In April next year Mrs Blucher and I will be leaving New Zealand to go and live in Croatia for about six months. This will be a very exciting time for us, and a great chance to think about the opportunities available for the next chapter in our lives.

I can honestly say that I have really enjoyed being Principal of our school. The vast majority of young people in Tokoroa are friendly and open, and are a pleasure to work with. I am thankful for the excellent education that my own children got at Forest View. The school has been a very important part of our lives with Mrs Blucher and I both working here, and for seven years we had one or two children here as well. We will definitely miss the school and everybody connected with it.

Congratulations to our high achievers in 2006. Isaac John was selected to represent New Zealand in the New Zealand Under 18 Rugby League team (the Junior Kiwis), and has made several high status teams in his chosen code. Danielle Arnell was selected as part of the New Zealand Under 16 Judo team, and Stevie-Lee Giles was selected to represent New Zealand in Roller Skating at the Oceania Championships. Eugene Mihaere, Sean-Claude McKain, Kane Adams and Racqual Anderson-Pitman were all named in New Zealand age-group Touch squads. Many other students have also achieved Regional representative status. Congratulations to all of these students. Another of our FVHS High Achievers is Mrs Raylene Sommerville who was acknowledged



as a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit for her contribution to student exchange and to the community in the 2006 New Year Honours. Mrs Sommerville has made a huge contribution as a staff member at FVHS over the last 30 years.

Term Three this year started with two very sad events. The murder of Tokoroa school teacher Lois Dear was a great shock to the community, and we had many teachers in school that day preparing for the new term in the same way that she was.

One week later our School Caretaker Mr Bob Gibbons passed away suddenly at school. He was very popular with both staff and students, and our hearts went out to Mrs Gibbons and their family. Thank you to everybody for their support.

Our completely refurbished and remodelled Administration Block has been a great lift to us all, and we have received many positive comments it is a shame that I will not be working in my new office for very long!

I hope you enjoy reading this Yearbook. Thank you to our Editor, Melanie Tatham, and all who have contributed to these pages to celebrate the great year of 2006.

Chairperson's Report - Heather Rydon

Another year is complete at Forest View High School and we can all look back and see the highs and lows that contributed to the outcomes of the school.

A key focus this year was the development of Restorative Practice to raise the level of behavioural expectations within the school community. A plan to develop and implement Restorative Practice for behaviour management has seen staff receive professional development and meetings between students and family to discuss ideas for improved behaviour are now occurring.

The Health Promoting Schools programme has been introduced to nurture the Hauora of every individual and a committee is now focusing on issues and suggestions for a healthy working environment for all within the school.

Improved attendance has again been a focus and a school-wide strategy to improve levels of attendance through telephone calls, letters home, visits by Senior Management and Truancy assistance has continued with average attendance reaching 91% for terms 1 to 3.

The school has continued to enjoy pleasing success with student achievement. Comparing Forest View with other schools of decile 3 shows above average student success in NCEA, with 20 to 35% of our Pasifika and Maori students achieving higher qualifications than schools of a similar decile and makeup.

This success can be attributed to the dedication and enthusiasm of staff and management for learning and teaching. Well done to all for their achievements within the school.

The Administration block upgrade has been a long process and unfortunately is still awaiting final sign off due to difficulty with contractors but the majority of the work is complete. The entry to the school is now welcoming and attractive and offices for staff are comfortable and inviting. This is the final year of the current Board of Trustees' term, with an election to be held in March 2007. We will farewell Heather Rice from our Board at this time as she will not be standing for re-election. Heather has been Chairperson for a number of years and has led the school admirably throughout her term. I especially thank her for her dedicated work on the Board, leading a very green team after the last elections.

In my first year as Chairperson of the Board of Trustees I thank all members of the Board, Senior Management Team and Staff for their continued dedication to the life and achievements for all within Forest View High School.

Our school is committed to providing a learning environment that continues to inspire students to reach their potential.

We look forward to an equally successful, yet with its own challenges, 2007.

HEAD GIRL REPORT

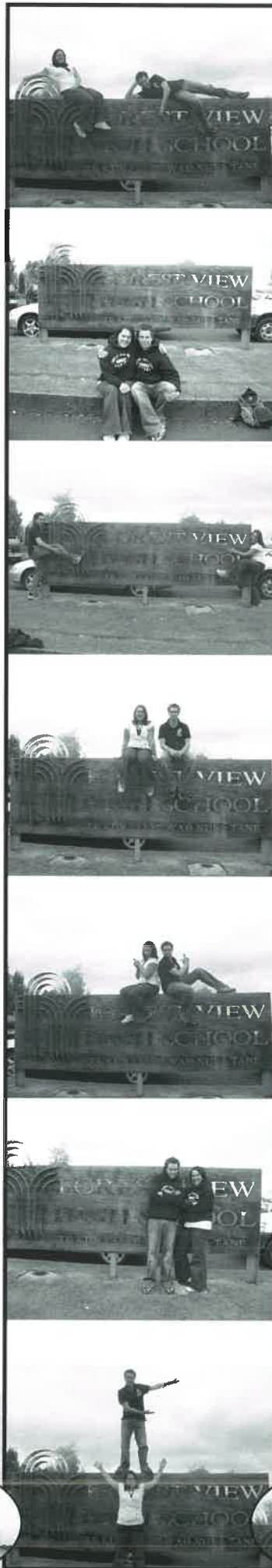

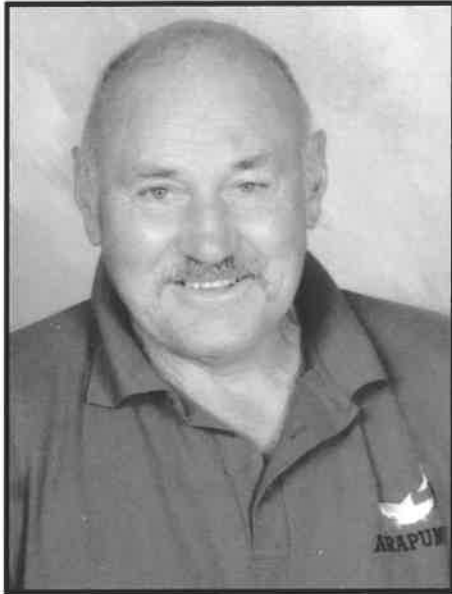
So to everyone thanks, thanks, thanks and more thanks go out to all of you and I leave you some advice to remember: Attitude determines Altitude!

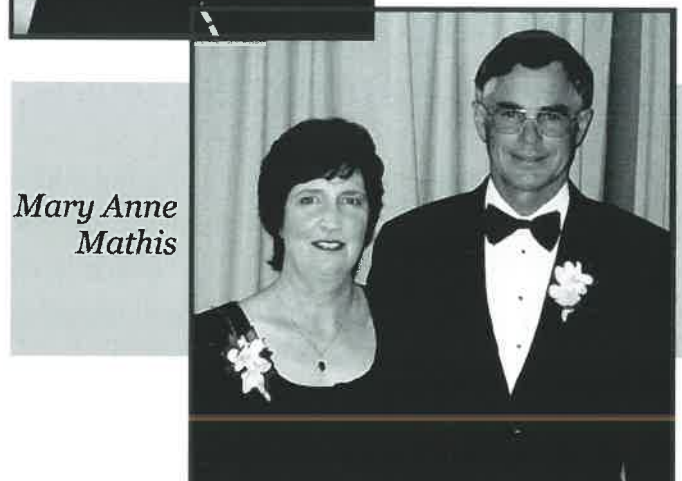
AND WE CONGRATULATED:

EXTENSION OPPORTUNITIES

AT FOREST VIEW 2006

Students at Forest View continue to be offered a diverse range of opportunities in academic, cultural, leadership and sporting areas to meet the needs of our students. So many students have been involved in activities such as Extension Seminars run each term; Future Problem Solving; participation in the Australasian Academic Competitions, BNZ Maths and WaiMaths; the Academic Exchange with Rotorua Lakes High School; National Drama School; Stage Challenge; Kurayoshi Exchange; Year 10 visit to Waikato University Open Day; Debating; BP Technology Challenge; holiday Science University courses for Seniors; Year 9 and 10 Extension group; the Captains' Leadership course; Production; Kapahaka; Polinetia Fa'atasi; musical groups; AFS; OPC. Most of these will be written about in other sections of the magazine.

During the year at least 130 students will have taken part in the Extension Seminars offered

Throughout the year. In Term 1 'Theatre Sports for Beginners' introduced the students who participated, to the fun involved with this. The students had to learn to think on their feet very quickly during the competitive improvisation exercises. Building self confidence and a belief in oneself is a very important part of Theatre Sports. In Term 2 we were indeed fortunate to have the chance to send 40 Year 10 students to Waikato University's Chemistry Department for a hands-on learning experience. The students appreciated the chance to use of the 'flash', expensive, high tech equipment. They were pretty excited to find they could make a hammer from a frozen banana! This experience gave the students the opportunity to visit the University and see what it is like first hand. For some it did finalise their decision to study Science in the future.

Term 3 was a day focusing on a field of Wearable Arts when the students were able to produce a



Graphic design to go on their T-Shirts. Those involved would like further opportunities to work in the fashion design, wearable arts area. Term 4 will enable students to take part in the Technology Challenge which is held in Hamilton, Bone Carving and hopefully weaving.

THINKING SKILLS GROUPS

Each Thursday morning this year has seen a small group of junior students learning to analyse and use different thinking skills, starting to understand more about their individual learning styles (and how that might relate to their making their study time more profitable), and also subjects such as time management, exam preparation and study techniques. During the first half of the year, it was Year 10 students who participated. During Terms 3 and 4, it is Year 9 students. The members of these groups have been chosen because they show leadership in some way either academically, or in sports or cultural areas. Each small group had a series of three or four weeks. To specifically think about thinking and hopefully, the skills they learned during these sessions have been put to good use in their curriculum or other areas of their lives. Feedback from

Students has indicated that setting aside a specific time to concentrate on these thinking skills has helped their overall performance at school and in life in general.

This was a great experience and I am glad I had the opportunity to take part in this exchange with Forest View High School and Kurayoshi Agricultural High School.

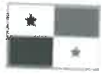

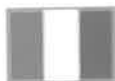
Michela Del Savio

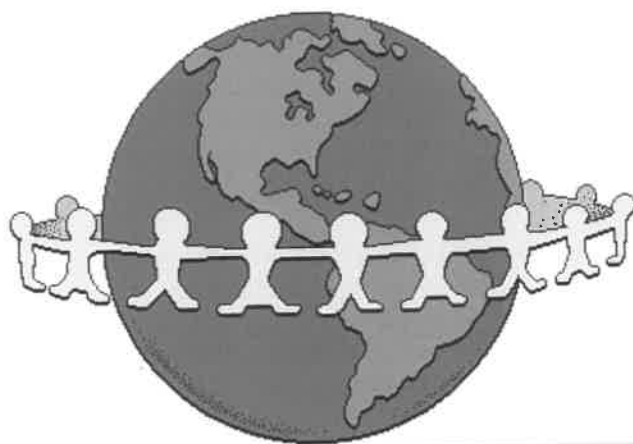

Windows to Dairying Careers Day

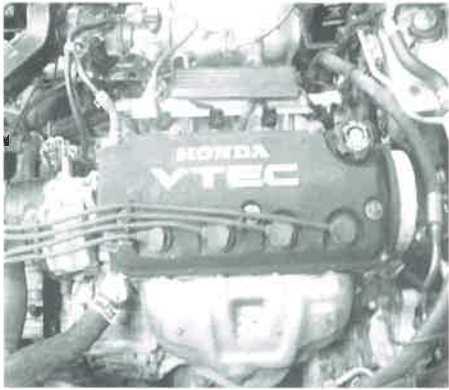


Agriculture Academy

FOREST VIEW AUTOMOTIVE SHOP



Forest View High School has been operating its own Auto Shop since 1997. The workshop is run as a full year's programme giving students the chance to work on a range of engines and cars, and develop skills to gain Unit Standards for the trade.



The workshop and classroom enable the students to do their theory as well as practical. This has allowed the explaining of theory on how engines work or operate. Making it a lot easier for them to understand how they work.

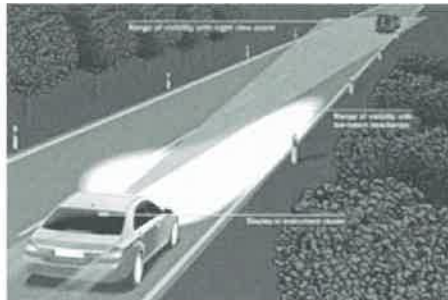
The class room also makes as a great room for visiting speakers, who come and share about what is



required for an apprenticeship, what bosses require from their workers and how their lives have been enriched within the automotive trade.



The Auto Shop is a hive of activity. The engines are stripped down, measured and then reassembled. Students are taught the history of the motorcar, and the changes that have taken place over the years. Safety is also taught to the students along with hand tools and equipment use in this trade.



To back up the theory we offer Unit Standards that are part of the pre - apprenticeship scheme for students to attain. This enables the student when they leave school, to gain a National Certificate in Foundation Skills Level 1 and Entry Skills Level 2 to enable them to go into an apprenticeship; the time spent in a polytechnic will be reduced due to



them gaining these Unit Standards

We have a number of cars from the public as well as staff who bring their cars for the students to carry out oil changes, tune-ups, and how to look after customers' cars.

All work is supervised by the tutor and all work is taught and delivered to the highest standard. The Automotive Industry is developing at a fast rate through the advancements in Technology, so the opportunities for specialized fields are many. This involves; **Electronics**-GPS, Radar, Tracking systems; **Computers**-Engine management, security, programming of engine systems; **Design**-developing cars of the future.



The aim of the Auto Shop is to produce young students of both sexes to become top quality Automotive Mechanics, and Engineers whether it is in the above fields or Auto Machining, Panel beating, Car Grooming or Light and Heavy Auto Mechanics.

GRAPHICS & TECHNOLOGY DEPARTMENT

This department continues to evolve with time. As technology continues to change, this department endeavours to satisfy the needs of the students and employment environment.

The essence of technology is to adapt to change in the environment and society.

Many of the courses offered have been adapted to the needs and wants of the students. Keeping in mind that the courses all offer a practical approach and outcome. The practical component of the courses this has generally been appreciated by the students. However one of the main concerns is the intentional damage carried out by some students. The teachers work hard to minimize this damage and are conscience of maintaining equipment in good working order. Generally students adapt well in the practical working Environment producing projects that they can be proud of. Projects range includes Muffin Tray, Stools, Tables, Bedside



drawers, and the odd entertainment cabinet; Outdoor brassiers, Peddle car, Soft faced hammer, model boat, plastic forming and electronics.

Students are consulted in each area of learning about the projects done each year. Their opinion is taken into consideration when the yearly programme of work is put together.

The various technological subjects offered encompass the vocational aspirations of the disciplines in the senior school.

The Technology subjects in the senior school include Graphics

which is assessed with the use of achievement standards.

The other senior subjects in technology are assessed with the use of unit standards, these subjects are Furniture Making and Automotive and Design and Technology.

In 2007 Mechanical Engineering Level One Diploma, is being introduced. This is a diploma compiled by Competenz, the Engineering Apprenticeship body. It consists of 40 unit standards, 24 of which must be obtained in the workshop environment.

This department endeavours to provide skills and knowledge required for the industrial environment. Staffs of the department include K.Haines, J. Bennett.

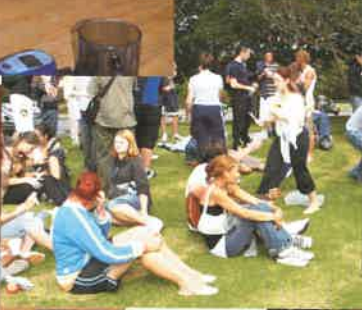

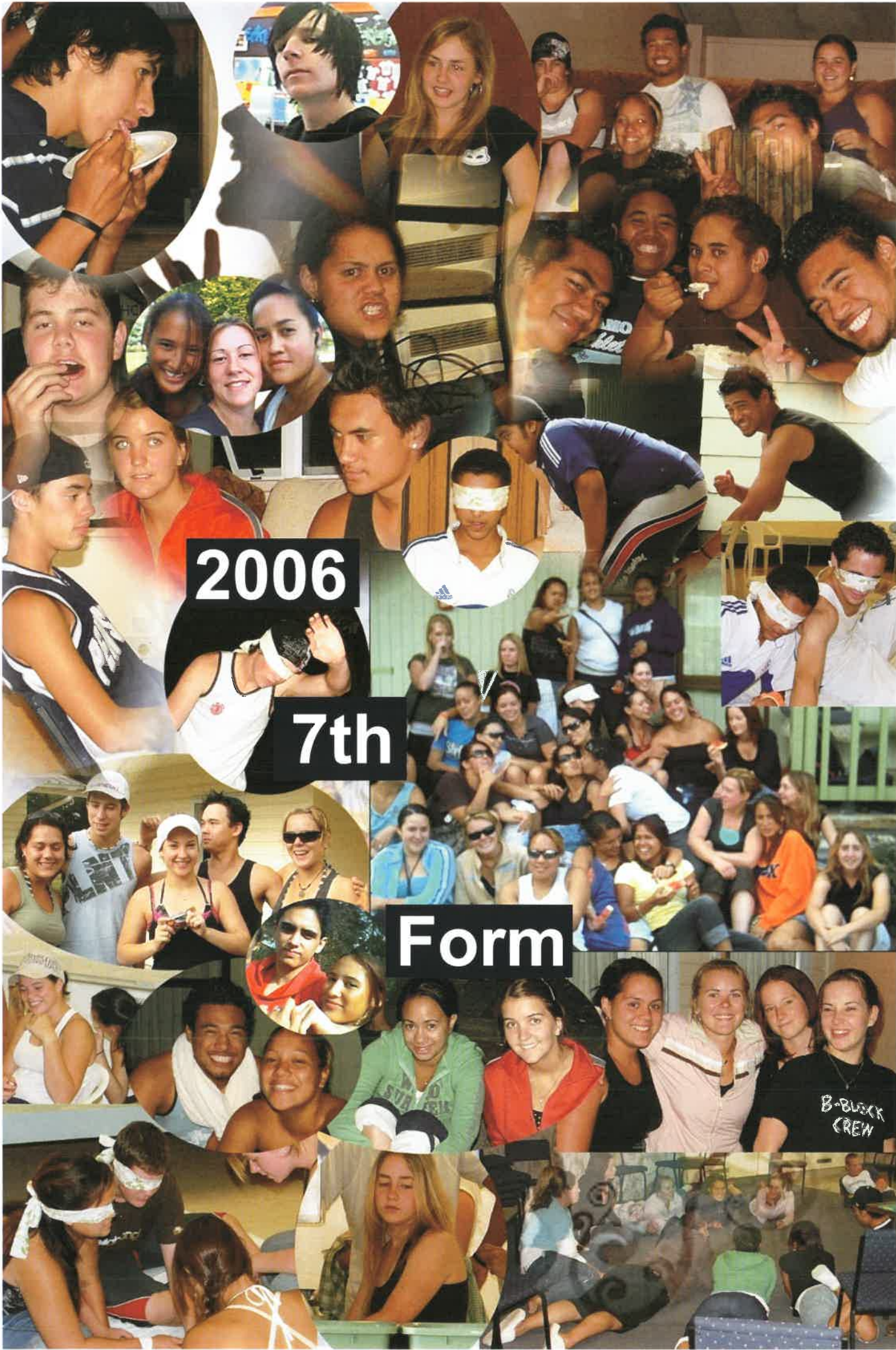
