



Forest View High School turned 40 this year

In 1974, the doors opened at Forest View High School.

The building programme was incomplete but the 185 Form 3 students could not be accommodated at Tokoroa High School, which had well over 1300 students. The town was growing at such a pace, that the Department of Education was contemplating having to open a third secondary school in the future.

In October, 2014, the School celebrated their 40 years with a reunion of staff, students and community supporters. A great time was had by those who attended the Friday night gettogether, the Saturday formalities and sports, and the dinner Saturday evening. The weekend concluded with a church service on Sunday.



Leadership over the Years

Mr J. D. (David) Thain, Headmaster 1974- 1991

At the time of the School opening, His Excellency Sir Dennis Blundell said that whether or not the school gets off to a good start, or achieves fine traditions, depends on its foundation staff and pupils; that the Headmaster gives the impetus, and by learning in the broadest sense, the pupils will get the school properly off the mark.

in the 1974 School Magazine, Mr Thain wrote of the pupils and staff of the new Forest View High School as having "shared a real initiation of trial by endurance". The School opened two weeks late on 13 February; the grounds were a dust bowl; there was no heating at the start of winter; building was continuing so tradesmen were everywhere: there was no footpath up Baird Road to the new school; teaching resources were limited.

Despite the "tremendous challenges" of resourcing, Mr Thain set about establishing a school in which young people would be expected to work hard, to strive for excellence, to develop the resilience needed to overcome challenges and adversity. The expectations were embodied in the two School mottos, adopted during Mr Thain's tenure – Kia Kaha, Kia toa, Kia Manawanui – Courage knows no defeat.

In the early years, some people in the community referred to FVHS as "Tokoroa Grammar School" because of the emphasis on academic excellence and traditional values. The rules were there to ensure all were able to achieve and there was little deviation from these expectations – staff and students alike were treated with courtesy and respect, uniform was worn correctly, students were prepared for learning, homework was done, litter was put in the bins provided, students were expected to always do their best – in sport, in cultural pursuits, academically and as citizens. At that time, 'the cane' and ' the strap' encouraged some young people to adhere to the rules! Despite the usual school-yard pranks, most students left the School with high personal standards and values, well-equipped for life beyond school.

Mr Thain encouraged young people to enjoy their time at school and he was always supportive of extra-curricular activities such as school camps, the annual sports exchange with Taradale High School and the Sixth Form Trip to Auckland. A Maori culture group was established in 1976; school drama productions became a regular event in the eighties; a wide variety of sports were offered. Students who took leadership roles, or who represented the School in the top teams of their sport, were recognised with Representative badges, presented at assembly.

By the time Mr Thain retired, after almost eighteen years of service to Forest View High School, there was no doubt that he had ensured Forest View got off to a good start. The establishment of a tradition of excellence, and the concept of learning in its broadest sense, has enabled the School, its pupils and our community to enjoy success and have the resilience needed to overcome adversity.

He was followed by Principals - Peter Lee, 1991-1995; Robert Blucher 1996-2007; Richard Crawford, 2007 – 2012; Ian Ferguson, 2012 - present

The School has continued to build on the initiatives of past leaders of the School and to encourage students to strive for excellence. Students are encouraged to focus on their future and to adhere to the RAP values, taking advantage of the wide range of learning on offer both in and beyond the classrooms, gaining the necessary qualifications and aiming for excellence in their endeavours. Partnerships of benefit to the students continue to be developed within Tokoroa and further afield; e-learning is an integral part of learning.

Just as in 1974, Forest View High School is firmly committed to ensuring young people develop the skills, competencies and attributes needed to be valuable contributors to both School and society.





From the present Principal, Mr Ian Ferguson

When Forest View High School opened in 1974, no-one could have imagined the changes that would occur in curriculum. The pupils who started in those early years, were destined for traditional qualifications – School Certificate, University Entrance, Bursary and Scholarship examinations.

The advent of the Geoff Burridge Trust and the Forest Skills programme, transition courses and work experience, in the 1980's expanded opportunities for students. In 1999, Forest View High School made the innovative move to offer both the traditional qualifications and to introduce Unit Standards contributing to National Certificates. This move was made to ensure students were able gain qualifications that reflected more than examination performance.

in the early years, the role of teachers was to act as conduits of knowledge; calculators with relatively simple functions were introduced; almost all classes were taught on site; assessment took the form of written tests and percentage results; the curriculum on offer attempted to match courses to students' differing abilities, interests and likely career paths. Then, as now, the best teachers were committed and passionate people who developed excellent relationships with students.

The landscape of education has changed considerably. With the advent of NCEA, teachers, students and parents have to understand the number of credits needed to get Levels 1, 2 and 3; the use of assessment criteria to get achieved, merit and excellence grades; internal and external assessment regulations and processes. New courses are constantly being developed to meet student needs and prepare them for a wide range of vocational pathways.

An increasing amount of learning is occurring in partnership with the community. This year a group of students attended a Waiariki Polytech course in Healthcare; another group works at Carter Holt Harvey as part of the Wood Processing Academy; others are working towards qualifications in Agriculture, Business Administration and Computing; a large number complete work experience on the Gateway programme.

E-learning has been embraced by Forest View. Teachers and students can access the internet anywhere at School, through wireless connections, using a wide range of devices such as phones, tablets and laptops. Most classes have an e-learning component and a wide variety of software is accessed for learning. Soon all students will be able to access learning information, 24/7, through the internet. Students and parents can monitor achievement levels by using an app to access our student management system.

Forest View is part of the Volcanics E-learning Consortium which enables students to access a wide range of courses either not available at School, or unavailable because of timetabling clashes. This type of learning relies on greater levels of student self-management and the support of inschool staff. Teachers can collaborate with teachers from other schools using video-conferences.

In 2014 the role of teachers as leaders of learning is just as important as it was in 1974, but they work in different ways. Teachers are increasingly supporting students through individualised, and small group, learning. There is a focus on developing the key competencies of self-management, participating and contributing, relating to others, thinking skills and understanding language, symbols and texts, as these competencies are crucial to students becoming lifelong learners. Learning activities are designed to encourage these competencies. How students use knowledge is now as important as acquiring knowledge.

There is certainly more freedom to learn in different ways, but at the core of good learning is the relationship between students and teachers and the quest for excellence — characteristics of Forest View High for forty years.


In 2014, both Ms Olsen and Ms Toy went on maternity leave. Congratulations to Ms Olsen and her husband,

Farewell to Heather Williamson, after 40 years of service



2014 has been a year of milestones for Heather Williamson.

Earlier this year, she and Brian celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary. Forest View High has been such a significant part of Heather's life that there was a big contingent of current and past staff at that function. And then we recognised 40 years of outstanding service to Forest View.

In October 1974, Heather's time at the school began, initially in a part-time role. Heather was the typing teacher – no digital technology then – working with Karen Bradley as her HOD. She quickly proved to be a dedicated caring teacher and, of course, she became firmly established as Mrs Netball in the school.

Heather was an old hat at life in the South Waikato, so took it upon herself to welcome newcomers to Forest View High School staff. She has extended the hand of friendship to new teachers from throughout New Zealand and from overseas, earning herself the honorary title of "Aunty Heather" from her colleagues and their families. She and Brian had a garage full of excess furniture which furnished many a school flat or school house.

Heather entered teaching through the back door – she was an accomplished typist and the school needed a typing teacher, so she accepted Mr Thain's offer of employment, quickly making herself invaluable to the school. However, she did well in later years to fit study into her hectic schedule – completing a formal typing qualification at one stage. She also completed the Graduate Diploma of Information Technology Education through Wintec.

A5 was her home away from home – such was Heather's dedication to this school and the young people in it.

Heather has given her all for what was initially the typing and commercial department, and then in recent years the Information technology department – initially as the typing teacher and then as HOD. She was quick adopter of technological change, moving alongside Hugh Durham, to get those first cumbersome computers of the 1980s into the school.

The enthusiasm with which she has adopted change also extended to NCEA.

In his nomination of Heather for a National Education Service Award, Robert Blucher wrote "Her foresight and drive in the development of National Certificate courses at FVHS make us a leading school in this field and provide wonderful opportunities for our students". Needless to say the nomination was successful and Heather was the recipient of the prestigious award in 2000.

Heather has been recognised as a leader in her subject, by serving as a University Bursary marker and a moderator for her subject area and introducing qualifications such as the National certificates of Business Administration & Computing, She took responsibility for the stationery room, using the profits to buy computers as technology changed, to support the development of the IT department and to support other school-wide resourcing.

She was instrumental in establishing & administering the Mufti Fund which has supported numerous young people as they pursued their sports at regional or national level.

Heather has definitely been Mrs Netball at Forest View High School. Heather could have been excused if her local and national responsibilities to netball, especially in umpiring and administration left her no time to be involved with school netball – but she has a passion for the sport, and has instilled that same passion in several generations of Forest View High school young women. She has ensured young people not only achieve on court, at the highest levels, but she has encouraged them, and tutored them, to contribute to the sport as umpires and to coach" littlies" with Fun Ferns.

Not only FVHS netball benefitted from Heather's commitment. Her boys played rugby for FVHS; Brian was their number one supporter - a dedicated coach and manager. Rugby was a family affair. The team could guarantee a meal, some motherly advice, lots of laughter, some good parties – all available at Elizabeth Drive.

Heather has always had high personal standards and has gone out of her way to ensure young people adopted the same high standards. If a young person made the mistake of failing to say please, of not allowing an adult to go through the door first, of not removing a hat inside, it was Heather who quietly and gently pointed out that "That is not polite, nor good manners". She was their parent away from home.

Almost without fail, young people addressed her as Mrs Willi – not a sign of disrespect, but of affection. They have huge respect for Heather – they understand and accept, and most importantly, adopt her values and high standards.

Her Tutor group has always been dear to her – she has mothered them, cared for them, scolded them and loved them.

Each year she shopped for gifts for her Year 13 leavers – something they treasured.

Heather's concern has not only been for young people whilst they were at school – she has also served the school as Careers Adviser, helping many young people transition to the world of work and tertiary study.

Heather's contribution to our community has been significant. She has served the Hillary Commission, the South Walkato Education Trust, the South Walkato Sports and Leisure Board; most recently she has been part of the establishment of the Sports & Leisure Centre. She is a Justice of the Peace.

Through her involvement with these groups, she has made educational and sporting opportunities available for many young people. We are very glad that, although she is leaving Forest View High School, she is not leaving our community.

It was she who coined the phrase "Forest View Family". This is an important legacy that Heather leaves - the concept of family, of being whanau, has given the students and staff a strong sense of belonging; it has given strength in the face of adversity, and sadness; it has given great pleasure to be able to share times of celebration with the Forest View family.

We are very pleased that Brian and the boys shared Heather with us. She has been a friend, a colleague, a supporter, a sports coach, a mentor; an adviser, a counsellor, a wonderful skilled teacher and unstintingly loyal to the School.





There have been two major events this year for the Agriculture programme.



Gateway

It has been another busy year for Gateway at Forest View with over 50 students having been in the programme this year.

Placements have been in a wide variety of industries – building, agriculture, physio, Fonterra, automotive, early childhood and primary teaching, engineering, vets, hospitality,

painting, sport, tourism, music production, psychology, dietetics, medicine, hairdressing, CHH and lots of other odd ones.

Students gain valuable vocational credits on their placements as well as attending workshops on health and safety, customer service and getting their first aid certificates



CACTUS Programme

During Term 1, the school was approached by Kylie Tatham of Bluelight and Graham Hill of the Tokoroa Police and invited to join the CACTUS programme. Twenty five students, Years 11-13 were selected to participate in this pilot programme, to start early in Term 2.

Following the success of the first group, a second group of 26 students took part in the Term 3 group.

Each group committed to being ready for the programme, three days a week, for eight weeks, at 6.00 a.m. in the morning. The students in CACTUS are challenged to push themselves in physically demanding activities, to work as part of a team to overcome challenges; to prove to themselves that "I can", not "I can't".

Day 1 of the programme was the first exposure to the discipline which is an integral part of the programme. Students had to be ready to start the demanding physical activities by 6.00 a.m. Those who were late were visited by the other students, who had to run to collect them. Obviously, no-one was late thereafter! Adults were to be addressed as 'Staff'; the discipline of marching was taught; students had to have a quick shower and be dressed for school before marching to breakfast.

Breakfast required a commitment from families – parents, family and supporters were at School at 6.45 a.m, cooking the wonderful food that was so generously donated by New World, Tokoroa.

The programme culminated for each group, in the "Longest Day", on the final day of Term. Students slept over at the School Library (thanks to Papa O Te Aroha for the mattresses). They were awakened by a loud noise at 3.00 a.m. and then underwent 12 hours of demanding activities.



It was incredible to see that, although they were exhausted, and some distressed, from 12 hours of "torture", they found the courage to work as a team and tow the fire truck – the first group towed from the Police Station, to the Fire Station; the second term's students towed from the Fire Station to the Leith Place clock and back to the Fire Station.

They were very tired in the evening, at the graduation dinners, shared with family and supporters - some too tired to eat

Thanks go to the sponsors of Bluelight, the Tokoroa Police staff who were so supportive, the guest speakers, Roger Whale from Tokoroa Police who attended every session, Mama, who came to help out with the cooking for her nephew in Term 2, but was there every day in Term 3, along with Joanne whose daughter was also in Term 2, but continued to cook in Term 3.

Very special thanks to Bluelight Co-ordinator, Kylie, who gave up so much of her family time to go beyond the call of duty, and to Graham; the changes and resilience observed in the students involved made your efforts worthwhile.

Literacy Club

This year an invitation was extended to all families in our community who have children in Year 6, 7 and 8 to be involved in a free Literacy Club run each Thursday from 4pm to 5pm.

The purpose of the club was to extend the literacy skills of children who were needing support or extension in reading and writing.

Sharon Luxford also volunteered to assist and together we worked on independent Literacy programs for students to develop and extend their reading and writing skills. Each session included thinking skills games, reading and writing tasks and visits to the school library.

We look forward to continuing this club in 2015.



School Production: Grease is the Word!


Grease is a huge musical that has been all over the world, from Broadway to the silver screen.

Then, before we travelled to Spain, we stayed for three nights in a fortified French town. Our Hostel was actually inside the walls of a medieval castle!



Polinetia Fa'atasi – South Pacific Cruise

On the 5th of December 2013, 45 staff, students and parents flew to Sydney Australia to begin a two week cruise aboard the Pacific Pearl cruise ship around the Pacific.

We stayed in Sydney for three days performing for communities, sightseeing and shopping before sailing. We visited many well known Sydney attractions including the Opera House, Bondi Beach, Sydney Harbour Bridge, Paddys Market, the Canterbury Bulldogs and Manly Sea Eagles home turf.

The P&O cruise ship Pacific Pearl was stunningly hugel It was a floating community, complete with restaurants, entertainment, leisure and great company. We quickly made a name for ourselves and became almost like celebrities. We met and became great friends with people from all around the world and from all walks of life. With so many things to do on-board, you could not get bored. Lifou Island: Very much like Aitutaki, but the lagoon not as clear as Aitutaki's. We met turtles here and got our buzzes to see and swim with them, some of the boys even swimming on the back of them. However, this island also had SEA SNAKES! Ewww man did we scream whenever someone yelled out "Seasnake" or in the Kanack language "Valalaa"...they were black and white! ewww yuck and really scary - even though they don't bite, just the thought of a snake sends shivers down the spine!

On this lovely island we had hats woven for us from out of the coconut fronds, for our uniform that evening at our island night show. The mama who we befriended was awesome; she had pretty good English too, even giving Ms Natua the chop!

Ms Natua: "Oh they teach you!" Mama: "No, they learn me!"

Us: "bwahahahahahahahahaha"

Island Nite Show: We were the main show for the evening, Deck 12, water front. Packed to the rafters, not one empty spot, big stage, bright lights, adrenalin rush hearing the crowd yelling for us, TOP PERFORMANCE, a night we will never forget. Excellent reviews from all passengers and crew, even the Captain of the ship came to watch us perform, as well as all the execs of the cruise ship. It was an amazing feeling.

Due to popular demand, we were asked to perform a second time during the sail away party leaving Isle of Pines.

Our final evening - the Captain, execs, and entertainment crew held a cocktail event for us to thank us for our performances. They had gifts for every member of the group, complete with a DVD and group photo of our performances, P & O t-shirt and lanyard. It was too awesome, we appreciated, that they appreciated us that much.

I was awarded the Galatti scholarship which was attached to the International Volunteer Award given to Mrs Sommerville. This helped me towards experiencing this once in a lifetime opportunity. When I was in the airport in New Zealand, I was both nervous and excited. Even after the 24-hour journey, I was still excited. When I finally arrived in Denmark, it was snowing which was amazing because I have only ever seen snow on mountains before. I realized then I had to live in these freezing temperatures.

The arrival camp was fun as I was able to meet many people from many different countries and experience Danish culture for the first time. We tried a lot of traditional Danish foods which I love. The day I arrived it was my birthday and my host family had a traditional Danish cake waiting for me which was great and definitely an icebreaker. Dinner time is always my favorite part of the day. Dinners in Denmark are about ten times better than in New Zealand (sorry mum). I live out on a farm.

My school is a business school and looks just like a University, which made me a little bit uncomfortable. It is a lot different to Forest View and I was not sure how well I would fit in the classes. I was also a little scared that it might be hard to make Danish friends, as I could not really speak any Danish. But, I have made good relationships with the kids in my class.

I have been on a class trip to Belgium which was a wonderful experience. I also went with my family on a holiday to the Czech Republic. It was a 10-hour drive in the car and we passed through Germany on the way. We visited Austria, Hungary, and Slovakia as well. This was exciting for me, as I love to visit new countries.

My parents from New Zealand came to visit on the weekend just for 2 days as they are travelling around Europe. It was great for me that they could meet my family. We hired a car for 1 day and travelled to a town where my mother's great grandfather was born many years ago. We saw the house where he was born and lived in for 2 years before his parents decided to move to New Zealand.

Time has gone so fast, I cannot believe that I only have 3 months left. Whter is approaching again and I think I have already seen enough snow to last me. Waiting in the snow every day for the bus is not exciting. In New Zealand, I was

quite shy when first meeting new people. Now it is quite the opposite, I have met many new people whilst being on exchange and made many friends. I am still enjoying my exchange as much as before, if not more. I can understand most of what people say when they speak Danish to me and I am starting to speak a little. I will admit that I have had problems learning the language but my goal is to speak the language as well as I can. I am so glad I went on an exchange with AFS and I am so grateful for the help you have given me to experience it.

Hello. My name is Tony M. Hansen.

I have been studying in FVHS for the whole year, as an exchange student from AFS. I was born and raised in Greenland, and have lived there for the most parts of my life. I finished school two years ago and I'm now going to a Gymnasium (a step before Uni) on my first year of three.

Since I was little, I've always wanted to go out and explore the world and go as far from home as I can. I have succeeded in achieving that dream by going to New Zealand, which is exactly in the other side of the globe from where I live. I arrived in New Zealand on the 31st of January, from a cold winter in Denmark to a hot summer day in NZ. Seeing the land with my own eyes was way different than what you see on TV. So my expectations were almost the whole opposite of how it turned out to be. It was better. The first month, while getting to know the country it was a bit hard. Not having English as your first or second language was tough. The accent was the hardest to get to know but that started to change slowly as time passed. I am still learning a lot of stuff even now from the strong NZ slang English.

My school back home has around 450 student from age 16 up to 35. We get to choose one main subject that has seven small subjects. We have that for the whole year until we get to choose a new path in the 2nd year. Since it's a school for any age group, smoking is allowed as long as you are seven metres away from the school grounds. We have a place inside to eat lunch, which has a tuck shop where you can buy things to eat and drink. Our timetables can change daily, depending on the teachers.

FVHS Has giving me the opportunity to do something really like. I was in the school's First XI football (soccer) team, where I got to win the division and a 5 a-side tournament. It was nice to share some experience from my own home country. I was also in the school production "Grease" with two roles, where I was acting and singing. It was a cool experience to act in English for the first time.

I don't have anything else to say other than thank you very much for giving me an opportunity to have a great year, not only in FVHS, but in the whole of NZ. Thank you also to my family as I couldn't have come without them. The year is added on to my great memory list already.





This year saw the introduction of Ki-o-Rahi in school. We started the year by entering two teams in the Waikato Ki-o-Rahi Regional tournament.





International Stadium. We finished 15th out of 24 teams in what was a great week of football.


