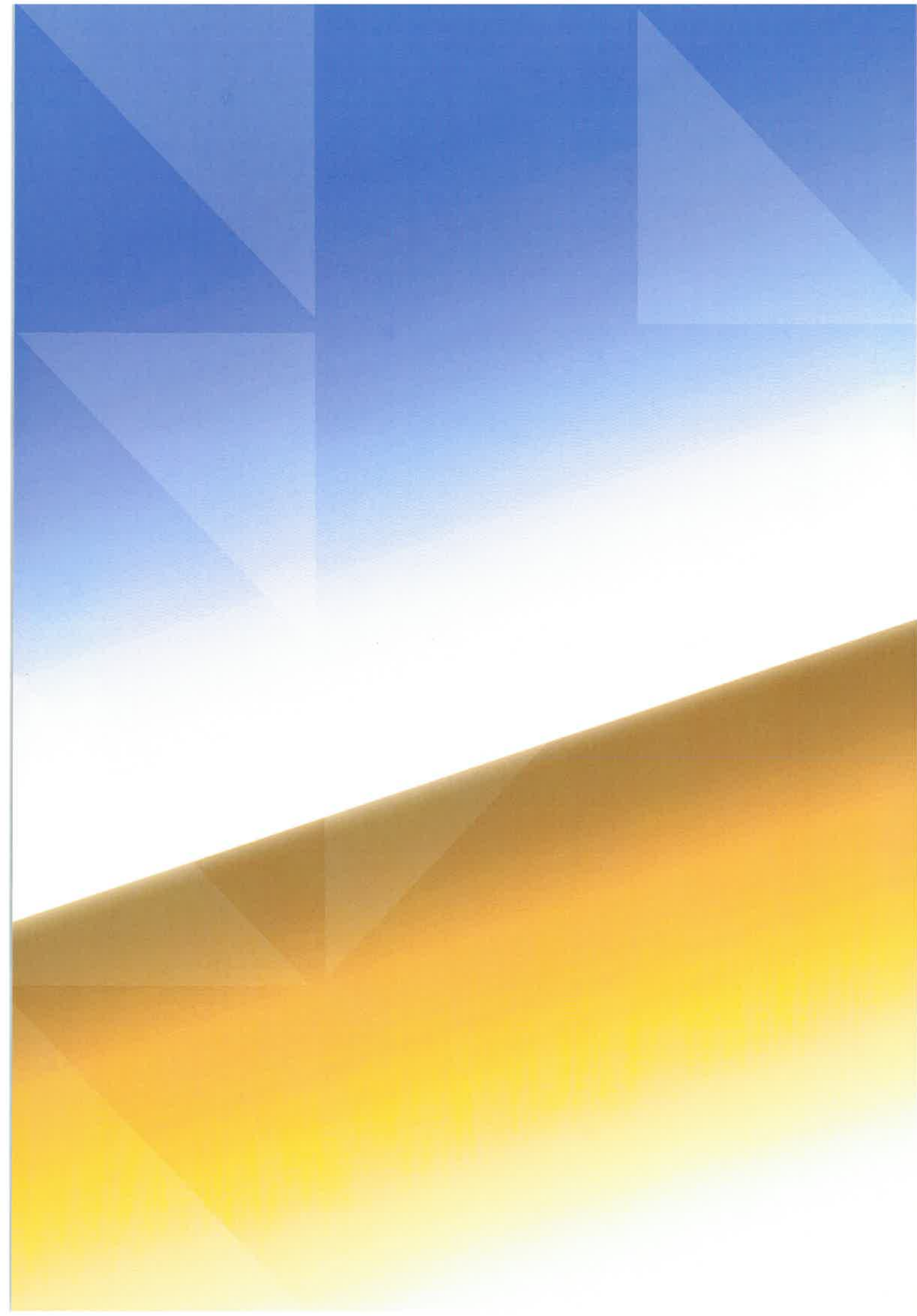

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Principal - Ian Ferguson

As a school we have promoted the idea of 'quality qualifications' to our students, parents and community as an important measure of Forest View's level of achievement. Achieving NCEA will not be done through the gaining of unrelated credits in which the sole purpose is to get enough to gain a NCEA Level. Our teachers work hard to ensure students' courses are linked to possible career pathways so that their qualifications represent valuable skills and knowledge. We know these qualifications are valid by the excellent results from external moderation checks that are carried out by NZQA, on our students' work. Another measure of having quality qualifications is the extremely high level of successful transition from School to universities, polytechnics or employment. Former students tell me of how self-management skills gained at Forest View have helped them develop high levels of resiliency to get through the challenges encountered on leaving school. I am humbled by the success of our former students, not just in terms of careers but as fantastic members of our wider communities. These accomplishments reflect the hard work and professionalism of our whole staff as well as the love and care of our parents. I would also like to mention the advent of the Pasifika Power Up initiative. Students from early childhood to secondary school attend Tuesday night learning activities supported by staff and parents. The older students are excellent role models for learning and achievement and all ethnicities are welcome.

Through meetings with small groups of students and conducting student surveys it became quickly apparent that there is a clear sense of family and community amongst our students. They felt that they were not being judged and were able to be themselves. Students remarked on being able to relate to a wide range of students. A large contributor to this is the work supported by the Graeme Dingle Foundation and the Perry Outdoor Education Trust in a joint project. The

Peer Mentors working with Year 9's in the Star's programme, the Year 10 Adventure Camp and the Year 13 Citizenship Camp form the structure of a programme that is developing a warm and inclusive community.

A large number of students took part in the 2016 Stage Challenge with their performance being based on demonstrating the true Tokoroa. Many hours were put into rehearsing. At the dress rehearsal some of the audience were reduced to tears, such was the emotional charge from the performance. On the Monday after Stage Challenge I received emails from two principals who were in awe of the performance and the magnificent way our students represented our School, both off and on the stage. Polinetia Fa'atasi and Te Piringitahi continue to provide amazing cultural opportunities for our students. They form valuable partnerships between whanau and School.

Our School sport continues to strengthen with the added drive on high performance sport and participation. The number of parents coaching, managing and supporting our sports activities is becoming a real strength. Directors for Rugby and Netball have been appointed to develop academies of excellence where there is equal emphasis being placed on player and coach development. I have been impressed by the character of our students when faced with success as well as defeat. Most of our teams have been successful in the grades in which they are playing but there is a determination to aspire to higher grades.

In June a new Board of Trustees was elected and I can assure you the governance of the School is in great hands. An excellent partnership is being developed between staff and the Board. They are developing a new strategic plan for 2017-2019 where there is an emphasis on personal excellence and future-oriented learning.

The board, along with staff, have been busy developing a strategic plan going forward for the next three years. Once the draft is developed it will be taken to the community for feedback. The goal of improving school safety for students and staff has resulted in the upgrading of existing bell systems and introducing a 'lock down' alarm.

Our school is committed to providing a

learning environment that continues to inspire students to reach their potential. I would like to wish all Year 13 students the very best for next year, moving on to your future career path.

Pasifika Achievement Club

Every Tuesday afternoon from 3.15 – 6pm our dedicated teachers run an afterschool homework programme where all students can seek support with their learning in the classroom. In this space students come to complete homework, study, have one on one tutoring, or do work towards internal assessments.

In Term 1 the club held a carwash to help raise funds towards buying food for the students during this study time. They also travelled to Auckland to attend the annual Pasifika Festival in Western Springs which was an enjoyable experience for all who attended.

PAC club has been attended by many students over the year who have jumped at the opportunity to get that extra support. We are thankful to Mama Rangi Mutua who has cooked food for all the students to give them sustenance to keep working hard during PAC club sessions.

In Term 2 Pasifika Power Up came to Forest View. Pasifika Power Up is a national education programme that actively supports Pasifika parents and families to champion their children's learning, and provides academic support for secondary, primary and early childhood students.

At 5pm, everyone stops working and we enjoy some kai that is prepared by Aunty Martha Turia and Aroa Turia of SWPICS who also provide transport for students at the end of the night.

Kia ora! I decided to take part in an exchange because I wanted to see something different, learn a different language, a new culture. I wanted see the world, because every country and every school is different. Seeing this difference opens your mind to many different points of view.

When I arrived I knew everything was different to my school and my country. It was a completely different culture. I loved Forest and New Zealand. FVHS gives you the possibility to take part, there are many activities to enjoy and you are always included.

Another difference to my school is the times. Here I go in the morning, but in my school in Uruguay I have to go in the afternoon (1pm to 7pm). I prefer mornings, because that leaves you free for the rest of the day to do whatever you want. In my school there are nearly 1000 people, and here just 350, which is better because you know everyone and they know you too. That means you can have good relationships with most people. Another thing I like is the subjects. Here you can choose 6 subjects. In Uruguay you take 10 subjects for which you just choose the focus eg (Biology, Humanities, Art, Science).

FVHS is a big part of my exchange. I have met a lot of beautiful people here and I've learnt a lot as well, FVHS introduced me to the inclusive Maori culture which is so interesting to learn and be part of. I've tried to do a lot of sports and I've been involved in a lot of activities such as Stage Challenge,

Cactus and various trips. I think every little thing is what makes the big things. I've enjoyed everything. I'm so glad to be here and I wouldn't change anything.

My experience here has taught me so much. I've changed and learned so much. This has taught me to understand that there is a completely different world out there waiting to be discovered. This has helped me to open my mind and be also be open to the changes and challenges that the life puts in my way. The exchange makes you grow, and make you see things that you have never seen before.

I've been in France with AFS since September. Learning French has been hard, mainly because of my New Zealand accent. When I say one thing it sounds completely different from how it's supposed to sound. The French we speak here is nothing like I learned in NZ! French is a beautiful language but the majority of the time I'm just answering yes, no and maybe to everything. I can't wait to see where I'll be with French in another six months.

School and the classes in France are very different from New Zealand. Here, there's up to ten hours of school each day, but I often have free periods

Adjusting to cultural differences here has been difficult, the culture and lifestyle we have in New Zealand is so different. When eating dinner here we often stay at the table long after we've finished eating. Hugging in non-existent, there's nothing like pies, or hot food in bakeries only cakes and donuts. All the countryside and buildings here are a lot older than any man-made structures in NZ.

Being in France has made me realise how much of a relaxed lifestyle New Zealanders have at home, school and work. Becoming an exchange student was the best decision I could have made. I can't wait to see what the year brings and I definitely recommend it to other students who want to experience and learn the differences of countries and cultures.

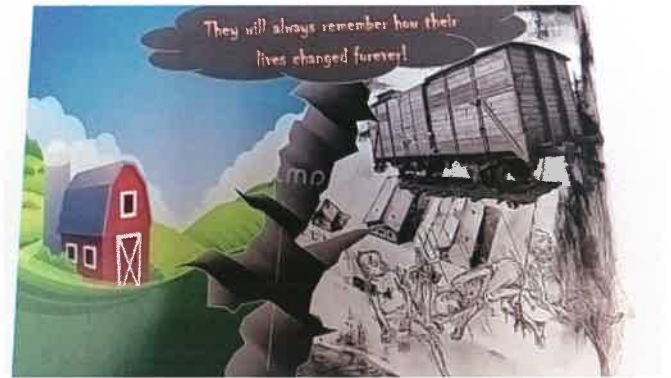

I took the easy out leaving behind a world full of race discrimination and my brown baby sister who will live as an only child due to the fact that I was not good enough for society.

Because I am Mathew also known as Darnell, Sione, Rangi and all the other brown boy's names who WERE proudly named after their great grandfather. I am underestimated, I am only good at sports and academically I fail. I am judged. I am with my haircut to the side and eyebrows on fleek a f--kboy. I am the little brown boy who used to play with his truck toy. I am "in love" with a girl who-- is probably my cousin.

I am Shaniqua also known as Shanaynay or Maria. And all the other brown girls who fit perfectly under the category of the brown girl starter pack. Which consists of a puffa jacket in the summer over a skirt that doesn't fit to cover a snap back on my head to cover that I just got out of bed. By the time I'm 16 maybe 17 if I'm lucky, I'll be a full time mother.

From the town of Tokoroa nobody seems to care, because that's normal around here. Right?

It's tiring you know, for everything about my skin to be a metaphor, for everything brown to be pun intended, to be death intended, to be failure intended. For my colour to be the trigger of your words, your hurtful words, your racist words the words you never thought I heard. Your words

that lured me into believing, believing that if I were white, everything about me would be right, if I were white, that at the end of that tunnel would be light, if I were white then I wouldn't have to put up a fight. We wouldn't be standing here in front of you tonight if we didn't have reason to fight.

There are days I stare in the mirror and look at what's staring back at me and I am often reminded that my skin has gotten me the most attention, to be destruction. I am an open wound because I was constantly picked at by other kids. You know, the classic jokes like when the lights turn off "Camryn is that you?" "Where did Uma go?"

I've lost so much energy trying to be invisible, I dodge the sun while white people bathe in it. I feel nervous in the dairy but I haven't stolen anything. I can't wear white clothes because they make me look darker than I already am. I've typed in the search bar "how to make your skin visibly lighter..."

I thought this skin was a sin, people have always tried to question brownness with the light skin vs dark skin, who gives a stuff you can't win the game. Listen they do not believe brown lives matter if they did we wouldn't be standing here tonight. Our colour has always been targeted. When the colour of my skin is seen as a weapon, that I will never be seen as unarmed. Just because someone looks happy, doesn't mean they are because even a white rose has a black shadow.

Can you not see a trapped graduate to be, trying to escape from inside of me? Trapped by labels, turning tables, my mind is like twisted cables, and it's because of you I'm so unstable.

Now I'm running side to side, but I stand with brown pride, and I won't be stopped from the inside I am SICK and TIRED of having to hide, from the true me

ME is a brown boy painting a life bigger and prettier

than any picture seen before, for my people to hang on their wall, breaking stereotypes, to live an extreme life, where at every stop I'll stop to explore...

ME is a brown girl who has a bright future ahead of her because I go to school every day and I'm damn well going to finish and I'm telling you I am NOT the first in my brown family and I am definitely not the last...

ME is a brown boy who pleases my parents by doing all that I can do to make them proud, because N for not achieved, A for achieved, M for merit, and E for me written all over my CV. N A M E my name will lead to bigger and better things and your poisoned labels will never stop me.

ME is a brown girl who will finish this year at high school with not only my NCEA qualifications but with my brown friends. The ones who have stood by me since day one. Being labelled as the 'Maori Girls' since we first began. And when I make it into the NZ Army and hold my gun you'd better run.

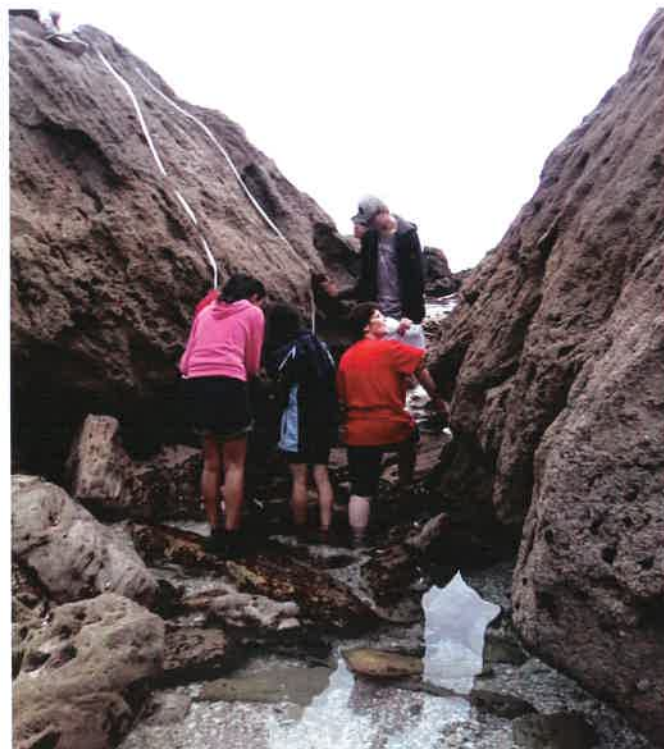
