FROM THE PRINCIPAL...



t the time of writing this, we have been busy enrolling students for Year 9 2006. One piece of advice that I like to give new enrolments is that those students who get involved in school activities, and who take up the opportunities on offer, are the ones who enjoy secondary school the most. They also do well in their school work, and are too busy to get into trouble! Congratulations to our many students who make the most of their school years. I am sure you will enjoy reading about the many school events highlighted in this Yearbook.

At the moment I feel very privileged to be the Principal of Forest View High School. In the last two weeks of Term Three, we have had a team from the Education Review Office (ERO) visit our school, and we have just received a very glowing draft verbal report from them. (We will receive a confirmed written report in Term Four). The "Vision Statement" of our Strategic Plan is "Forest View High School - A Caring Learning Community". The quality of "Caring" and "Learning" were the two focus areas of our ERO Review. They also looked at four areas of national interest (Maori achievement, Pacific Island achievement, the implementation of the Health and Physical Education curriculum, and International students). In all areas they have noted many areas of good performance. Parents and students can rest

assured that our school provides a high quality education for our students. An excellent report like this is only possible because we have a very committed and hardworking staff and BOT who work together with students and families to provide a large range of relevant learning opportunities in all areas. Our students also provide excellent support for each other, and the RAP values are continually promoted by all. Thank you to all members of our school community for making this possible.

The Performing Arts area of the school has really grown over the last four years. A great highlight of the year was when our band Az-One won the National Smokefree Pacifika-Beats competition. This was the first National Title for Forest View in a cultural area. and is a very exciting achievement. Congratulations to the Band members and their Manager, Mrs Earnshaw, for putting us on the map! The cultural area of the school continues to improve, and this year included an excellent student-directed entry into the Stage Challenge, a cast and crew of 100 in a very enjoyable Annual Production, a very re-invigorated and successful Polinetia Fa'atasi. Te Piringatahi, Bands, Dance groups, Shakespeare and Debating. It was a shame Dargaville was not able to visit us this year for the Performing Arts Exchange, but we look forward to visiting them next year.

This year four Forest View students were selected to represent New Zealand. Amanda Aldridge selected to represent our country at the World Junior Athletics Championships in Morocco after winning the New Zealand Under 17 Heptathlon Championships. Eugene Mihaere was named in THREE New Zealand Mixed Touch Teams - Under 17, Under 19 and Under 21 - an awesome achievement for a 16year old! Peter Joynt represented New Zealand in the Oceania Mountain-Biking Championships, and Stevie-Lee Giles represented New Zealand in the Oceania Roller Skating Championships. Congratulations to these students and to the many others who have

achieved Regional Representative status in their sporting codes this year. Our school continues to have very healthy participation and performance rates in a wide range of sporting endeavours.

Academic achievement is still the priority, and it is great to see the way that our students have succeeded in the new qualifications system with NCEA Level One, Two and Three. Our completion rates in these and in many other National Certificates have been pleasing, and compare well with other schools. The new system is working well in our school, and students are receiving good advice on studying courses and qualifications which set them up for success both at school and in their future lives.

In June this year Mrs Sommerville and I had the privilege to represent Forest View at the 120th Anniversary of Kurayoshi Agricultural High School. At the same time we celebrated the 10th Anniversary of our exchange. This was a very interesting experience, and we were shown wonderful hospitality by our hosts. They place a great deal of importance on our sister-school relationship.

At the end of this year we farewell Mrs Joan Slade from her position as Guidance Counsellor. Mrs Slade started teaching at Forest View in 1974, in the school's first year of operation, and has made an enormous contribution to our school and its students for over thirty years, firstly as a teacher in the Social Sciences area, and secondly as an effective Counsellor. We wish her all the best on her retirement.

I hope you enjoy reading this Yearbook. Thank you to our Editor Susan Hopkins and all who have contributed to these pages to celebrate the great year of 2005.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES CHAIRPERSON'S REPORT



orest View High School has continued to offer a high quality, varied and exciting education to our community. One challenge facing all schools is being able to respond to sudden changes in roll numbers quickly and effectively. After low Year Nine enrolments in 2004, higher Year Nine enrolments this year, together with a steady increase during the year, we believe the school is ready to cater for a large junior school in 2006. These fluctuations have been dealt with well, due to the professionalism of the staff, the planning from the senior management team and the strong leadership from the Principal.

A team of four from the Education Review Office came to the school at the end of Term Three. The written report has not yet been received but the initial briefing was extremely positive. Some areas that impressed ERO were:

- The commitment of staff in academic, sporting, cultural and social areas
- Varied and clear qualification pathways including the introduction of NCEA, Gateway, STAR, the Academies (Sport, Farming, Automotive)
- The high quality of school-wide documentation
- The higher than average levels of achievement for Maori and Pacific Island students compared with national levels and similar schools

We are looking forward to receiving the written report and seeing it published as some positive reports in our local and regional newspapers would be very welcome.

Another challenge this year was to rebuild the Maori Language classroom and resources that were damaged by arson in July. This attack was very difficult for Mr Hakaria and his students and we commend them for the way they dealt with the situation. We are grateful to the Ministry of Education who worked with the school to get this classroom

refurbished and to replace resources as quickly as possible.

This year the remodelling of classrooms and HOD offices in A block were completed and the restructuring of the Administration Block started in September. This project will take approximately four months to complete. We will then have a new Student Management Centre and a more welcoming reception area for visitors to the school. The staff will benefit from a larger staff room, kitchen and work-room.

We are sorry to farewell some excellent teachers at the end of this year and we thank them for their contribution to Forest View High School. Among those leaving is Mrs Joan Slade who has been a valued member of the teaching staff for thirty years. We wish her all the best in her retirement and thank her for her dedication to the school. The Board appreciates the ongoing work and commitment shown by all staff.

The Board have worked hard and well together and we look forward to the continued development of the School in 2006 and beyond.

HEAD GIRL



MRS JOAN SLADE Since 1974

hat do I remember about FV over the past 30+ The first thing that springs to mind is that I was teaching at Forest View before any present students were a twinkle in anyone's eye, and even before some of today's students' parents were At the start of every lesson students lined up for class, boys to one side of the door and girls the other. And at the end of a lesson students were dismissed in an orderly fashion, one row at a time. I can also remember boys who were unco-operative or disobedient being caned and girls being strapped! The boys took Woodwork and Metalwork and all the girls took Cookery and Sewing. could only get into the 6th form by 'passing' School Certificate; if you didn't pass you had to stay in the 5th form and continue to wear the junior uniform. Staff had to wear a sort of uniform, men had to wear ties, women rarely wore trousers. It was difficult to get into Forest View, the town was zoned by the Ministry, and if you lived outside of the zone you had to apply for one of the 30 places that the school was allowed to offer to 'outsiders'. When I first started there was only one building, A Block. It had labs, as well as ordinary classrooms. The Staffroom. Headmaster's office and his secretary's office were the only buildings. If each room could tell its tale you would be surprised at how their uses, their shape and sizes have changed over the years.

There have been many highlights for me. Being offered a part time position when it was hard to get a job at Forest View, working under the guidance of Roger Sommerville (HOD Social Studies when I started at FV) who offered me opportunities and gave me all the support needed to keep me on top of and even enjoy my job. Working with Bruce Dale, another HOD Social Studies, whose sense of humour and personal high standards were an inspiration. And also watching



FV grow in size, both the numbers of students (to over 700 at one time) and also the number of buildings. Perhaps most of all I treasure the support, understanding, cards, gifts of flowers and chocolates and a book of helpful sayings that I was given in 1983 when I was treated for cancer. The actions of my students back then helped me to recover. They added to my personal determination to get better, some even skipped school to visit me in Tokoroa hospital to keep me going. And when I got back into the classroom and couldn't write on the board very easily, they took over that job for me! Lucy, Terri, Joanne and all the others, I still remember you with gratitude and affection. At the same time my colleagues were also wonderful, especially when I was in Hamilton when they took it in turns to visit, take me out and show me that life goes on and Maryann who took over my classes and kept them on the hoil.

I have been lucky to have met so many wonderful people, both students and colleagues: that I have stayed for over 30 years is testament to how much I have enjoyed being a part of Forest View. I always say that I have been blessed with three families, my birth family, my church family, and last but most definitely not the least, my school family, and I know that my life has been made so very much richer by this latter family.



e were all very proud when Nina Stairmand was elected the Board of Trustee Rep.



I sat on the beach and listened, to the stillness of the air. When the sun rose and hit the sky, I glimpsed its fiery glare.


I traced the line of ridged shores, thrust completely out of reach. I felt the coldness of the water, as the waves lapped upon the beach.

YEAR 13 GEOGRAPHY - WAITOMO



AGRICULTURE

he agriculture students at Forest View have had a varied year, with several students completing their National Certificate Level 2, some starting on their Level 3 (no mean feat!), some simply finding out a lot more about farming and its opportunities. Some students also took advantage of the opportunities offered in the Gateway programme. We also launched the Agriculture Academy this year which unites students as a team. These students were involved in a number of social and training events. We are very grateful to the significant sponsorship by Tokoroa Host Lions Club with proceeds from their "Raise a Calf" Scheme. We are also supported by Westpac, Farmlands, BNZ, RD 1 and Ecolab as well as a number of local farming families.

Judging Day

In March, students were invited to attend a stock judging training day at Gayle and Tim Sneddon's farm. Students had to present the cows assembled for the trainee judges to evaluate. Josh Sneddon was one of the judges - of special note because he was the youngest involved. The students learned new skills in stockmanship, patience and appreciated the home baking supplied by Mrs Sneddon.

Practical Skills

Each year the school organises a STAR funded course in practical farm skills to enable students to complete the practical components of their Level 2 National Certificate in At the end of March Farming. students spent a day on the Mathis's farm completing basic ATV skills and in May completed their tractor skills. They have been working on the theory unit required in class and in their own time at school. The course was run by Agribusiness Training and was very well organised. All students completed the basic skills unit and some completed more advanced levels as they had prior skills. This was possible because our students worked extremely well as a group and helped each other. We are proud of the attitude and effort given by them Two students completed a chainsaw course this year. Ecolab ran a dairy hygiene course for us covering basic milking plant operation, hygiene and safety. We have also continued to practice our fencing with some students showing excellent skills.

Competitions

Forest View was the host school for the farm skills competition. The students were organisers, hosts and competitors. We had a great day with two teams entered. Both did very well with the team of Joshua Sneddon, Leonard Morgan, Allan Flutey and Colin Mathis being placed first. Edwina Wooderson did a sterling job of collating results and a wonderful lunch was provided by the Soccer Girls.

Trips

The Agriculture Academy students have had several excursions out into the wider world of agriculture. In June we went to the National Fieldays where we tested our prowess at fencing (especially Allan and Josh), as well as collecting enough pens to ensure class work was completed during the year. The BNZ acted as hosts for our group. We have also explored the Lichfield Cheese factory and discovered how much more happens to the milk collected from farms. South Waikato Veterinary Services and Kev's Home Kills autopsied a sheep for our class so we could identify its internal organs and learn a whole lot more than in the textbooks.

The Agriculture programme at Forest View is well supported by the community and has a neat bunch of students.

Athletics



Swimming



orest View High School has been operating its own Auto Shop since 1997.

The workshop operates as a full year programme, giving students the chance to work on a range of engines and cars, and develop skills to gain Unit Standards in the trade.

The workshop has a relatively new classroom area, enabling the students to do their theory work also. It is a great room for visiting speakers, who come and share their experiences within the automotive trade.

The Auto Shop is a hive of activity. The engines are stripped down, measured and then reassembled. Students are taught the history of the motorcar, and the changes that have taken place over the years. Safety is also taught, along with hand tools and equipment use.

We offer Unit Standards that are part of the pre-apprenticeship scheme. This enables the student to go into an apprenticeship when they leave school if they choose to. This opportunity also reduces the time spent in a polytechnic.

We also have a small number of cars that have come to us from the public and also teachers. The students are taught to carry out oil changes, tune-ups, and how to look after customers' cars.

The Automotive Industry is developing at a fast rate through the advancements in Technology. This is an area that is becoming very popular at Forest View and many students are achieving excellent results and learning valuable skills.

The aim of the Auto Shop is to produce top quality Automotive Mechanics and Engineers. Students are very keen and work hard. Many are well on their way to achieving this aim.

EXTENSION OPPORTUNITIES AT FOREST VIEW

tudents at Forest View are very fortunate in having such a vast number of leadership and sporting areas. This year to date, over 300 students have taken part in these activities. These include Future Problem Solving. the Academic Exchange with Rotorua Lakes High School, The Holiday Seminars at Auckland University, the Year 10 visit to Waikato University Open Day, participation in the Australasian Academic Competitions, BNZ Maths and WaiMaths; Debating; BP Technology Challenge; Holiday Science University courses for Seniors; Year 10 Extension group; the School Leaders Course in Auckland; the Captains' course; Stage Challenge; the National Drama School: Drama School; the Production; Kapa Haka: Polinetia Fa'atasi; School, musical groups; Kurayoshi Exchange; AFS; OPC and a number of Extension Seminars which run throughout the year. Most of these will be written about in other sections of the magazine.

This year over 100 students have taken part in the Extension Seminars offered throughout the year. The first of these was Debating held in Term 1. This was facilitated by Anisa Barrowclough, a Waikato University student and currently the co-ordinator of the Waikato Debating Association. Most of the students had not been involved in Debating before. It provided interested students with the chance to learn the techniques involved in being a successful debater such as trialing moots. working closely together as a team and having to listen well and think quickly. The second Seminar was for our top sports students and was taken by Cindy Moser of SPARC. It was divided into Seniors and Juniors excellent feedback from both students and parents.

Many thanks to our tutors, to our staff supporters, our families and the special ladies who sewed the wonderful new blue costumes that looked so magical on stage!






UNDER 16 RUGBY

XI BOYS SOCCER


This season started off disappointingly as usual. Ex-players not returning and a successful Junior Boys team from last year was broken up, to have enough players to field the first team.



Our 2005 FVHS Athletic Sports were held on 15th February. It was a beautiful day with great lake spirit in evidence. New records were set by Nathan Alley (Junior Boys 300m and 800m (held since 1978)), Geno Milnes (Junior Boys 3000m), Amanda Aldridge (Senior Girls High Jump), and the Maraetai Year 11 Girls Relay. The Lake competition was won by Maraetai, who gained the most competition points and the most participation points. The North Island Secondary School Champs were held in Hastings on 2nd & 3rd April. Amongst very tough competition, our athletes did very well. Amanda won the title in the Open Girls 300m Hurdles and Jacob came 3rd in the Intermediate Boys High Jump. 


