Most notably the yr 9 trip to Otorohanga in term three. For the first time this trip became a solely Social Studies experience, with the students attending both the Otorohanga Kiwi house and completing the Kiwiana trail in my old home town's main street. We continued our tradition of tree planting with the River Trails organization along the banks of the Waikato River.

This year a small group of focused students joined me along with our Star's Programme co-ordinator in completing a clean up of Lake Moana-nui. In over two hours we collected two large rubbish bags of plastic wrappers, tin cans, plastic and glass drink from the lakebed and bankside. It was great to see our students adopting a positive environmental attitude towards this local resource. It's just a shame that others who visit the reserve don't have this same

approach and make it necessary to do these clean ups through the year. And well done to Aaron for making aware to a couple of individuals that you do need a licence to fish in the lake, a Fish and Game staff member of the future in the making there perhaps?

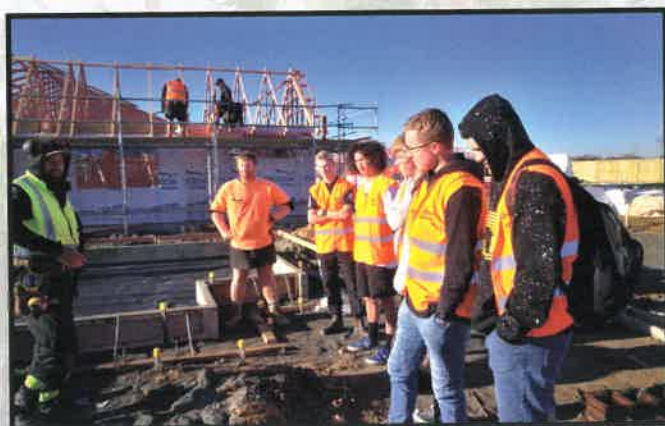

MAI BIZ 2018



From Wednesday the 13th to Friday 15th June, 40 Year 11 and a number of the Year 12 Business Studies class were involved in a great opportunity, taking part in the Mai Biz programme.

Our students were very fortunate, as we are one of only a few schools across New Zealand to take part in the programme which is fully funded by Māori Woman's Development Incorporated. Two external presenters from the business field worked with our students during this time. They took students on a journey from developing the seed of a creative idea to forming a tangible framework and finally presenting the concept and business plan. This was a different style of learning and one in which teamwork was a critical factor. Each team had to work together as a business to develop their ideas.

Teams needed to be innovative and create their team's service or a product. The completed plan included financial and marketing skills. The students worked hard under pressure. Finally, on the final day they presented their product to five judges from the Tokoroa business community at an expo. Every member had to play an important role as a presenter so they didn't let the team down. Groups came up with products such as: 'Kozy' a heated and scented cushion; 'Pixels' an earpiece that will wake you up if you fall asleep while driving; 'Pocket Stationary' where all your stationary needs were put together like a pocket knife; 'Sippy Sockets' which enabled people to attach a flavoured socket to their taps and drink flavoured water; 'Warmukk' which was a mug that could heat itself. A very useful tool for those outdoors or for the morning coffee.

The winning product was 'Handy Hairbrushes' which was a

hairbrush that could hold your hair ties and hair clips. Each member of this team received a medal of excellence. Team leaders as CEO's, received a leadership award and all students received a participation certificate. The judges were amazed at the creativity and the business skills shown by our students. For some it was stressful but overall it was a productive and unique learning experience. If the innovation shown by our students was anything to go by, NZ is in safe hands.

A big thank you must go to our judges, the two facilitators and MWDI.

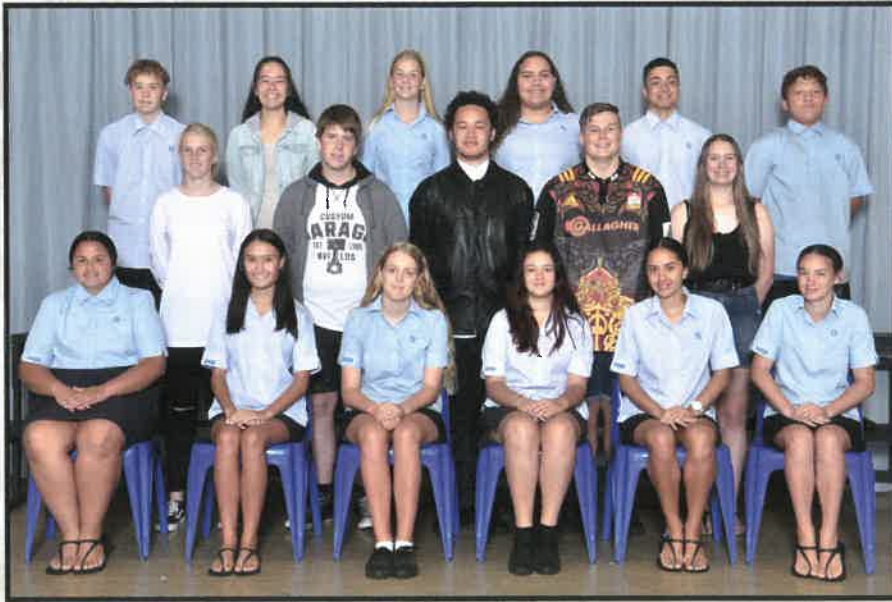

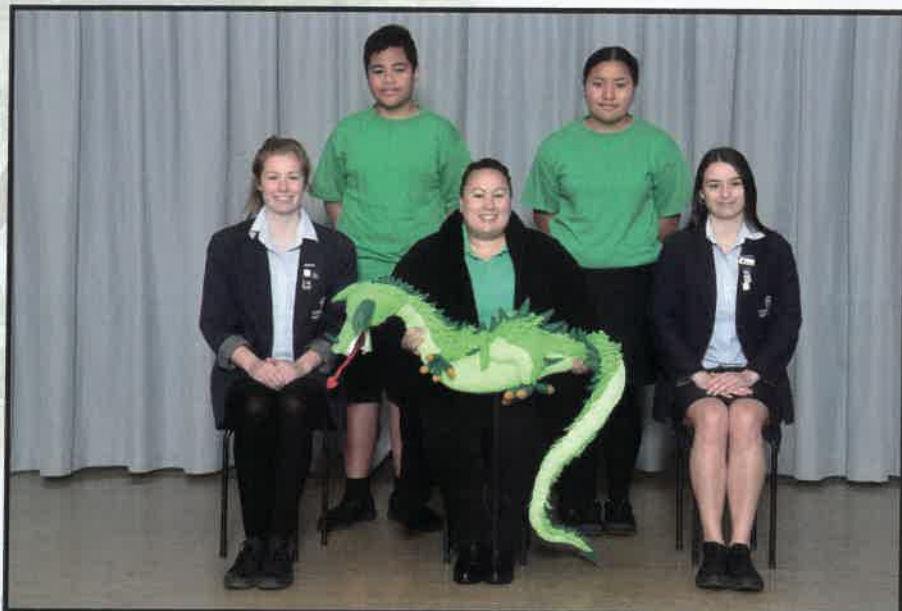

Polinetia Fa'atasi 1997

**Kia orana anau,
Check out the word serendipity
as it is important in our history.
Two seemingly unrelated
incidents combined to create
something awesome.**

A phone call from Mr Sommerville who was deputy principal at Tokoroa High School in late 1995 was the first of these. Tokoroa High School had committed to host a visiting Australian school cricket team a year earlier but they were unable to meet that obligation and as Forest had a good team and I was teacher in charge of it he asked if we could arrange to host Warnambool High and take the fixture instead.

Fast forward to 1996 to the second incident when Mrs Priscott asked Mrs McGovern and I to take over as teachers in charge of the poly group (as it was called then) no big deal, nothing much to do just be a contact at school as the group had its own tutors so all we had to do was be a contact person. No problems we thought, we can do that with no issues, can't be that hard. Haha little did we know what was in store.

In true Tokoroa tradition we hosted Warnambool cricket team and gave them a time to remember, feeding them and billeting them and even letting them beat us at Cricket (actually they thrashed us) however they really enjoyed our hospitality which left a lasting impression on them. As they were leaving their teacher in charge Pete Auchatell said "We are so pleased that we met you Forest View guys, you have blown us

away with kindness and hospitality, if there is anything I can ever do for you just let me know."

The poly group leaders Aunty Mitch, Aunty Monz and all had the group buzzing and eventually someone suggested that the newly formed Polinetia Fa'atasi should go on tour, but where to go?

I had kept in contact with Pete Auchatell and floated the idea of going to Aussie. Pete jumped at the idea of paying back the hospitality they had received and the trip started to take shape. Firewood chopping and delivering, fund raising concerts in the old Civic centre and Settlers hall batons up and all sorts of things saw us raise \$50,000 (which was a lot of money in 1997) The PIC did a lot of work to help and the community and families really got behind us.

Some of the group had never been out of Tokoroa let alone Waikato so the prospect of leaving the country was a really big deal. Passports were applied for and sorted and uniforms sewn, travelling uniforms and performing uniforms all created by the aunties with Mrs P organising it. Mrs McGovern had a brother in Melbourne who was a truck driving instructor and he managed to hire us 2 small buses and a big people mover. Anau in Melbourne were contacted and Pete Auchatell sorted a road trip from Melbourne down the Great Ocean Road to Warnambool up through Ballarat and back to Melbourne. The trip was on.

55 of us set off and after an exciting time in Auckland airport where ukulele playing and singing entertained the rest of the travellers.

Sinopati was so excited but we were not sure how he would cope. Mr Murray from Tokoroa intermediate couldn't believe we were taking him!

We arrived into Melbourne and were picked up by a big bus, taken to a local church and given a huge feed and after much singing and dancing were billeted for the night. Early next morning Mr Poturu, Mr Bennion and I set off to get the hired vehicles Mr Poturu and I driving buses and Mr Bennion in the people mover. We collected the group and we were off on the trip of our dreams.

We road tripped down to Warnambool stopping at schools and halls to perform, sometimes changing in the buses, sometimes on the side of the road. Hannah and Laura, my daughters who were at the ages of 6 and 4 had a wee 2 minute dance all on their own to allow for a costume change.

We spent 4 or 5 days going South and got to Warnambool where we were billeted by the cricket team and families and performed for their school assembly. One of the cricket boys who was Nuiean did an impromptu hula for us and with us. It was also the day of their School Ball so as Pete Auchatell was also in charge of that and he was billeting us I had to stay right to the end and then patrol the streets to check that all was well. I have heard a few stories since about what some of the group got up to but you will have to ask Mr Mutua and Mrs Poturu-Kawhena (who were in year 12 at the time) for the lowdown on that.

Needless to say it was a slow start the next day as we headed North to

Ballarat and mine tours as well as other fun stuff. Then we headed back to Melbourne for the last week. being billeted by Anau and church folk, only getting together to perform.

All in all we did 17 performances in 14 days in all sorts of venues and all survived with the only major issue being getting the coconut bras, ukuleles and drums in and out of the countries.

There were too many people involved to mention them all I am grateful to all of you for the fantastic experiences that we had.

Polinetia Fa'atasi 1997

Kia Orana, Talofa Lava, Malo e lelei, Taloha Ni and warm pacific greetings to you all.

Well since its inception in 1997 Polinetia Fa'atasi has grown and has offered many young people a "snapshot" into their future and has offered a view of the world beyond the town limits of Tokoroa. This was always the vision, and I am proud that this has continued over the years.

I was young, a fresh 21 year old, youth worker, with not a care in the world. Culture has always been my passion and so I remember getting a call from Kaiti Rakei asking me to attend a meeting about the "possibility" of creating a Pasifika Dance team at Forest View High School. Because I had a couple of nieces and nephews in this group I attended the meeting. When I showed up to the auditorium, I honestly felt like Whoopi Goldberg in Sister Act, when she turns up to the class and ends up scratching the blackboard to get everyone's attention. The young people in that auditorium were "running amuck" and just hanging out together. Yes, "Mr Mutua" and "Mrs Kawhena" were in this group, young and full of promise. Little did I know that Kaiti would introduce me as the new tutor

of the Forest View Pasifika Dance Team and we hit the floor running, firstly by establishing the hierarchy! This did not take long and I found the students to be some of the most respectful, the most talented, the most good looking, passionate dancers and musicians I would have the privilege of teaching.

I know that the town thought so too because the support was colossal. Staff were amazing with their help, the Clark family, Mr and Mrs Potoru, as well as families like Soop and the Paito family, Nooroas, Mutuas, to name a few (it's been a really long time).

Before I knew it a tour of Melbourne was planned and the fundraising began. We had very academic students as well as a lot of the top sports people in this team. I was also really busy in the evenings with work, so we could only practice at 7am in the morning. We did whatever it took to raise the money to go to Melbourne. The trip was about taking our cultures out into the outback and we went to schools that seem a lot like "Summer bay" now when I think of it. We experienced lots of different reactions to our cultures, but enjoyed introducing them to others.

It was also the first time I would experience the love that many people have for our town. We were so spoiled. True story, Mr Mutua lost his money when we got there, an uncle replaces it, because he doesn't want him to go without, just like that. We stayed with Teariki and Jimmy Nooroa's families (2 years later they would become my in-laws) and the Cook Islanders of Melbourne gave us the best experience. Lots of shopping, lots of mango's, lots of ugly hairstyles, beaches and experiences that I would only do as a 21 year old tutor. Which is the reason why "what happens on tour..... stays on tour".

Polinetia Fa'atasi was a name that as a team we created. Polinetia – Cook Islands Maori for Polynesia and Fa'atasi, Samoan for together. Polynesia as one. I am glad it still exists because the hearts that created it came from a time when there wasn't much Polynesian culture at Forest View High School, but that was then, definitely not now.

Happy birthday Polinetia Fa'atasi, may you continue to inspire Pacific youth to thrive on the stage and in school, and may you always show young people a view, past the town limits of Tokoroa, to give them courage to go into the big world. Hip Hip – Hooray!!

Polinetia Fa'atasi

2003 - 2004

Kia orana, Talofa lava and warm Pacific greetings. If I was to sum up my two years as the tutor for Polinetia Fa'atasi, it was enjoyable, fun, adventurous, and an experience I will cherish forever.

In 2003, I was approached by my sisters to become the tutor for Polinetia Fa'atasi as there was no tutor available, and the girls were keen to dance. So, I rocked up to the school for our first practice (which was in one of the classrooms), expecting a small number of students to show up. However, when I arrived, the room was packed with students (mainly females), dressed in their pareu, sitting and waiting for practice. There was only one male there, young Doug Hosking, a talented drummer who was in his final year – he was sitting next to his drum, waiting patiently.

I remember that first practice, WELL. There was a room full of female dancers and only two drummers. However, outside the classroom were large groups of students, trying to get a peak of the action happening inside. The drums were beating, and the dancers were enjoying themselves and getting right into it. It was at this point, where I believe we

were able to recruit some of the rugby boys and other musos who were looking on. At the next practice, there were about 20 girls and 8 boys - the group had finally formed.

As a tutor, my initial goal was to share my knowledge of the Cook Island culture. However, the group wanted to go to the next level and perform to audiences at regional concerts and festivals. Our first performance was the first Pasifika by Nature festival, held at Fairfield Intermediate Auditorium (Hamilton). That night, the auditorium was packed and the group were the last performance. Despite the nerves and last-minute costume adjustments, the performance went really well, action packed and non-stop from beginning to end, finished off with a 'round the world'. We received a lot of good feedback from people, and this gave the group a lot of confidence and a real keenness to perform on stage again.

The following weekend, the group performed at the Waikato Maori Regional Festival (held at Hamilton Boys High), and received a big ovation by a predominantly kapahaka audience. I recall the MC asking one of the students, *how did the group come up with all the choreography and drumming? Through long hours, dedication and late nights*, was the response.

Other performances that year included the Rotorua Pasifika Festival and Forest View High School's Assembly where we performed the item 'Muatangana', a personal favourite of mine. The song speaks about the creation of the earth, the sky and all of nature's goodness.

The group also partnered with Waikato District Health Board to promote smokefree hospitals in the Waikato region. In one week, we travelled to Te Kuiti, Taumarunui, Hamilton, Thames and Tokoroa performing at each hospital, and promoting the hospital as 'Smokefree'. These promotions were truly humbling as the group were lifting the spirits of patients, young and old - *the smile on the patients' faces were priceless*. We even performed an impromptu performance right in the town centre of Te Kuiti, managing to stop traffic for a good 10 minutes.

The following year, we continued performing at 21st birthdays and community events. The group were invited to participate at the National Manu Ariki Kapahaka Festival in Taumarunui, and asked to perform at the Taokotaianga Celebration at Waikato University. This was a special performance because the group performed the song 'E Tama Ariki' to an honorary guest in the audience, the late Papa Tom Davis, former Prime Minister of the Cook Islands, medical researcher, navigator

and extraordinaire. He later complimented on the dancing, and on how much he enjoyed the drumming.... WOW!!!

We were so lucky to have some talented musicians in Ben Taiki and Ian Tuputala. At the Rotorua Pasifika Festival, the two boys opened our performance by playing 'Thomas the Tank Engine' theme with the ukulele and guitar – it was an opportunity to try something different but more importantly, to showcase the two boys to a wider audience. Since that performance, we continued to utilise their skills more and more.

In my two years with Polinetia Fa'atasi, I learnt a lot about myself and how to engage with youths. It was a wonderful experience and one, I will treasure for the rest of my life. We had a wonderful leader in Teupoko Natua who brought confidence and strong leadership to the group. She was well supported by her sisters, Maine, Lucy, Talia and Toka. Then we had the boys (George, Teva, Joseph) who grew in confidence with their dancing and later, drumming. As mentioned before, we had

talented musicians in Ben Taiki and Ian Tuputala, as well as support musos such as George Potoru, Strickland George, Teina Pakuru and my good friend / brother, the late Manu Kiikoro.

We had a good support crew, which included my wife Ruth, brother Toru and his wife Dee, my mother Poko, the Aunties (Aunty Ruta, Aunty Kopuku, Aunty Maine and Aunty Oriade) and school teachers, Ms Sandra Umaki and Mrs Tapu Potoru. A big thank you to Mr Potoru who tightened our skin drums (pa'umango and pa'u) before each practice and performance.

Although I attended Tokoroa High School as a student, my time with Polinetia Fa'atasi (and Forest View High) was invaluable, helping me to connect with the students and get a good insight into the positive school environment created at Forest View High. When I look at the Polinetia Fa'atasi groups post-2004, I am proud to say that I have been part of its history hence why I have a soft spot for Polinetia Fa'atasi whenever they perform at Pasifika by Nature.

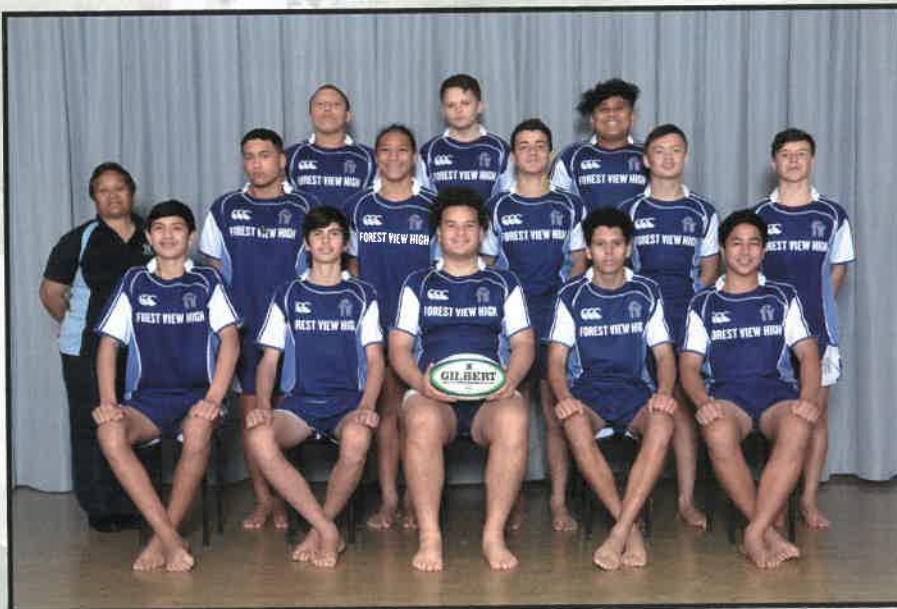

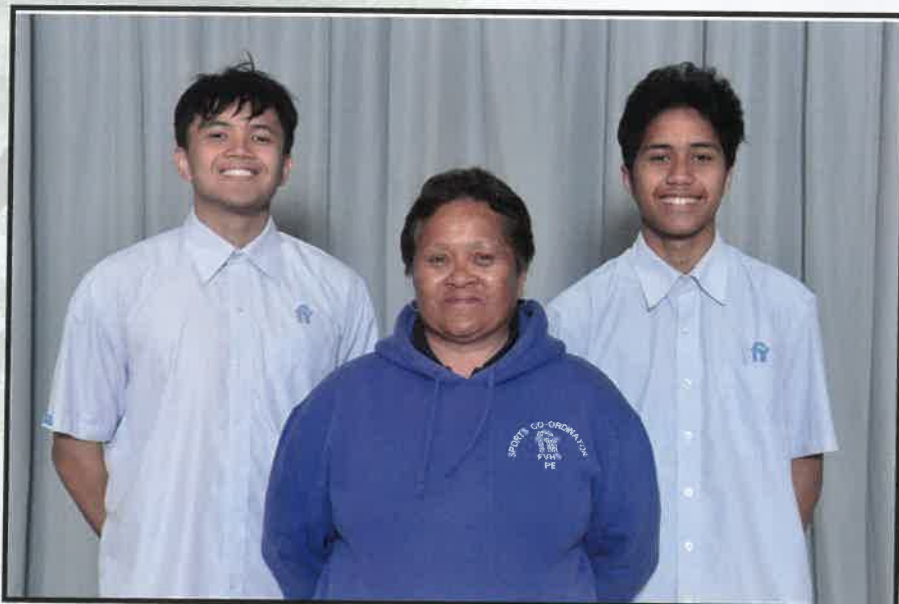

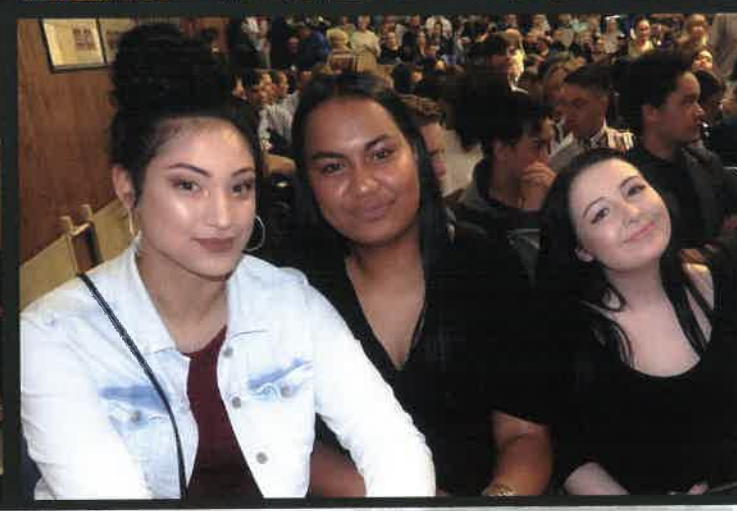
