Prinipal - Ian Ferguson

Our academic achievement continues to improve against national levels in NCEA. Better monitoring of achievement and responding to students' needs are resulting in them attaining higher achievement levels. The emphasis on written literacy is making a difference throughout the school and will definitely give added impetus to student achievement. It is important to understand that the gaining of qualifications must not be the only focus of academic achievement. Linking qualifications to career pathways is something Forest View does very well. The very high percentage of students successfully transitioning into worthwhile further education or employment is outstanding and reflects the work carried out by school staff. Earlier in the year while attending the Kingitanga Day at Waikato University I met with some former students. It was humbling to see how well they had adapted to university life.

Performing Arts continues to play a lead role in Forest View being the school of choice for this area of student endeavour. Our school production of "For Today" was outstanding, and Te Piringatahi and Polinetia Fa'atasi play a huge role for our students' cultural connection and expression. Our Drama group continues to develop high quality performances and production skills. Any school would be proud to have our sound and lighting crew.

Forest View had a solid year in sport with our high performance plans steadily gaining traction. We continue to have a large number of students being selected for representative teams or are performing at a high level. Having a structured approach leads to ongoing sports development and improved achievement. It was good to see a determination to succeed by all our teams and individual performers. Thank you to the many parents and supporters who coached, managed or cheered on our players.

Forest View continues to make huge strides incorporating digital technology into learning with all teachers receiving professional learning in 'Google Classroom'. Emphasis will be placed on increasing the number of student-owned devices in classrooms next year. Some research implies that achievement is not supported by the use of devices. Our own experience is that they do, not just in terms of NCEA achievement but also supporting students to learn and achieve throughout the school. They are a great tool for developing the key competencies that support 21st Century Learning.

This year we began a trial joint project between Foundation for Youth Development and the Perry Outdoor Education Trust. We are the only school in New Zealand to be implementing this joint project. The Year 9 Stars, Year 10 Adventure Camp, the Peer Mentor training and the Year 13 Citizenship Camp have been spectacularly successful in creating supportive senior students, improving relationships between students, and the transition of new Year 9 students into Forest View. Our RAP Values make an important impact



on creating a positive and safe learning environment but together with this project there has been a significant change with parents and outside agencies commenting on how calm the school is.

Four of the A Block classrooms were refurbished and five others in the block will refurbished in 2016. The auditorium refurbishment will also be a part of the next five year building development plan.

Earlier this year, Neil Quigley, Vice Chancellor of Waikato University discussed with me an initiative to increase the number of students entering Waikato University. As a result of this initiative fifteen students have indicated they intend to enrol there, up from the original five. To support students financially, the university has put in place the Te Ara ki Angitu Scholarships. Eleven of our students have gained these scholarships varying in value from \$1500 to \$5000.

I would like to thank the Head Students, Sophie Goodhue

and Sasha Te Whare: our Board of Trustees student representative, Conal Parker; Leader of Learning Stacey. Gurr; Leader of Sport, Ella Livingston; Leader of Culture, Jayme Walker; and Leader of Community Service, Raelene Loye for your hard work during the year. You have done very well balancing your busy student life with these important leadership roles.






Lake Leader Report:






A big thank you to our Lake Leaders, our Lake Council and Peer Mentors for their involvement and commitment in working hard to help OHA gain success.




Agriculture Academy





field. We would like to say a massive thank you to Jared Shewry and Kyle Pearce for their work over the last five years, they will be missed as they embark on their next journey.



The students spent most of their time at Forest View but also




