# BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

Students at Forest View High School have many opportunities to become involved in a range of activities throughout their years at this school. A glance through this book will show the many sporting, cultural and academic events that have occurred this year. We are proud of the individual and team successes in these areas and also of the level of participation in these activities.

Last year's focus was on the introduction of the new NCEA qualification. NCEA Level 2 has been smoothly integrated into the curriculum due to a strong foundation built last year. The results for the first year showed that students and staff worked together in getting the most out of the new system with many students achieving well beyond the 80 credit national target for Level One. These results reflected one of the strengths of this school in that staff have a real interest in individual students and make efforts to ensure that they achieve to their potential.

Improvements to buildings and grounds this year have included developing the food technology room, automotive workshop, and the darkroom/art workroom remodel. More students now have the opportunities of learning in these areas due to the modernisations of these facilities. Next year there will be classes offered over the internet to students who would otherwise have to learn by correspondence. A classroom is being developed this year to accommodate this style of learning.

The school is in strong financial shape due to sound budgeting and good management. It is also well staffed and while we are sorry to farewell some excellent teachers at the end of this year, their replacements are highly trained and experienced. The Board appreciates all the extra-curricular work that staff is involved in as well as their dedication to their teaching commitments.

I would like to acknowledge the commitment of all Board members to Forest View High School. We look forward to an equally successful year in 2004.

# PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



At the time of writing this article our Mixed Touch team has just returned from the World All Schools Touch Championships where they came 2<sup>nd</sup> and I have received an e-mail from the school who hosted them. It says: "Please convey onto your Principal how wonderful your students were. They were a delight to meet, extremely polite and were great

ambassadors for your school. Their skill level was a treat to watch and added to the great spectacle of the World All Schools...." It was great to get an email like this in which people from outside our area recognise the wonderful qualities of our students, and this is typical of most reports I receive whenever groups of FVHS students go on a trip somewhere. It shows that our three Forest View values of Respectful Relationships, Aiming to Achieve, and Positive Participation, are really working. Congratulations to not only the Touch team, but also our many other students who are great ambassadors for our school.

2003 has seen the introduction of National Certificate of Achievement Level 2, and this has been successful. Teachers have received their training and are now experienced at Achievement Standard assessment. Some students have completed Level 2 even before the external examinations. Many students who did not complete Level 1 in Year 11 have completed it during their Year 12 year and started Level 2. The system is working well, and we look forward to introducing Level 3 in 2004. It has been great to see the interest from students who are keeping a tally of their credits and aiming to achieve. We were very pleased to see that one of our students Fiona Mathis gained 208 credits in

Year 11 and was one of the top 20 students in New Zealand for number of credits gained.

There have been several sporting highlights this year. As already mentioned, the Mixed Touch team did really well in the World Tournament. They will also be competing in the NZSS Champs in December. Congratulations to James Kamana who has played in the NZSS Rugby team for the second year in a row. He was also selected for the NZSS Mixed team along with Rosalia Tolovae. Former student Haysley Metu was selected for the NZSS Mens team. Monique Williams was again selected for the NZSS Athletics team, and has qualified to compete at the World Junior Champs in Italy next year. Matthew Handcock and Katherine Brown have represented NZ in Rollerskating. Our Under 14 Rugby team won the Waikato competition. Our A Netball team won 8 games out of 9 at the North Island SS Tournament. Congratulations to all of these students and the many others who have attained placings or representative status at National or Regional level.

During the year we had the official opening of the Performing Arts block, and were treated to some awesome performances, and many of the "older generation" were able to "groove" along to this year's very enjoyable School Production. Other cultural highlights were our A Debating team coming a very close second in the Waikato competition and Ailsa Wilson qualifying for her A Mus A Degree in Piano. We also celebrated the 10<sup>th</sup> year of our exchange with Kurayoshi Agricultural High School, who specially brought over their Taiko Drumming group in honour of the occasion.

A sad time for us was with the sudden passing of out School Kaumatua Mr Ned Amopiu in August. Koro Ned had become well known and respected by our students, and he had only recently returned from travelling with us to the Waitara Sports exchange when he died. Our school members were proud to be involved with his tangi.

You will read about the many things happening at Forest View in this Yearbook. Thank you to all of those involved in putting it together. Thank you to the Board of Trustees and the Staff for making all of these opportunities available, and thank you the many Forest View students who are (in someone else's words) "wonderful", "a delight to meet", and "great ambassadors for our school".




























# The Shadow



# DARGAVILLE CULTURAL EXCHANGE



















#### ROCK QUEST AND PACIFICA BEATS
