Farewell



If you don't wear the uniform maybe you can't stay in the school.

I joined the Polynesian group but they haven't met much.

In Peru I always wear my shoes in the house but not here. I stay with a Cook Island family. I really like this culture. I like to see so much green grass. In Peru these are a lot more houses. My city is very big and Tokoroa is small. That means I can meet lots of people and it's peaceful.

I am learning to be independent without my family. I will be changed when I go home.

airport and the sky I was in my final destination, Panama.


I was taken to a hotel in the capital of Panama. On my way to the hotel I was shocked not only by the tropical climate, but by the amount of people I saw eating out of garbage cans. After getting over this shock I finally reached the hotel, and I spent three days with other exchange students from all over the world discussing and sharing funny life stories.

Three days went by and it was time for me to meet my host family - the people who were welcoming me into their home. I travelled twelve hours on a bus and finally arrived at my host family's home.

We sat, feasted and attempted to communicate. In my family I had a mum, dad, two brothers, one sister, on sister in law and three nephews, all living in the same house.

Two days went by and it was time for me to start school with one of my nephews. School life is very different in Panama - school gates open at seven in the morning and it starts at 7.15am. Gates are closed so no students can leave half way during the day. The detention system in panama is very different also. You get a choice of picking coffee beans all day in the blistering heat, or picking bananas in the heat. These aren't after school detentions either; this is during school having no breaks at all.

Every student has 13 subjects, but they only take 9 a day. The subjects I took were Geography, Biology, Physics, Chemistry, P.E., Orientation, Logics, Tourism, Spanish, English, Art, History and Computers. School assemblies were every Monday morning, where all students stood on the fields for up to an hour. School finished at 1.45pm, giving everyone time to get home before the rainstorms start. Once at



home teenagers are expected to study for up to 6hours. After studying teenagers have some time

to spend with their friends. Most teenagers spend their time playing soccer or sitting in the park sharing funny stories.

Everybody under the age of 18 usually left to go home at about 8.50pm, because in Panama everyone under 18 has a 9pm curfew. At 9.01 police come out to check on the streets - two police too one motorbike, one driving and the other on the back carrying a machine gun.

So many of you will be thinking why would anyone go there?

Well I'll tell you why I went and what I got out of my trip. My trip came to a total of 10,000 dollars. I applied for and was granted a \$2000 dollar scholarship, my family helped me fundraise, and I also worked hard to get more money for myself.

What did I get out of my \$10,000 one year trip? Well I gained heaps of friends from all over the world; I learnt Spanish, learnt about a new culture and had the best time ever.

So if your thinking about going on an AFS exchange, I say go for it! Its life changing and you'll have a blast. Thank you.

After months of AFS preparation, there I stood at the Auckland airport, still sussing out my credit card, no host family, no final destination or the slightest idea how to speak Spanish. I was DOOMED!!

SCIENCE EXTENSION SEMINAR

In Term 2, 38 Year 10 students were taken to the Chemistry and Physics Departments for a day hands on Science learning. The time was split between the two departments. It is great

to be able to offer this opportunity to our students and all indicated that they had thoroughly enjoyed the day.

Our students stated that some of the advantages in having this experience were: Being able to access Science technology not

available at school eg the Van der Graff generator; learning from University lecturers; getting to see the university campus and experience lecture theatres etc; expanding their Science knowledge and learning in a different environment

Some things the students said they had learned: Hydrogen is the fuel of the future but it cannot be stored easily;

Knowledge of sound waves and velocity; How many careers are available in Science; "I have a liking for Physics"; How to extract oil from orange skin;



That liquid nitrogen could freeze bananas so they could be used as a hammer and that freezing parsley made it easy to cut up!

Just what static electricity could do – seeing people's hair standing on end was great fun.


I am soldier Anthony Kennedy, fighting for my country. Standing with my rifle aimed at the opposing army trench, waiting for any sign of

Thanks again to Mrs Coffin for all her expertise, help and support. Arohanui and God Bless.



Thank you to everyone who has been involved in Touch at FV - our Coaches, our supporters and the players - you make Touch happen. Cheers.


















PAGIFIC ISLAND FONO
