

After extensive consultation, which involved parents, staff and students being involved in a SWOT Analysis of our school (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats), the school has developed a Strategic Plan for the next three years, which has just been adopted by the Board of Trustees. Our vision is "FVHS – a caring, learning community". Annual Plans will be developed to put all of our ideas into action. Things will only keep improving.

This year we introduced NCEA Level Three. All three levels of the new qualification have now been positively and successfully introduced into our school, and students are reaping the rewards of this. The Board of Trustees elections were held in March this year. I thank the retiring Board members, Elaine Jones, Cheryl Hawkins, Lua Tafau, John Swale for the three years that they contributed to the governance of the school. This year the darkroom/art workroom remodel was completed and a science laboratory converted to a classroom and two offices. We look forward to working together for the development of the School in 2005 and beyond.

Academic




YEAR 13 GEOGRAPHY TRIP (WAITOMO)



MOCK UNITED NATIONS ASSEMBLY



As well as growing flowers at the school, they also had a farm where they had recently got about five new ponies. The school days were about the same as ours but after school they had club activities which everyone had to do. I really enjoyed the Taiko club. We went to a range of different activities and I really enjoyed most of them. One thing about the school which I found different was taking our shoes off and putting these funny slippers on that we had to wear inside the school buildings.

I made some neat friends over the three weeks that I was at Kurayoshi and really enjoyed my time and my host family. The trip helped me with my Japanese and to understand their culture a lot better, and I sometimes wish it had lasted longer.

























WEARABLE ARTS 2004





We are now starting to get ready for the New Zealand Secondary School Champs which will be held in Hamilton in December.

Our FVHS Cross Country Champs were held on 6th May. Congratulations to this year's champions – Patrick Dodunski, Teresa Boss, Colin Mathis, Amanda Aldridge, Kevin Aldridge and Ceeson Deane. The Lake competition was won by Arapuni. 30 of our athletes competed in the Mid Islands/ Bay of Plenty Cross Country Champs where Kevin Aldridge won the Junior Boys race against a large competitive field. Colin Mathis and Teresa Boss also gained top-ten placings. Kevin and Colin also gained top-ten placings in the Waikato BOP Champs, and Kevin went on to compete in the New Zealand Secondary School Champs in Dunedin where he came 19th in a very large and competitive field.


When we finally arrived we had to rush through the powhiri and push on as we were way behind schedule by now.

It was an excellent day with lots of fun, and a great way to finish our winter sports season.







Thank you to Willy, George & AJ and all of the parents who supported our teams. Your assistance was greatly appreciated.


