





NANCHANG VISIT

Mr Ferguson - Principals' Delegation visit to China

The purpose of the visit was to visit educational facilities in China and develop exchange opportunities.



Accompanying Rangiora Wilson-Ogden I travelled first to Nanchang where she stayed on with the rest of a group of students. I then joined the Principals' Delegation in Beijing.

During the 5 days there, our group visited a range of schools and universities as well as travelling to the Great Wall, Tiananmen Square and the Imperial City. We moved onto Xiamen in the humid South East of China and continued visiting schools and universities. After 4 days, I travelled to Shanghai and met up with the School group.

What stood out for me was the size of the schools; up to six thousand students with more schools under construction to cope with population shifts, class sizes of up to 60 and the ranking of schools and universities. Students were busy sitting exams with the results determining the rank of schools or universities they were able to access.

In comparison, New Zealand students have a considerably advanced education system but we could learn from the Chinese culture of absolute focus on achievement. New high-rise buildings, demolition or refurbishment of whole neighborhoods amidst heritage buildings makes for a rich urban landscape. The experience certainly enriched my understanding of China and made for an interesting comparison.


OUTDOOR EDUCATION

YEAR 9 CAMP


We are fortunate to be in a position to offer this great opportunity to our Yr 9 students and would not be able to do so without the support and guidance of POET and our Peer Mentors.

Maori Woman's Development Incorporated.

Two external presenters from the business field worked with our students during this time. They took students on a journey from developing the seed of a creative idea to forming a tangible framework and finally presenting the concept and business plan. This was a different style of learning and one in which teamwork was a critical factor. Each team had to work together as a business to develop their ideas.

Teams needed to be innovative and create their team's service or a product. The completed plan included financial and marketing skills. The students worked hard under pressure. Finally, on the final day they presented their product to five judges from the Tokoroa business community at an expo. Every member had to play an important role in the presentation, so they didn't let the team down.

A diverse range of products were created. 'Pocket On' (an iron on pocket which could be easily ironed on and taken off a garment); 'Power Box' (which ensures all your cords did not get tangled); 'Tempillow' (a therapeutic pillow for people struggling to get to sleep); 'Flootbrush' (a brush which came with its own floss), and Attack Axe (a very useful tool for those outdoors as the axe head can be attached to any pole or piece of wood).

But. the winning product was 'Keep'N'Dry" which was a full length see through umbrelia. Each member of this team received a medal of excellence. Team leaders as CEO's, received a leadership award and all students received a participation certificate. The judges were amazed at the creativity and the business skills shown by our students. It was a productive and unique learning experience. If the innovation shown by our students was anything to go by, NZ is in safe hands.

A big thank you must go to our judges, the two facilitators and MWDI.




STEP UP


Others have been involved in the Primary Industries




TECHNOLOGY COMMUNITY PROJECTS

This year a large part of our Year 10 technology curriculum was focused on being involved in community projects. In Term One, our first clients were Tokoroa North School. Digital Technology students were asked to create teaching resources; Puddle Jumpers to help students learn to count and CAT words to help students learn to read for their Junior school

In Term Two, we had our largest project, Victoria Place. All Year 10 Technology students from Digital, Food, Metal and Wood were involved in this project. Students' paid an initial visit to the residents to gain ideas for designs, themes, colors, likes and dislikes at the beginning of the term. Digital students made residents Coloring In and Activity books, Puzzles, Wooden Picture cubes and 3D printed plant pots. Wood students made Birdhouses and Jewelry boxes. Metal students created Plant Pot holders and Motor sensory stability games. The Food Technology students designed and created a menu from the 1950's for our presentation day lunch.

Term Four will be another busy term for the whole Technology area with Tokoroa Hospital being the recipients for Coloring In and Activity books, metal toys and a Christmas cake in a small wooden box.







TECHNOLOGY RACE

The Technology Race is a cross curricular project involving the Digital, Food, Metal and Wood subjects. The race is based on the Amazing Race with the students' starting off in the Library choosing their partners, picking team names and deciphering their first clue which sent them off to start the race.

At each stop students needed to complete two tasks individually, so they had to decide who would do which one. Each task was a smaller part of a whole item that they had to put together as a final task. While they were completing each task, they were rated on the school values of Whanaungatanga, Personai Excellence, Resilience and Innovation.

Once both tasks were completed and accepted by the supervisor, they were given an envelope with another clue they had to decipher to find the next stop. At the end of the day students' were given 20 minutes to go and gather up all their completed tasks and convene back at the library where they had to assemble their project. Students' obviously loved the day and there was a lot of competition between teams. The overall winners were Maddisyn Chapman and Jade Church with 75pts.





PE/SCIENCE

The Physical Education Department has set a goal in 2017 to make our curriculum more student driven. The Physical Education Department's motto of "No excuses, just results' has been the backbone for success this year.

Senior Physical Education now uses student's individual sporting interest as a context for learning within senior classes. Our students are now more capable of applying sport science knowledge of ones sporting code, thus improving ones performance on the sports field.

The Physical Education department has introduced a Sport in Education model amongst junior students, across a range of curriculum areas. Sport in Education uses sport as a context for learning and has had a significant impact on the junior curriculum this year. Year 10 students used the 2017 Lions Tour as a context or learning, developing a supporter's package for visiting rugby fans. Students learnt the ability to solve real life problems using knowledge from all curriculum areas to drive this project.

Senior Outdoor Education continued to focus on industry practical skills, including tramping, camping, river survival, rock climbing, abseiling, caving, kayaking and mountain biking. Our students really excel during these experiences, pushing students to thrive under challenging circumstances.



DIT

It has been another huge year with many innovations implemented. We have teamed up with the Technology Department to offer a new Evolocity subject where students' will design, create and race an electric vehicle at Level 1 and 2.

All the Year 9 students were involved in a Technology Race day as part of our DIT Week. It was based on the Amazing Race and involved students completing projects in Digital, Wood, Metal and Food all in one day.

Year 10 students were involved in Community Projects for Tokoroa North School, Victoria Place and Tokoroa Hospital.

Our Digital Technology standards will be changing as from 2018, with the old standards being replaced by new ones that will hopefully give students more choice in contexts.

The National Certificates in Computing and Business Administration and Computing will be phased out for the new New Zealand Certificates at Level 2 and 3.

The Annual Sports prize-giving was held in the evening on 27 September. Guest speaker was ex-student Toka Natua, whose hat trick of tries contributed significantly to Black Fern victory in the World Cup final. It was great to have her back in the School.




