Principal's Report



It's amazing how many opportunities and experiences can be packed into one year, and 2001 is no exception. Congratulations to all of our Forest View students and staff who have contributed to this year's "highs".

A big "high" for the whole school is the excellent report from the Education Review Office. ERO visited the school in the last two weeks of Term 3, five years since their last visit. They were impressed with the performance of our BOT, the leadership of the school and the quality of the overall curriculum we offer our students. They found a "consistently sound" standard of teaching and a lot of effort made to ensure we have a "safe environment". Special features of the school noted by ERO were our identification of learning needs and addressing these, the affirming classroom environments, the management of curriculum and assessment, and our rigorous evaluation and accountability procedures. They say we have an atmosphere of continuous improvement and have kept building on our excellent report obtained on their last visit in 1996.

The sporting arena has given us several "highs" in 2001. Congratulations to Monique Williams (Athletics), Amy Tyrrell (Figure Skating) and Hazel Cook (9 Ball) who have all represented New Zealand overseas. Many other students have achieved Regional Representative Status, and several of our teams have achieved winning placements in their competitions. The 2001 First XV Rugby team have had arguably one of the most impressive records since the school began - winning the Waikato 1st Division Secondary School Championship and the Tricolor Trophy. Several members were also in the Rugby Sevens and Touch Rugby teams, which both won the Waikato Championships and performed well in the Nationals. The team capped the season off with a trip to Rarotonga. Just as important, however, we must remember all of our other sporting teams who have participated well and performed to high standards. I have really enjoyed getting around to watch as many teams as possible during the year at our Sports Exchanges and during regular competition.

Cultural "highs" are an area of continuing development at FVHS. We enjoyed another successful production "Dracula Spectacular" with a large cast and crew. It has been great to see huge improvement in FVHS Debating, with our top team reaching the Waikato semi-finals in their first year of competition, and the FVHS Choir, Te Piringatahi, Polinetia Fa'atasi and Theatre sports continuing to grow in strength. We welcomed Misato Kita High School and Kurayoshi Agricultural High School on further visits and we must have had a record number of students go overseas with AFS and other exchanges.

Our academic "highs" are getting higher. We were very pleased with the excellent results achieved in the 2000 Bursary and School Certificate examinations. FVHS students are on an ongoing upward trend of pass rates in both exams. As well as this a large number of students are completing National Certificates. The number of unit standards achieved has mushroomed to over 10,000, and we are a leading school for this. Our teachers are all trained for and positively looking forward to the introduction of the National Certificate of Achievement (Level One) in 2002 – this is something many other schools are negative about. Our positive attitude will be to the benefit of our students.

I, as Principal, and the staff as a whole have always had an excellent relationship with the BOT, and this has also ensured the school has run smoothly and continued to progress. I would also like to acknowledge the support of our late kaumatua, Mr Anaru Marsh (Uncle Andy) who passed away in March. We were all very sad to lose this wise advisor who was always there to support our students, staff and BOT.

The official motto for this year's Student Council was, "aim high, achieve high." However, since for many of us this was our first time on any type of council, our first aim was to find our feet.



"The best bit was the after class events. We went to the movies, ice-skating and even did meditation"... William Aitkenhead





Forest View High School has been operating its own Auto Shop that allows students the chance to work on a range of engines and complete cars. This allows the student to see if the motor trade is the apprenticeship that they want to do. The engines and the cars have been donated by civil engineering firms in Auckland, Pilott Autos, AutoMechanix's, Mobil Aotea, and Baigents, so it is with a grateful heart that I thank them.

The Auto Shop is a hive of activity, where the engines are stripped down, measured then reassembled to running. Students are taught the history of the motorcar and the changes that have taken place over the years. We offer 10 unit standards that are part of the pre-apprenticeship scheme for students.



POWER STATION

The inside is abandoned, and a low buzzing echoes throughout. Six blue hard hats hang on hooks, waiting as though it was only yesterday they were last used. The control room full of unused equipment, an irregular beep and a computer screen flickering. One room stands open and friendly with a warm tone hanging in the air. Unwashed cups piled high in a sink and glass doors which slam shut, whirling newspapers and magazines over the floor.

A long corridor reaches along past dusty rooms and opens out to a large area. The blaring of machines running and the flow of water pushing against the sides, become more blatant. A complex ladder dragged down a small hole with dizziness right the way down. A cold rock like floor meets the ladder, moving out to a long narrow path. A gutter of water flows along the side, and a drum stands upright spewing out rubbish. The pressure of water hits the side of the walls causing a strong whooshing sound.

A lonely chair sits in between papers, rags and bits of metal. It faces towards an opening at the ten concrete steps, each one etched individually with dirt and metal shavings, imprinting patterns over the dull water marked surface. Tangled cords climb the sides of the paint peeled walls and enter the hole at the top of the steps. A sharp ear-piercing sound spills out of the hole and down. On the outside darkness floods throughout, and all that is visible is a slight glint of light high above. Repetition of sounds spread through the darkness. Light submerges from the cracks in the blades, revealing an extreme mass of space. A large black opening, reaches from the top to the base, with a small amount of murky water surrounding the foot of the ladder. An endless climb towards the glint of light displays solid gates which tower over an empty cark park.




Amy Tyrrell
