraphy. I was able to try these and found them very interesting as the students mostly run them. Some classes such as Science were very The science lessons I attended were mostly watching movies, blowing bubbles or making slime. However math is a little harder. The students are not allowed to use calculators and still have to work out some very complicated stuff. At school, like most buildings in Japan you have to take off your shoes and put on 'slippers'. These are very uncomfortable plastic jandal type things. The students are also expected to clean the school every morning before lessons commence.

The people in Japan are really friendly. Everyone I met said hello, usually in English. People would walk up to me in the street and start talking to me. They were all so keen to make me feel welcome and this made my experience much more enjoyable and definitely unforgettable.

Japan has many contrasting aspects. In some areas there are rice fields as far as the eye can see, while in other places huge grey high-rise buildings surround you. The mornings are very hot and dry, yet by the afternoon it was Japan is known for its usually pouring with rain. technology, but still has mix of rich culture and tradition.

My time in Japan has completely changed my outlook on many things. It's not something you can explain; it is something you have to experience. I feel that this exchange has helped me develop more understanding of the Japanese way of life as I have almost lived it. This was an experience I am proud and honored to have had.





The only bad thing about OPC was having to come home. During the time there I learnt that you could achieve anything if you put your mind to it and that it is even better when you have your team behind you.





Congratulations go to Beau - Mathew Sheldrake and Belle - Rose Rakai.



She later became an International Champion at the Pan Pacific Games by breaking a record to gain a Gold Medal in the 400 metres and also winning a Silver Medal in the 800 metres. Monique has been selected to run in the 4 by 400m relay in the Junior World Championships in Chile later this year. Undoubtedly, she is a fine athlete!

Wings Anthony Meacheam and Junior Aue were always dangerous and excellent finishers.


Fullback John Elder has terrific potential, but injuries severely limited his playing time and young Ben Wright showed he could front up at this level when his opportunities came.




