This has been my first year in my new role and it has been a challenging, yet extremely rewarding, year.



The Minister of Education, Hekia Parata, wrote a letter congratulating our School on our achievement levels - our 2011 NCEA results were mostly at or above national achievement levels. She also visited the School in September to meet with our Board of Trustees, staff and students. She was left in no doubt that Forest View is delivering great outcomes for our students. The School is well-placed to meet the government requirement of 85% of school leavers leaving school with NCEA Level 2.

Of special significance is our success in creating real pathways for students to transition into a wide range of university, polytechnic and employment opportunities. Another group of students leaves Forest View this year. Most are ready to take on the challenges their future holds; some have their pathways clearly marked out; some are looking forward to leaving our community for

further education or employment and others will remain in the South Waikato. I hope they enjoy success – we will follow their progress with interest.

Led by our Head Students, Teish Taikato and Brendon Shepherd, our 2012 student leaders have been an inspiration to others. Their leadership, their involvement in student-focused activities and their assemblies contributed to a positive school environment.

Forest View was well-represented throughout the year in the sporting arena. Staff, parents and students worked together to ensure there was high participation in the sports we offer. Our sportspeople are extremely talented and they endeavoured to represent our School with distinction and pride. In 2013, a Sports High Performance programme and High Performance Sports classes will also begin.

The Performing Arts Week that replaced our annual production was a marvellous expression of talent and hard work. The passion and commitment of all staff and students is outstanding. Polinetia Fa'atasi, Te Piringitahi, our dance groups, drama groups, rock bands, lighting and sound, and individual performers - contribute so much to the creative and cultural spirit of our School. Many of our students are also acquiring NCEA Credits as a result of their performances.

The Education Review Office visited in Term 1 and we received an extremely positive ERO report with the next review scheduled in three years' time. The report highlighted the improvements and the many areas of good practice that make our school a place in which the Tokoroa community should have great confidence. The review team noted that Forest View is well placed to sustain and improve its performance.

The BOT is determined to provide modern learning environments for our students. This year has seen the refurbishment of the Wood Technology, Graphics, and Metal Technology workshops; two Science labs and the Gymnasium. The auditorium will be refurbished next year. By the start of 2013 our school will have wireless access to the internet throughout the campus. Students will have easier access to their learning programmes and resources via the internet. There is still an emphasis on student citizenship in a digital learning environment

Forest View's Board of Trustees and Staff are totally confident that our School is making a real difference in the lives of our students and preparing them for fulfilling futures. We have some challenges to face but we do so knowing our efforts are going in the right direction. We are determined to ensure we have a high performing school that will produce great citizens able to meet the challenges of the future.

Watching students learning and achieving, playing sports, performing and leading; and observing staff working with passion and commitment makes my job the best one in education.


FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVING AND JUNIOR EXTENSION STUDENTS

Veronika Banko from Hungary.

Hi! My name is Veronika Bankó but everyone calls me Ronnie. I'm from Székesfehérvár, Hungary. I chose to come here as an exchange student mostly because of my sister who was here 8 years ago. She told me a lot about this country. What attracted me by what she said was NZ's nature. When I arrived to NZ in February and sat into the car, I almost got a heart attack because I thought we will crash into another car. After a second I realised everyone drives on the left hand side, not just my host Dad! I was also surprised at the colour of the grass. In Hungary the grass is usually dark and a bit dried. Since I'm here I can't count how many times I got this question: "Are you hungry?"! It sometimes drives me crazy but I've got used to it now. :)

School here is really different: more relaxed and easier. In Hungary everyone has to study hard, not just at school but in the afternoons, often at night too. If the students don't behave in class, the teacher can say: "get a piece of paper and write down what you heard". If you didn't pay attention you don't know what to write. It means you'll get a bad mark for it. If you don't pass most of the exams, you have to repeat the whole year. The food was actually pretty good but if I had the option to try the foods again I think I would turn that offer down.

MISATO KITA


Our sister school from Misato Kita High School arrived on a cold wet day and met their billets, with whom they stayed for the next 7seven days.

Where they live in Japan is only one hour from Tokyo, so Tokoroa was a lot different from what they were used to.


They had a wonderful time and visited many different places including David Henry Kindergarten, North School, Waitomo Caves, Rotorua and had


LIGHTING AND SOUND

palagi neighbour, Peter Burton.




It was great to see over 25% of the school participating in the performances.


















ATHLETICS

these events.


Our strengths in the throwing and jumping events came to the fore.




They each ran a lap of 3.2 km against other teams from all over the North Island and finished 7th in the youth category.






Junior Netball



BASKETBALL


2012 has been a very successful year for basketball.


