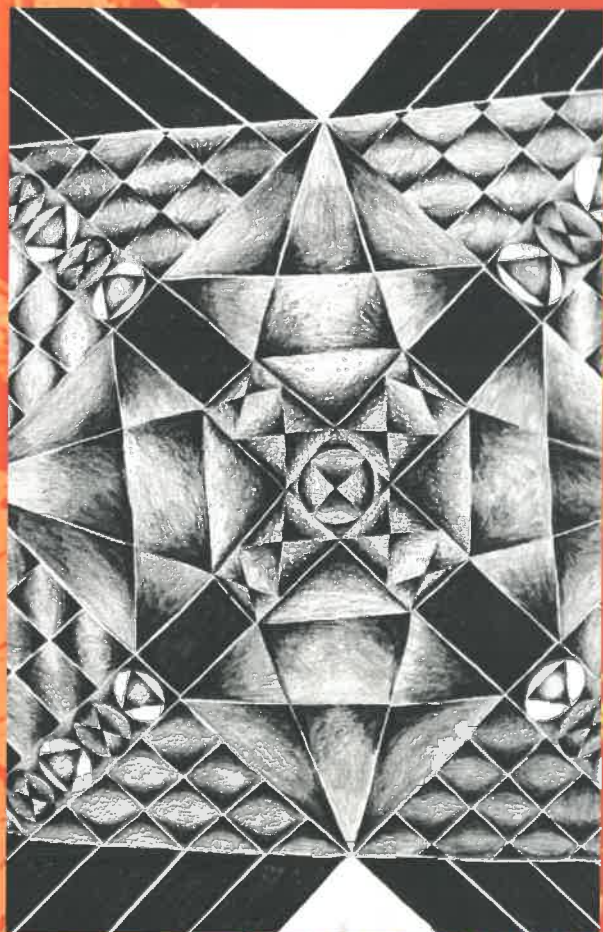

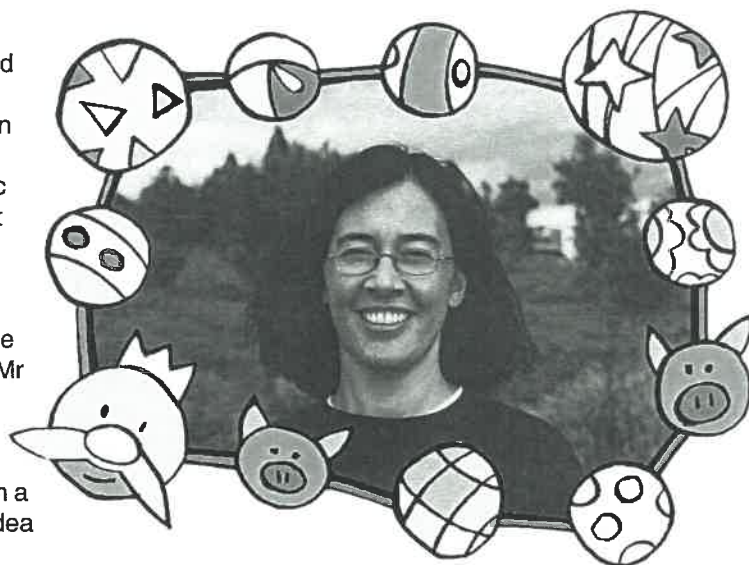

## Principal's Report

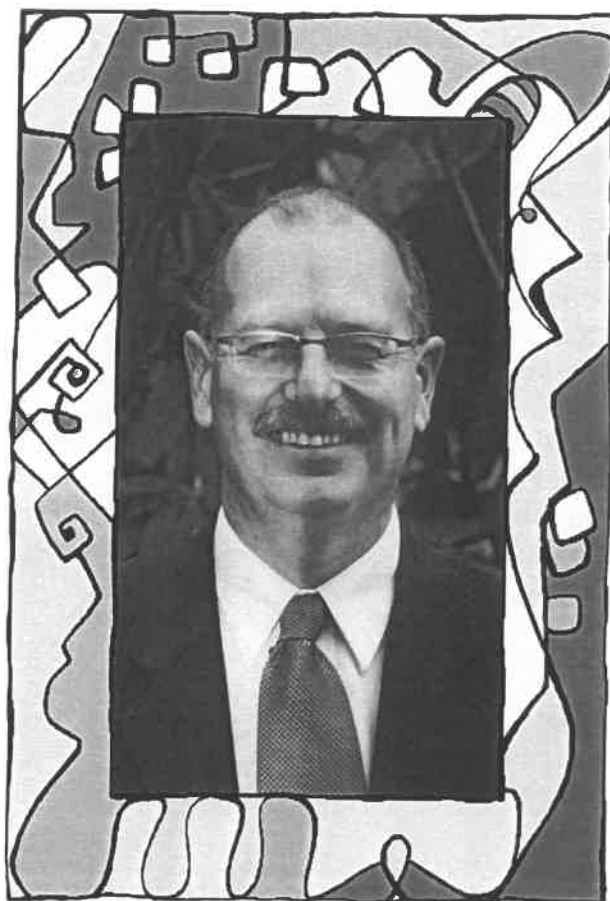
2002 will go down as the year that the new National Certificate of Educational Achievement was introduced, with this year's Year 11 students being the first of "a new breed". The NCEA has caused a lot of public debate and difference of opinion, and will take a few years to gain public acceptance. At Forest View the staff have approached this new qualification very positively compared to many other schools, even though it has meant a lot of extra work for the teachers involved (and maybe also for the students involved!). The good thing is that students are now able to gain credit for learning that has not been able to be tested in an external examination. The end of year exams are still there but only count for about half of the total assessment. Students can now be credited for skills such as public speaking and research, and subjects such as Physical Education and Drama are now equal with the more traditional academic subjects. This is all good news for many of our students. What is needed is for the new qualification to be more fully resourced so that all can feel confident that assessment is fair and reliable across the country and that teachers are provided with good quality material. At present there is some debate about whether NCEA Level 2 should be introduced next year. Again this depends on adequate resourcing. Time will tell!

2002 will also be remembered as the year with lots of industrial action. For the first time this affected extra-curricular activities, which hurt. The

point has been made however that a lot of the "extra" things that happen in schools are because of the goodwill of teachers, and this is something that we don't want to lose. This action had to take place if we wish to have good teachers teaching our children, as it

is getting increasingly difficult to attract and retain people in this noble profession. It is important that we have the best people teaching the leaders of tomorrow. I would like to thank our community for their support of the school and our teachers during this difficult period.

There have been some wonderful achievements this year, as well. In December 2001 the school won its first National teams event.



Congratulations to the Senior Boys Touch Rugby Team who beat all five teams seeded ahead of them to take out the title. This was an awesome achievement against much bigger schools. Good luck to the Mixed Team who is going to the Nationals this December. James Kamana has been selected in both the New Zealand Secondary Schools Rugby and Touch Rugby teams. Haysley Metu was also selected for the NZSS Touch Rugby team, as well as two of our former students, John Elder and Drollett Joseph. Monique Williams was named in the NZSS Athletics Team.







Eugene Mihaere, Tamatoa Karora-Reu and Shadrach Coake were all selected for the NZ Under 14 Rugby League team. What an achievement to have so many NZ representatives here at once! We have continued to have large participation in many sporting codes, as you will see in this Yearbook. Many other students have performed at Regional and National level.

It has been very exciting this year to have our new Performing Arts Centre opened. We now have great facilities for Music, Drama and Dance, including practice rooms, a recording studio and maybe the best Dance facility in town. Students have also been able to take advantage of our Gymnasium extension and Weights Room. At the end of this year we will be updating our Food Technology Room, Automotive Workshop and Photography Dark Room. These are all growth areas in the school and reflect our aims to provide many opportunities for students. Plans are also underway for the building of a School Marae.

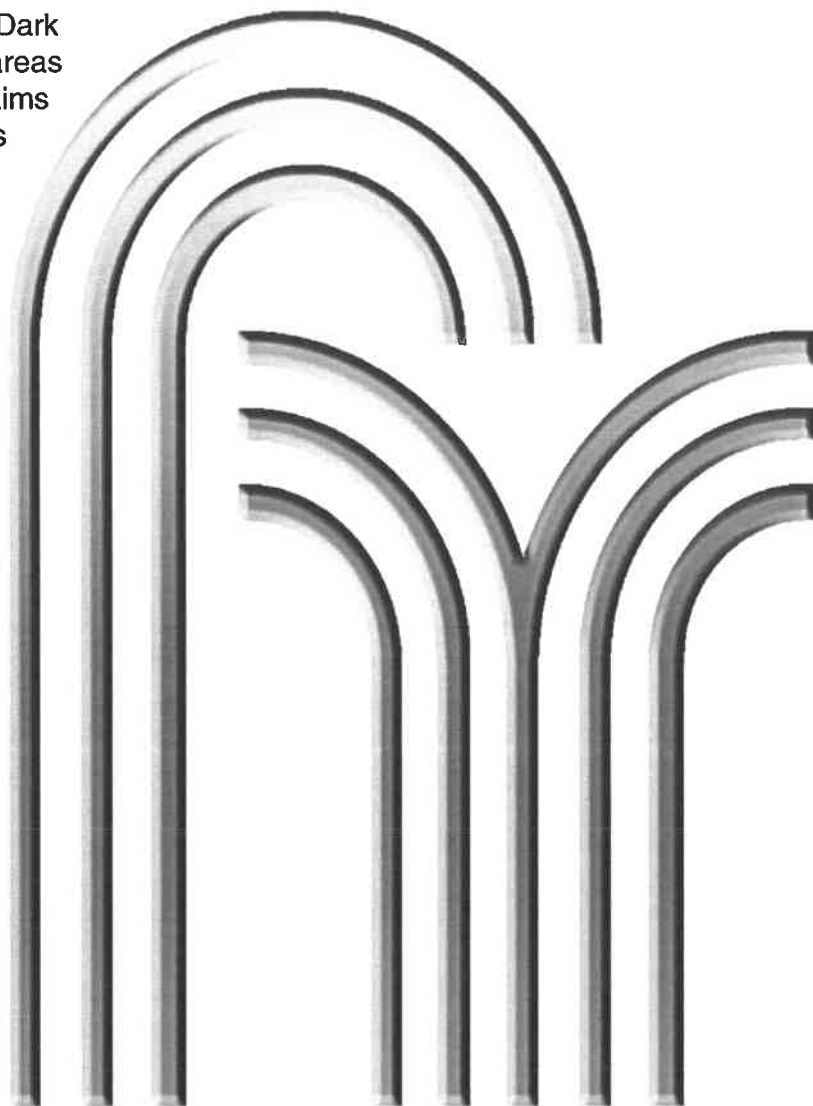

# DAVID MARK (DAVE) FINLAY

22<sup>nd</sup> June 1951 – 3<sup>rd</sup> December 2001

Dave arrived in Tokoroa via Auckland and Cambridge in 1990 to take up a position of Coach / Manager of the Tokoroa Rugby Club the predecessor of Southern United Rugby Football Club. Although he was a trained teacher he had a lifelong interest in all things sporting, and this new position seemed tailor-made for him. When financial constraints left the Rugby Club unable to afford the services of a full time manager, he left his job in 1995 to become the inaugural full time manager of the South Waikato Sports and Leisure Board, who oversee all aspects of the operation of the Tokoroa Memorial Sports Grounds. He continued his association with the Rugby Club in an administrative role on a voluntary basis, and his new job enabled him to further broaden his already extensive sporting interests.

In 1999 the position of 1<sup>st</sup> XV Coach at Forest View became vacant. Dave was a passionate man, but of all his passions, rugby was number one. The challenge of taking on such a role was irresistible. Dave's rugby credentials, and his teaching background in working with young men, steadily started turning the team's on field performances around.

Nothing succeeds like planning, and Dave was insistent on goal setting at the commencement of each rugby year. He could identify individual talent within the team, but regarded the overall team's performance as the yardstick of success. Following a steady improvement in 1999 and 2000, the goals were set for 2001 to win the Waikato Secondary School's competition and to win the Tricolour Trophy. If these goals were achieved, then individuals within the team would also be recognised by attaining representative honours.

It is now history that the 2001 goals set by the team were achieved. Indeed they were exceeded as in the weekend following Dave's tragic death the nucleus of the team returned from Palmerston North as N.Z. Secondary Schools Touch Rugby champions, an historic first for Forest View High School. To say that this would have made Dave proud would be an understatement.

The team paid their respects to their former mentor at his tangi, and their rousing farewell haka will live long in the memory of his family, friends and sporting dignitaries present.

A modest man, many people would not have realised the extent of his achievements, particularly in sporting circles. He attained Auckland representative status in almost every age group team both in rugby and cricket throughout his schooling years, and captained both the Mt. Albert Grammar Rugby 1<sup>st</sup> XV and Cricket X1. His sporting success continued in later life and followed his move to the Waikato.

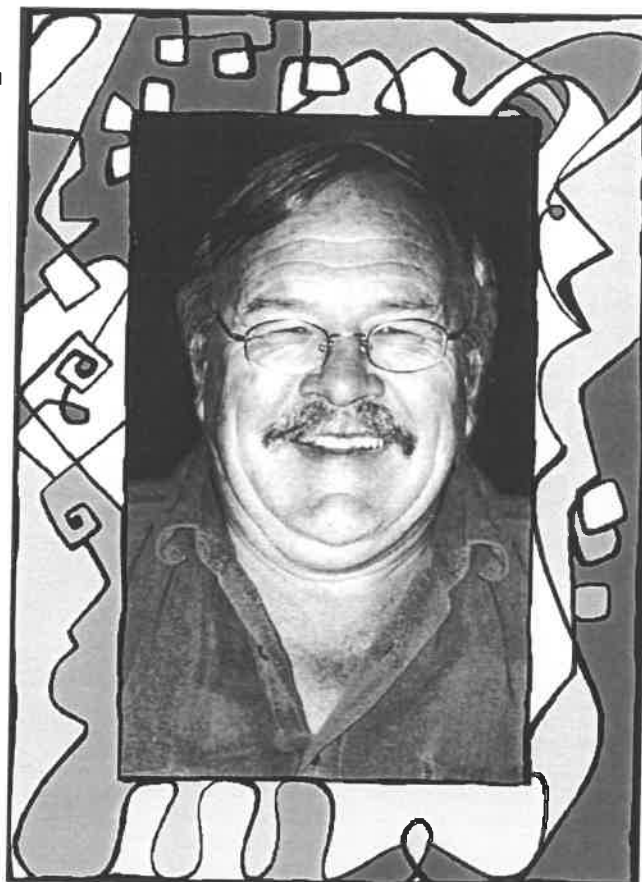
Upon taking the 1<sup>st</sup> XV coaching job, it was suggested that if the extent of his sporting background was made known to his new team, that they would appreciate how fortunate they were to have a coach of his calibre. Dave's response to this suggestion was that respect could not be bought, you had to earn it.

- Be proud of your school
- Be proud of your town
- Do your best for the team and your mates
- Show respect
- Play hard and never give up

Dave, your legacy lives on.

## Automotive

Forest View High School has been operating its own Auto Shop that allows students the chance to work on a range of engines and complete cars. This allows the student to see what areas of the motor trade they would like to choose as an apprenticeship. Auto engineering firms in Auckland, Pilot Autos, AutoMechanix's, Mobil Aotea, and Baigents have donated the engines and the cars, so it is with a grateful heart that I thank them.

The Auto Shop is a hive of activity, where engines are stripped down, measured then reassembled to running. Students are taught the history of the motorcar and the changes that have taken place over the years. We are now part of a consortium of schools and therefore we can offer 10 unit standards as well as others that become part of their pre-apprenticeship course. Because of this when the students decide to leave school and look at an apprenticeship, the time spent in a polytechnic will be reduced due to the student gaining these unit standards.

Beside the cars and engines that we have in the workshop we also have a small number of cars that come to us from the public and teachers, where the students are taught to carry out oil changes, tune-ups, and how to look after customers cars. This service is also open to students who are in the course to allow them to carry out work for family and friends.

Safety is also taught to the students along with hand tools and equipment use, so that the student is familiar with their operation and purpose.

Holden, Ford, Mitsubishi, Subaru, Toyota, Nissan are all looked at. Yes, we even talk about should I say Mazda Wankel Rotary... "Good as a Boat Anchor".... Yes we have Fun, Fun, and Fun....

The ambition of the Auto Shop is to produce young students of both sexes to become top quality Automotive Mechanics whether it is in the field of Auto Machining, Panel beating, Car Grooming or Light and Heavy Auto Mechanics.

Auto Shop is now being introduced as a full years subject for years 11 to 13, and will be a great stepping stone towards a career.

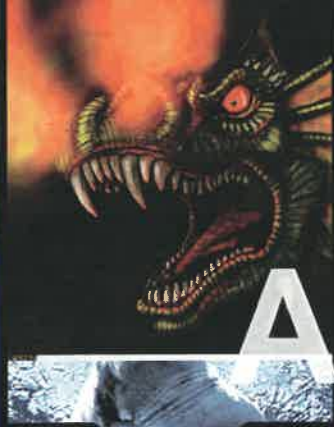




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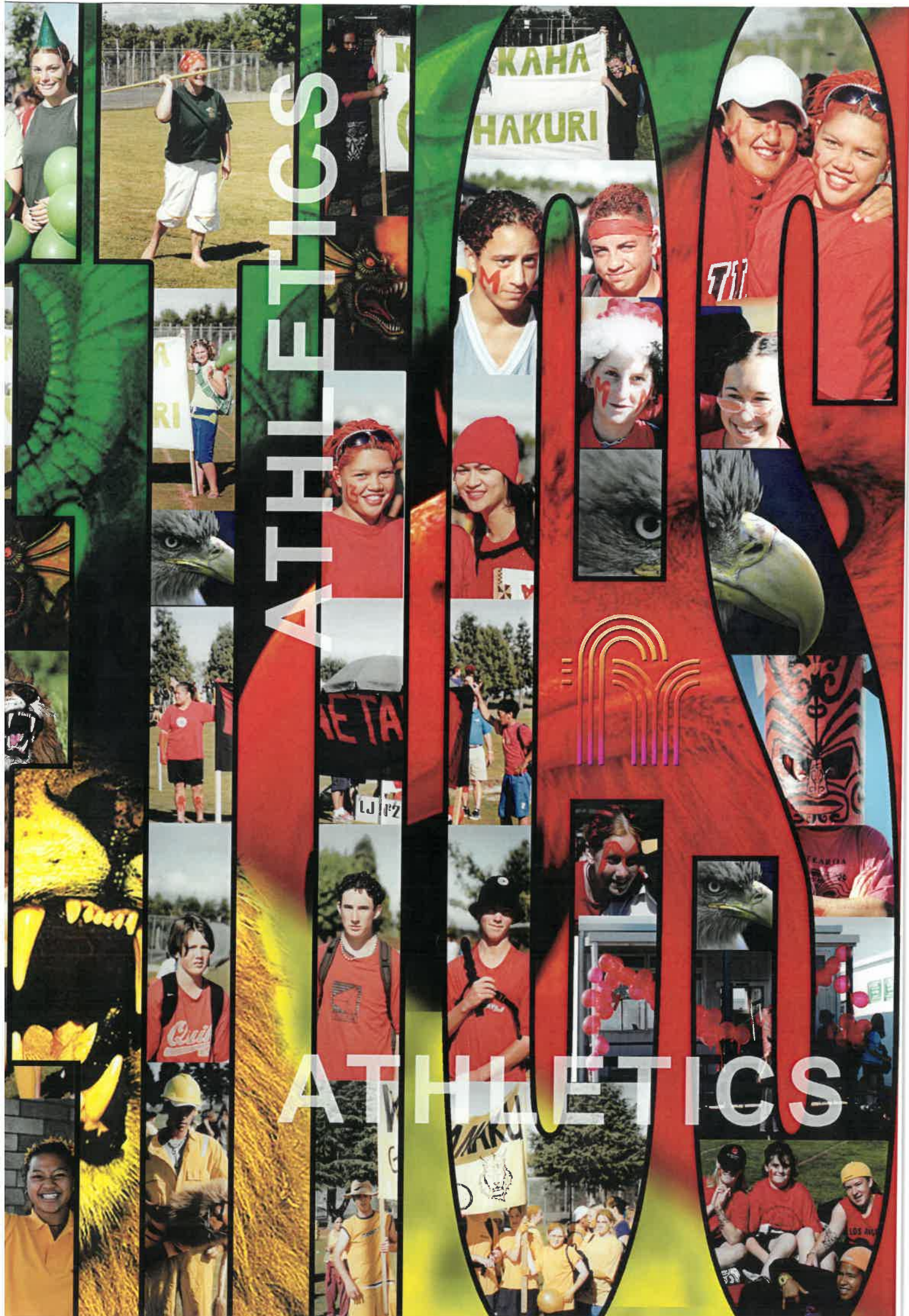
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## Girls 2<sup>nd</sup> XI hockey
