In the four months since the new board took office, we have attended board training and numerous meetings to ensure that we are meeting the commitments of the school in raising student achievement.


The Board is currently working in consultation with a wide range of community members to develop

Julio Rodriguez, Fonterra area manager, was the guest speaker. He spoke of his progress from straitened family circumstances in Mexico and California, to his current position with Fonterra. He had three simple messages for students.

He asked them to consider the concept of "Now". Whilst it is important to know who and where you are NOW, it is vital to think of the future; that what you are today, is not what you can be in the future.

He then compared a young person to an apple – the promise to grow and flourish is embedded in all of us, just as it is embedded in an apple-seed.

Finally he spoke of the importance of 1954 – the year in which the 4 minute mile was broken by Roger Bannister. Thereafter others were able to beat the mark, because Bannister's success had removed an invisible barrier – a lack of self-belief and doubt had been replaced with reality.

Mr Rodriguez reminded students that for hopes to come to fruition, hard work is required.

Next year, we hope to continue with the same activities and are looking to add mountain biking and Bushcraft to the experiences on offer




GRAPHICS AND TECHNOLOGY

AUTOMOTIVE

Forest View High School has been operating its own Auto Shop since 1997.

It is a fully accredited MITO (Motor Industry Training Organization) and delivers all Level One and Two /Unit Standards. We are also NZQA registered. The workshop is run as a full year's programme giving students from Year 11 - 13 the chance to work on a range of engines and cars, and develop skills to gain Unit Standards for the trade.

The activities of the Auto shop involve the stripped down, measured and then reassembling of engines that must start and run correctly to gain a pass The activities undertaken in the course enables the students to experience working with hand tools and equipment use in this trade..

The use of the workshop and classroom combination has enabled the students to do their theory as well as practical. This has made the explaining of theory on how engines work or operate a lot easier to teach as well as for them to understand how they work.

The Automotive Industry is developing at a fast rate through the advancements in Technology, so the opportunities for specialized fields are many -the aim of the Auto Shop is to help foster top quality Automotive Mechanics, and Engineers in any of the automotive fields.

ICT

There have been a lot of changes this year in our Department.

After many years Mrs Williamson has stepped down as Head of Department and Mrs Walker has taken over the role. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Mrs Williamson for her years of hard work and dedication.

We introduced a Digital Information Technology Level 2 and a Computer Hardware and Software course. We also had our inaugural Digital Technology week to promote the use of technology.

The majority of our senior students have completed or are nearing their completion of a National Certificate in either Computing or Business Administration and Computing.

In 2014 we plan to introduce Level 3 Digital Information Technology and Computer Hardware and Software to keep building on the subjects that we can offer our students to study, both of these courses are approved subjects for University Entrance.



SENIOR PE

Senior PE has once again had a successful year in FVHS.

With a large number of students coming through the facilities each week, it has been rewarding to be able to offer them full use of the brand new gym once again. The Year 13 PE class has had a busy year - training for the Rotorua Tough Guy and Tough Gal Event (mud run) which they completed while enduring a massive hailstorm. The class had an excellent time and were overall very successful in the event.

WOOD PROCESSING

This Year saw the introduction of a Partnership programme developed between New Zealand Primary Industries, Carter Holt Harvey and Forest View High School.

This programme was to give students the experience of working in the industrial environment. The Partnership allowed for students to experience the work environment at CHH Plywood Factory.

The students went through the complete employment Health and Safety procedures including drug testing, H&S induction course followed by ten visits. On each visit the students worked at different work stations and got first -hand experience of what employment was about.

The students were exposed to the industry expectations and worked alongside experienced process workers. They were also given lectures on the processes required to work in the Wood Processing Industry. 
were valuable lessons learnt about Time Management and Expectations in the Work Place.



Our season is over and we came 2nd in our division. I'm also dancing in Polinetia Fa'atasi and we competed in the PBN competition in which we came 2nd and also got the Best Musician trophy too. Practices are hard, as I've never been a dancer, but I have learnt to do dances from Samoa, Tonga and the Cook Islands.

It is very hard to do, but in the end it looks and feels awesome. I am looking forward to travelling to Sydney and then sailing on a P & O cruise around the South Pacific with our Poly group. It's going to be awesome!



I've had to do a lot of things for the first time, like weeding the garden lol. I know 2 languages now, and my outlook on things is different. I can understand English easier now and I'm more mature than I was before.

Hi, I am 16 years old and I am have spent my exchange year here in New Zealand. I chose to go to another country because I wanted to experience another culture. Another reason was to improve my English since it's one of the most common languages in the world. I thought it might be a good idea for the future to be fluent in English.

When I first arrived in NZ one of my biggest worries was that I wouldn't fit in the social community, that I wouldn't be able to find friends. Adjusting to the behaviour of New Zealand people was a major difficulty for me – for example,



participating

in a new sport or cultural group.

I had to learn to be more open for new stuff.

What I really like in New Zealand is that people have got an open mind for almost everything. They are interested in sharing their culture and getting to know other cultures.

Comparing FVHS to my school back in Germany you can see some big differences, starting with the number of students. FVHS has got 430 students and back in Germany in my school we had three times that many. I really enjoyed the regionals and Kapahaka performances so far and all my rugby games. I enjoyed visiting Auckland at the Year 12 trip and visiting other near towns.

I really enjoyed participating in both of those, because I learned a lot, not only about the sport or the culture but also about me and what I want to do with my future.
