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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

I acknowledge them for their leadership, support, and commitment.

As I have stated on previous occasions this team of people are our point of difference and it is because of them that Forest View High School in my view is the secondary school of first choice in our South Waikato region.

I consider it a privilege to be the Principal of Forest View High School. 2008 has been a special year. I look forward to the challenges and opportunities for achievement and development that 2009 will present.



The 2008 year is drawing to a close at Forest View High School and the Board of Trustees is extremely proud of the outcomes that the school has achieved throughout the year.

The school's strategic plan was finalised and gives the school some exciting direction for development and improvement from 2008 to 2010. The key motivation in the plan is taking Forest View High School from a good school to a great school and the Board is eager to support this vision in all areas of the school. With new principal, Richard Crawford, it has been interesting to see how he is beginning to stamp his mark on the school and encourage a culture of success within the school. The Board is very pleased with the direction in which the school is being managed.

Late in term three, the Education Review Office visited the school for an appraisal of activities and performances provided by the school.

The unconfirmed report has recently been received and I am pleased to report another very successful outcome for the school. The report will shortly be posted on ERO's website.

The in-school programme of professional development for staff has continued to focus on teaching strategies to ensure students are given the best possible opportunities for learning. Funding staff professional development is a key to improved student achievement and the Board is keen to continue this support.

Targets to improve student achievement set with the Ministry of Education in early 2008 will be reviewed early in 2009. Results from the 2007 targets to improve year 9 numeracy and literacy reported to the Board in February 2008 saw favourable outcomes. The school continues to develop programmes and expand on successful initiatives to continue this improvement.

The Board too, has benefited from considerable professional development, attending workshops and inviting trainers into the school to lead discussion and develop committees to ensure the Board governs with the same attitude.

A key discussion point this year for the Board and community has been the construction of a school Marae. Background information is currently being gathered to ensure the Board makes an informed decision on whether to move forward with the project. The property team is currently working with a contractor in organization for the tennis and netball courts to be resealed over the Xmas break. This new surface will ensure a safe surface for all activities and users of the facility. Alterations to the toilet block and tuck shop are also currently being worked on by the property committee.

The discipline committee has continued to enjoy a steady decline in the number of stand downs and suspensions. The school's RAP values are still a major focus for all within the school and are promoted at every opportunity to students.

The policy committee has ensured all procedures within the school are valid and realistic and that the school abides by Ministry of Education requirements.

I thank all members of the Board, Senior Management Team and Staff for their continued dedication to the life and achievements for everyone associated with Forest View High School.

Our school is committed to providing a learning environment that empowers students to become confident, connected, actively involved life long learners and the Board looks forward to continuing to support the culture of excellence that the school is striving to achieve.

FOCUS ON PACIFICA

In March this year three of our Senior students, David Tuputala, Rapotai Samuel and Toka Natua were given the opportunity to attend a Leadership Forum hosted by the Ministry of Education. Their focus on senior Pasifika students is seen as one way in which they can support schools to meet the goals within the Pasifika Education Plan of increasing Pasifika students' participation and achievement in education. All three students enjoyed this opportunity.

In June, the first of our Pacific Island Fonos for 2009 was held. The Theme was "Making choice Choices". We were thrilled with the number of families who attended and helped to make the night such a success. This years MC was our Head boy, David Tuputala along with Rapotai Samuel who has since left for an AFS student exchange in Denmark. Both students did a great job.

The first guest speaker was a past student, Jeremy Tafau. Jeremy spoke of his educational journey which is still progressing. He spoke of those things he really enjoyed whilst at FVHS, which set him on his pathway. He left to attend Drama School in Wellington, then moved into the retail area before heading to Australia. There he faced a number of life's barriers but came out having learned much from the experience. He married there, returned to NZ and is now a Youth Worker with South Waikato Pacific Island Health here in Tokoroa, giving to our community as it gave to him. His message was to 'Aim High' and never give up when faced with barriers. He encouraged each person to use all the resources and support networks around them to get on in life. He said that education is vitally important to future success and young people should make the most of there time at school and beyond.

Our second guest speaker was Tracy Keith-Matchitt, who left our school at the end of Year 13 in 2007. Tracy is a student who from the age of five had "this massive dream of designing houses". She said, "I used to say to the other kids, "when I grow up I want to design houses for people. Then I learnt one day that a person who designs houses was called an architect!". She told the audience, " As a high school student, I was just an average student who didn't over excel all that much in certain subjects. Now you might not believe me – have you ever heard people say Uni is only for brainy people. I say that this is a lie. I believe that Uni is for those people who are willing to put in the most time and effort who will succeed, and I feel that you can apply this theory to anything in life. I put in a lot of time and effort by self choice, to get the best marks possible. For me that meant travelling to Putaruru every Friday evening to do extra calculus because in all honesty, my Maths was not great and if I hadn't realised this and hadn't chosen to strive to get

better at it, I wouldn't be able to do architecture. I had to realise my weakness and decide what I had to do to make it better and choose to put that extra time and effort in so I could achieve this. Throughout my five years of high school, my goal was to get University Entrance and get into Architecture. Now I am there, it's a whole new playing field. University is like starting high school all over again but its run completely different. There are less direct instructions; you have to think of how to do it yourself. The big difference is that there is no second chances, you have to do it your best because there isn't a resit. In my course there are over 200 other students doing architecture and they're only taking 90 students into second year. It's really competitive. What now for me? My new goals are to pass first year and to get into second year. For me to conquer these challenges I've had to choose over my wants and do what's needed. It's all about making the right choices at the right time. But, it's a really good idea to do other activities like sports and cultural activities and the tutors really encourage that. It helps to keep that balance of work and play. I just want to sum up by saying that it's all about making the right choices at the right time. Think about how that choice will affect you and your goals. If you make the wrong choices, learn from them, but never let them stop you. Lastly, remember it's not always the brainy people who get far and succeed but the people who put in the most time and effort."

Those attending were entertained by our wonderfully talented Pasifika students. Toka, Allanah and Sheridan sang the opening hymn, and it was wonderful to have Polinetia Fa'atasi performing once again.

The second Fono was our 'Celebration of Achievement' evening held on 21 October. Our MC's for this special evening were David Tuputala and Toka Natua.

This Fono is to recognise and celebrate those Pacific students who have achieved well and exemplify the FVHS RAP values. This especially includes those students who focus on achieving their best and have positive participation to high levels in a range of academic, cultural and sporting areas along with those students who have excellent attendance. It was pleasing to see 39 students recognised in front of their proud families.

The night kicked off with a pe'e, a chant by Apera Brown. Later in the evening the audience applauded Ms Harvey and Mr Mutua's version of Stevie Wonder and Beyonce's 'So Amazing'. Toka Natua graced us all with one of her original songs, accompanied by Mrs Earnshaw and Polinetia Fa'atasi put on two great performances with their Samoan and Cook Island brackets.

Our Principal, Mr Crawford gave a strong message about the importance of FVHS working together with families to ensure the best possible achievement outcomes were possible for every students. Aiming to achieve and Positive Participation are vital for success.

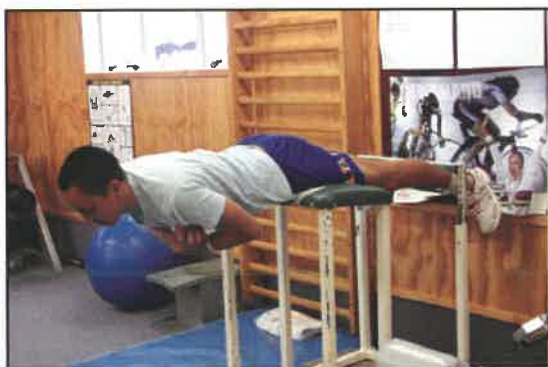

CHOIR

It has been a very eventful year for the Agriculture Academy students at Forest View. Some students have completed their National Certificate Level 2 and all have found a lot more about farming and its opportunities. Some students also took advantage of the opportunities offered in the Gateway programme. Students were involved in a number of social and training events.

Each year the school organises courses in practical farm skills. Students have learned to ride an ATV and motorbike although the trailer backing caused concerns for some. Tractor skills were extended when some people needed extra training in replacing ballcocks in water troughs!

Students have also participated in the Licence to Milk programme and a Cow Condition Scoring course in Tokoroa. Kevin MacDonald (a scientist with DairyNZ), who developed the Condition Scoring programme, kindly offered to spend time showing our Agriculture students the skill involved in this activity. For the senior class, it provided additional knowledge following their feed budgeting unit as condition scoring is an

important part of determining required feed levels. For the junior class, the skill is integral to their animal handling programme. Students also helped to weigh the cows so the information could be used for the DairyPush programme in the South Waikato. Helping at the DairyPush field days provides a variety of learning activities including parking management, ensured handouts are distributed, registered attendees, cooking the BBQ and cleaned up afterwards. Students also gained an insight into the programme and the business side of farming.

During the year, we have been lucky to add Mr Priscott to the staff in our classroom. We are also very fortunate to have the support of local farmers and other industry people who volunteer their time, expertise and workplaces to enable us to gain these extra skills. We are very grateful to the Tokoroa Host Lions Club for their on-going support which enables us to do a lot more for our students.

METALWORK



Forest View High School has been operating its own Auto Shop since 1997. The workshop is run as a full year's programme giving students the chance to work on a range of engines and cars, and develop skills to gain Unit Standards for the trade.

This year we ran the Motor Industry Training Organization (MITO) National Certificate in Foundation Skills Level 1 Start-Up programme again. This is designed to take students through the foundation skills required to enter the automotive industry. It enables the students to discover whether they want to go down the road of the automotive apprentice or look at different aspects of the industry.

Once the students have completed this section they then carry on to the National Certificate Pre-Entry to the Automotive Trade, Level 2, that enables them to go into an apprenticeship a lot easier; the time spent in a polytechnic will be reduced due to them gaining these Unit Standards

The use of the workshop and classroom combination has enabled the students to do their theory as well as practical work. This has made the explaining of theory on how engines work or operate a lot easier to teach as well as it being easier for them to understand how they work. The class room also makes a great room for visiting speakers, who come and share about what is required for an apprenticeship, what bosses require from their workers and how their lives have been enriched within the automotive trade.

The Auto Shop is a hive of activity. The engines are stripped down, measured and then reassembled. Students are taught the history of the motorcar, and the changes that have taken place over the years. Safety in the Automotive Industry is an important part of the delivery of this subject. Students have to complete one of the safety unit standards at a commercial automotive industry as well. This also enables the students to taste working in the industry.

The activities undertaken in the auto shop enable the students to experience working with hand tools and equipment use in this trade.

We have a number of cars from the public as well as staff who bring their cars for the students to carry out oil changes, tune-ups, and learn how to look after customers' cars. All work is supervised by the tutor and all work is taught and delivered to the highest standard.

The Automotive Industry is developing at a fast rate through the advancements in Technology, so the opportunities for specialized fields are many. This involves; Electronics-GPS, Radar, Tracking systems; Computers-Engine management, security, programming of engine systems; Design-developing cars of the future.

The aim of the Auto Shop is to produce young students of both sexes who are able to become top quality Automotive Mechanics and Engineers, whether it is in the above fields or Auto Machining, Panel beating, Car Grooming or Light and Heavy Auto Mechanics.

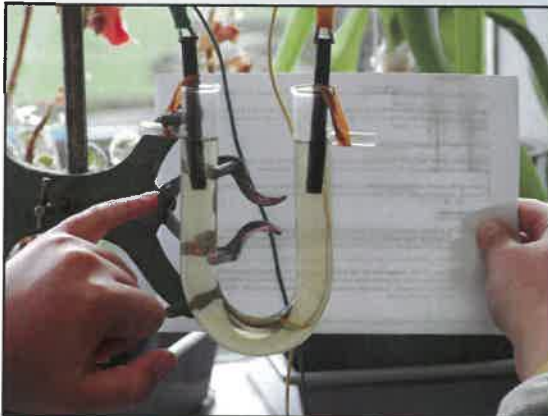
Students are encouraged to extend themselves in Science and can do the Australian Science exam as well as the Otago University Science Quiz.

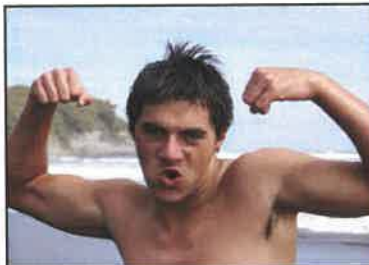
Our famous moments:

Over all it was a mean trip and it is well worth taking Geo to be on next year's trip.

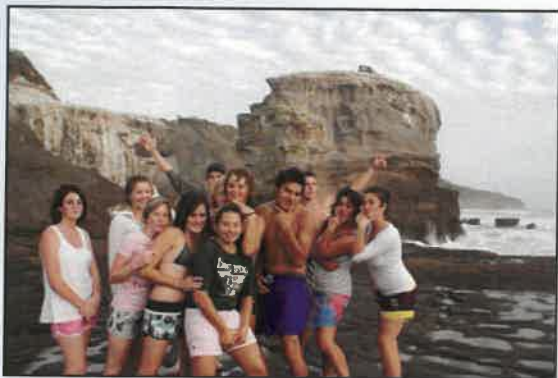




YEAR 12 HISTORY

The following is the speech presented by Teahlie Maraku at Nga Manu Korero 2008. She placed second in the English Speech category. She chose the topic

from a list given to her, and then researched Ta Moko by interviewing whanau and kaumatua. She also included her own thoughts on the topic.

I WEAR MY TA MOKO ON THE INSIDE - TEAHLIE MARAKU

Oh My Gosh look at that ta moko, faah I wish I had one like his one. Dayum that ta moko is funky. Ntaaww I want one just like his one.

I had the honour to talk to two tohunga of Ta moko, they were Matua Mark Kopua from Ngaati Porou and Matua Herewini Tamihana from Te Arawa

I ask them about the topic I have chosen "I wear my moko on the inside", they laugh at me and said "it should read moko "I wear my Ta moko on the inside" not moko which mean abbreviation for mokopuna nei. They should know!!!

People seem to think that if they wear and do Maori things then they'll be Maori on the inside. Im here to tell you that this isn't true. Because being Maori comes from within. For me, I wear my ta moko on the inside.

Let's talk about Ta moko. People think Ta moko is cool. Some people just get them to fit in to feel more Maori or worse more New Zealand. If you walk down any main street today I bet you'll see young New Zealanders with Ta moko, even celebrities like American boxer, Mike Tyson, American musician Ben Harper and British pop star Robbie Williams have ta moko in very visible places. But Ta moko with what meaning? A fashion statement, a trend an accessory. But what is Ta moko? Is it just a funky design?

NO! As Winstone Peters said NO!!! Ta Moko isn't just a funky design it's more than that. Ta Moko represents your Whakapapa and a signature of the past. Each Ta moko is different and unique. Ta Moko is like a written language that tells people about your background and life stories. It's an honour to wear Ta moko- they represent integrity, Maori identity and prestige. Wearing Ta moko doesn't only demonstrate your pride in being Maori; it shows others your life identity and what you believe in.

After searching many days and many nights, looking for the right person to interview about wearing Ta moko, I found somebody. That somebody was my aunty Mei. I asked Aunty Mei, 'what does Ta moko mean to you?'

KOTIRO, she said, to me Ta moko means my maoriness and remembering those who have passed on. She told me that she inherited her Ta moko from her great-grandmother and that her karaua aged 95 had to prey and commune with god and the spirits for 2 days and 2 nights to allow her to wear her Ta moko. She got her Ta moko because she had a pain that felt like it had been planted in her body. Aunty Mei wears her Ta moko on the outside because she's carrying her great grandmother around with her.

We need to follow the examples of our modern- day Maori heroes and heroines who have worn their Ta moko on the inside. People like our Maori king, Kingi Tuheitia who comes from a long line of role models and icons to unite Maori as one. Jenny-May Coffin because of her dedication and commitment in the sporting arena and she promotes Maori in the media and many more.

For now I will strive to be like these heroes and when I do get a Ta moko I want to be sure that I am getting one for the right reasons. I don't want to wear a Ta moko to show off or brag about being Maori. When I do think I am ready to wear a Ta moko, first I will go to my koro and ask his permission- he will decide when I am worthy to wear a Ta moko. He will talk to me about our Whakapapa and decide what I will have and where to put it. Then he will decide who should do the moko.

In my conclusion!

To me there is nothing that is more beautiful or powerful than a Ta moko because that represents who you are, and nobody has the right to take it from you.

But until that time my body craves for a Ta moko like Aunty Mei's I choose to wear my Ta moko on the inside.

No reira ko Teahlie Maraku ahau.

No Ngai Te Rangi tooku iwi.

Ko mataatua tooku waka.

Ko maunga Mauao tooku Maunga

Ko Wairoa toku Paa.

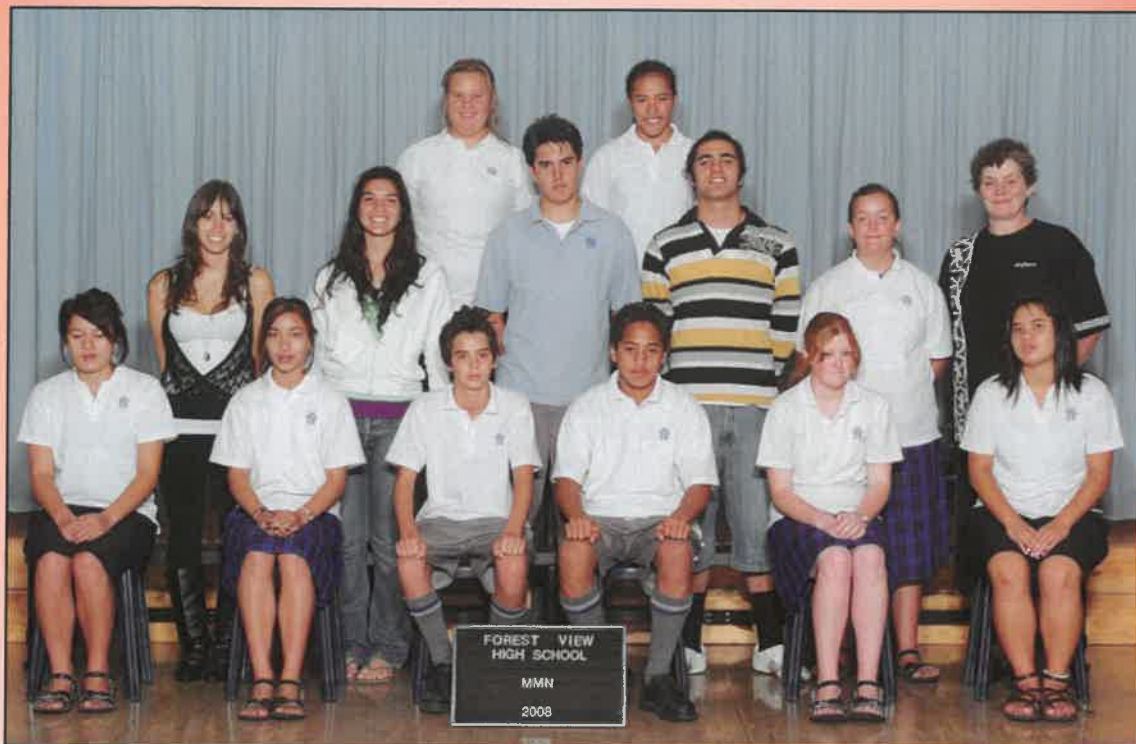

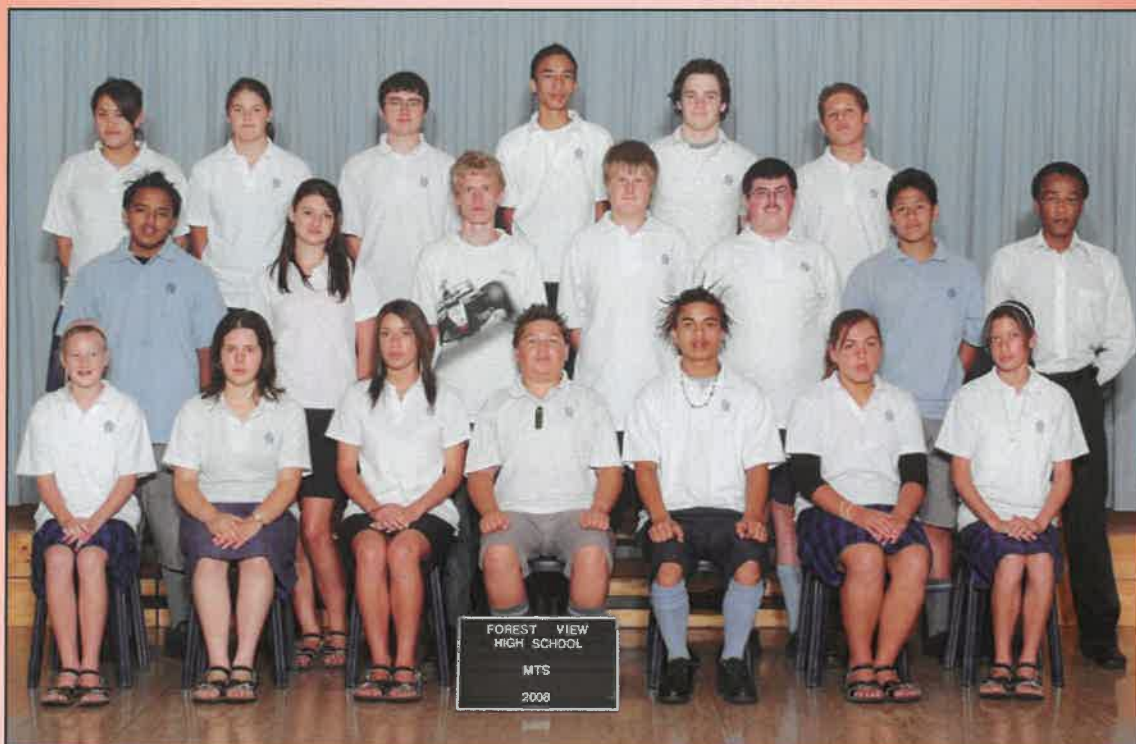

A MESSAGE FROM THE DEAN

It has been a great achievement this year to win the Athletics, Swimming and Cross Country trophies for 2008. Our aim was to try and have the P in the RAP values applied. It was great to see improved participation in these events, but also over 62% of our students participated in sporting and cultural opportunities offered by FVHS. It would be good to increase this figure even further in 2009 as FVHS does provide so many possibilities for its students. We want all our students to strive to be the best they can be and uphold the FVHS RAP values. We also want them to take pride in our Lake and in all our academic, sporting and cultural achievers. In 2007 we were yet again runner up for the Interlake Trophy.
